PORT OF QUEBEC.—The "wise and strong" commercial restrictions of the United States have tended greatly to raise up the trade and prosperity of this British Province upon the ruins of our commerce—as the following statement will in part illustrate:—Value of Exports from the port of Quebec, for the last two years, viz:—For 1808, £. 895,949 73—For 1809, £. 1,595,000 00—Increase, last year, £. 699,050 27—The grain exported in 1809, was valued at £. 215,000—lumber at £. 645,000—alhes at £. 500,000—furs at 150,000—lundries at £. 85,000. During 1809, there cleared 434 vessels, (87,825 tons) manned by 4,174 men—carrying away the following, among other articles, viz. 198221 bushels wheat, 19467 barrels flour, 32915 qnt. biscuit, 54347 bushels peas, 7540 do. oats, 3478 do. barley, 28090 do. flaxseed, 2783 tierces and bbls. pork, 1766 do. beef, 10143 ps. oak timber, 23699 do. pine do. 257 do. walnut, &c. 8052518 ps. slaves and head. 27461 slave end, 262480 boards and plank, 6848 handspikes, 8424 oars, 3064 malts, 269 bowsprius, 2570 pine spars, 134850 hoops, 39000 shingles, 30942 calks pot and pearl alhes, 406 bales cotton wool, 276792 skins of various animals, &c. &c. &c.—Of the above 434 vessels, 23 remain in the Province by the early setting in of the winter. (Boston Centinel.)
