

LONDON, JUNE 28.

THE DUKE OF KENT.—His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent has just published a declaration, by which we are rejoiced to find, that his name was most unwarrantably used in the secret conferences against his Royal Highness the Duke of York; that, on the contrary, he was entirely ignorant of the proceedings, and so far from having countenanced the measures adopted to ruin his Royal Brother, his Royal Highness frequently expressed the deepest regret upon the subject.

Private letters from various parts of the Continent contain many curious reports, that necessarily will be received with great distrust, although for many of them there may be some foundation. An opinion is very prevalent in Paris, that in revisiting Spain, Napoleon will be accompanied by Ferdinand, whose restoration to the throne, from whence he so weakly withdrew, is anticipated as the consequence of his expected nuptials with a female of Napoleon's family.

The first step taken after Bonaparte's return to the capital, was to dismiss Fouche from his tremendous office of Minister of Police, appointing him however to the Government of Rome. Fouche is not pleased with his being removed from the Police department. He resigns himself to his Majesty's pleasure with regret—he experiences a very painful sensation in removing from him, because he loses the happiness and the information which he derived from his daily converse with him. He gives, with an affected humility, to his services the epithet of feeble.

There are a great number of Cardinals in Paris, in a state of virtual confinement, as none of them on any occasion can obtain permission to leave the capital. They are allowed pensions of 30 000 livres (1200l.) a year each, in lieu of the immense revenues of which they have been robbed.

General Rigaud has been sent by Bonaparte to St. Domingo, with a view of establishing a footing or interest in that Island, either by rendering one or other of the rival chiefs dependent on him, by proffers of assistance, or by creating a third party, in opposition to both. Rigaud had arrived at Port au Prince in April, and had opened a negotiation with Petion.

A private letter from Paris, dated the 1st inst. states, that the Pope's confinement in the fortrefs of Savonna has been rendered so severe, that even the servants who attended him from Italy are denied access to him. His Holiness subsists on the common gaol allowance, having refused to receive a monthly sum of money offered to him by Bonaparte.

A French General and his black servant came out of Boulogne, in an open boat early on Monday morning last, and were picked up by one of our men of war, and carried into the Downs to the Admiral, who sent them to Dover to our Agent for prisoners.—The name of the above officer is Sarazin; some accounts assert that he is invested with a diplomatic character, others that he is a mere fugitive, having effected his escape to avoid the vengeance of Bonaparte's displeasure, who issued orders for his arrest. He was second in command at Boulogne, and served under General Humbert in the French expedition which landed at Killala, during the Irish rebellion of 1798. He throws himself on the protection of our Government; and having received permission from the Foreign Office, came up to town the next day.

A PROCLAMATION.

BY Virtue of the Power and Authority granted to me in and by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North-America and in the West-India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West-Indies." I do, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, publish this Proclamation, hereby authorizing and permitting Seantling, Planks, Staves, Heading, Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort; Horses, Neat-Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Pease, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley, or Grain of any sort, to be imported into this Province by British Subjects, in British built Ships, owned and navigated according to Law, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, for and during the term of Six Months from this date: And of this Proclamation all Persons whom it may concern will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
