**BOSTON, February 28.**  
*Madame Bonaparte Divorced.*—Capt. Turner of the Amazon, informs us that his Imperial Majesty, Napoleon the 1st, has at length divorced his wife. He adds that the official statement, or letter addressed to the public, announcing the fact, had been published at Toningen before he sailed.  
 Extract of a letter dated Hamburg, Jan. 5, 1810, received per the Amazon, Capt. Turner.  
 "The attachment which the Danish government laid a short time ago, on all the goods warehoused on the Holstein territory, has for the present reduced business to a state of total inactivity. This measure has been taken in order to make further researches after English goods, and it is not doubted that the American property will be respected as before."

**BALTIMORE, FEBRUARY 16.**  
*Late arrival at Norfolk.*—A friend has furnished us with a Liverpool circular letter of 11 and 12th Dec.—It contains the speech of Bonaparte to the Legislative body, in which he declares, that "changes will become necessary in Holland." The Circular also refers to a letter from Bonaparte to the Russian Emperor dated 10th Oct. in which he says:—"The United States are on the worst terms with England, and seem disposed seriously and sincerely to approximate to our system." Commerce in our produce had become inactive at Liverpool, owing to the uncertainty of affairs with the United States.

**From WASHINGTON, February 21.**  
**MACON'S BILL.**  
 "The bill called 'MACON'S' has this day been awakened from its slumber in the Senate. After some observations, General SMITH moved, That all the restrictions on Commerce in the Bill, (and which gave it the aspect of a Navigation Act) be struck out. The question on this motion was taken, without debate, and carried:  
 "For the motion - - - - - 16  
 Against it - - - - - 11  
 "The bill now only provides for the total repeal of the Non-INTERCOURSE LAW, the bastard progeny of the Embargo; and for the prohibition of the entrance of foreign armed vessels into our waters. The bill was then ordered to a first reading; and will pass. It is the general opinion here, that the bill as amended in the Senate will pass the House without much opposition; and soon become a law."  
 Since preparing the above, we have seen a letter from a member of Congress, dated "Washington, February 22," which says, "MACON'S bill, that has made so much noise has, this day, in the Senate, been divelled of all its deleterious commercial restrictions, and those sections only retained and enacted that interdict French and English vessels of war from our waters, and that repeals the Non-Intercourse Law.—It passed in this form, 26 to 7. It has already made its appearance in the House of Representatives; and although many of the violent sucklers for Embargo are opposed to it, I think it will eventually pass."
