NEW-YORK, OCTOBER 4.

The following extraordinary flory is taken from the Cork

Advertiser of August 15:-

" A veffel arrived in our harbour last Sunday from Quebec, under peculiar circumstances, which we understand to be the following. While on the passage the crew mutined, and determined on murdering the Captain. On his being apprifed of this horrid delign, he begged for a short respite to prepare himself for eternity, to which they with difficuliv affented. He was accordingly permitted to retire into his cabin, and, in the interval allowed him, he contrived to secrete himself under what is called the scuttle. After the limited time had expired, the inhuman wretches repaired to the cabin to accomplish their diabolical purpose, but finding the cabin windows open, and not discovering their intended victim, they concluded he had thrown himself in the sea .-On the arrival of the vellel here, a revenue officer went on board, and was told by the mate, the ringleader of the mutiny, that the Captain, in a fit of infanity, jumped overboard, and was loft; and while he was telling the flory, the captain, to his infinite consternation, made his appearance. It is scarcely necessary to add that the villains have been taken into cultody."

## SAINT JOHN, November 19, 1810.

From HALIFAX, November 12.

By the Ann, from Newfoundland, Lisbon letters of the isl of October were received—copies of which we have been obligingly favored with, and lay before our readers.— From them it appears that a severe battle was fought between an Anglo-Portuguese and French army on the 27th Sept. near Coimbra; that the latter experienced a great defeat; and that an action of a general, and, most probably, decisive nature, was expected to be fought the succeeding day. A letter from Newfoundland of the 1st inst. states that it was there currently reported to have taken place on the 28th—that the French were beaten, and lost 10,000 men, including two Generals; yet another letter of the same date with the preceding, mentions that it was not expected the general action would be fought until the 2d October.

The last letter furnishes some interesting particulars of the battle of the 27th September: it was sought principally by the Portuguese troops, two British regiments only, one of which was the 88th, being engaged.—The slaughter was very great: the Portuguese gave no quarters to the French, 6000 of which were killed, among whom was a General; another of his rank was also wounded.—The 88th regiment lost a Major and sourteen other officers.—80,000 French

troops were engaged.

There is great news from the army—a battle was fought on the 27th ult. near Coimbra, in which the British and Portuguese gained immortal renown—it was expected the engagement would become general the following day—we are all in anxiety for the event—Gob send it may prove favourable for the allies."

"LISBON, OCTOBER 1.
"The armies are fighting near Coimbra—From the excellent behaviour of the Portuguese troops, in repeatedly standing the sormidable attacks of the French, and driving them with great slaughter on the 27th Sept. we have full confidence that we shall completely overthrow them."

"ST. JOHN'S, N. F. NOV. 1.

"I informed you of the action of the 27th Sept. in Portugal—it is currently reported here, that a general one was fought on the 28th—that the French were defeated—and lost 10,000 men, including two Generals."

"ST. JOHN'S, N. F. NOV. 1.

"We had an arrival vellerday from Portugal, by which, fome glorious news was received—An army (with the exception of two British regiments one of which was the 88th) composed of Portuguese troops, defeated a French army of 80,000 men—6000 of them were killed, among whom was a General Officer—another of his rank was wounded, neither of which, however, was Massen—the 88th loss a Masjor, and sourteen other officers of inferior grades—The slaughter was great—the Portuguese gave no quarters—We loss 600 men—it was expected a general engagement would take place the 2d October."
