

LONDON, JULY 26.
REVOLUTION IN HOLLAND.

The accounts from Holland are most melancholy. No doubt now remains of the destruction of that State. While hopes of Peace with England remained, Bonaparte was measured, in his conduct, from an opinion of the interests of this country being connected with those of the Dutch.

Having gradually squeezed them of all the money he could possibly obtain, it is now his aim to precipitate a national bankruptcy, to free the country from its debts previously to its incorporation with France. Not only this measure is announced, but he insists on introducing the French Custom houses and the Conscription.

Fifteen thousand French troops entered Amsterdam on the 4th, preparatory to Bonaparte's plans—King Louis offered to the Dutch to defend the city by military force; but the chief persons declined, saying the City would not only be destroyed, but it would soon be starved into submission. Bonaparte's object is to take absolute possession of the whole sea coast to Denmark.

The letters from Holland to the 8th inst, communicate some intelligence, which, if accurate, serves to throw some light on the motives of the abdication of King Louis. It is, that his Ex-Majesty had secretly departed from the seat of Government. He was supposed to have gone to Tonnigen, where a vessel was in readiness to convey him to America. Such a step would argue either an extreme dread of his brothers displeasure, or the most confirmed disgust towards his politics and projects.—These letters also state, that the abdication was wholly without the concurrence or privity of Bonaparte.

A Mail from Heligoland has arrived, bringing Hamburg Papers to the 29th ult. The French garrison in that city suddenly broke up a few days before, and marched towards Holland. The troops supposed that Spain was their ultimate destination; not being apprized of the change that was intended in the Dutch Government. Under the head of Vienna news, mention is made of an immense Austrian army, that is proceeding to Hungary, and the Turkish frontiers. We feel inclined to doubt the accuracy of this statement.

French troops are about to enter the Prussian dominions. The crime committed by the King of Prussia, in the encouragement he is supposed to have given to British traders, admits of no palliation in the eyes of Bonaparte, and his name is likely soon to be erased from the catalogue of Princes.

I do, by and with the advice and consent of His MAJESTY'S Council, publish this Proclamation, hereby authorizing and permitting Scantling, Planks, Staves, Heading, Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort; Horses, Neat-Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Pease, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley, or Grain of any sort, to be imported into this Province by British Subjects, in British built Ships, owned and navigated according to Law, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, for and during the term of Six Months from this date: And of this Proclamation all Persons whom it may concern will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
