

LONDON, APRIL 6.

We have received Cadiz papers to the 21st, and Lisbon to the 26th last, from which we have made the following extracts:—

CADIZ, MARCH 20.

The weather seems at last settled. We are cloathing and organizing our army; and it would be desirable to see it augmented by a few more British Regiments.

LISBON, MARCH 19.

We have no official intelligence, nor have we received any Gazette from Cadiz; but we have reason to believe that the operations in March have been more important than they were in February, and their results much more advantageous to the cause of the liberty of the peninsula.—The stay of the French cannot be long.

By the last accounts from Cadiz, Salamanca, and the other places, we find that the French Generals send to France all the inhabitants who will not take the oath of fidelity to the pretended King, rather chusing to see the towns deserted than to leave any who might oppose their wicked designs.

Letters from Elvas, of the date of the 14th inst. state, that in the vicinity of that city, and within the distance of ten leagues, the Portuguese, English, and Spanish forces, exceed 50,000 men; and that the French in Spanish Estremadura did not exceed 12,000, the whole of which were in Merida and its vicinity.

MARCH 21.

All accounts received from different parts of Spain, tend to confirm and increase our hopes.—The enemy has not only made no new attempts, but appears to be retiring from most of the positions he occupied; and in all the places thus set free, the spirit of insurrection in favour of the good cause immediately manifests itself, thus augmenting the force of the Spanish armies, and propagating and extending in every other part where the Spaniards can breath free from oppression, those patriotic sentiments which fear had for a time appeared to have stifled. In some places only a few of the French have been able to escape, the greater part of them having been assassinated by the inhabitants.

LISBON, MARCH 22.

All the account, received by the Mail of yesterday, confirm the intelligence we had before, that the French had evacuated Malaga, Morvela, Esterpona, Tanfa, San Roque, and Algeiras.

BAYONNE, MARCH 17.

Every thing is prepared for the siege of Cadiz: that of Lerida will also soon commence. Yesterday a great quantity of heavy artillery and ammunition was forwarded from hence. A corps of mariners, who were employed in the last war on the Danube, has passed through this town for Spain. Officers of the engineers and artillery are also constantly passing. Twenty squadrons of gendarmie have marched through for Spain, and it appears they are destined to serve in the interior of that country. General Count Suchet, is gone to Valencia. It appears that the robbers, who had rendered the roads insecure, are cut off, or reduced, for the couriers arrive in safety.

HAMBURGH, MARCH 22.

General Kalkreuth has returned to Berlin from Paris, whither he had been sent on a particular mission, to congratulate the Emperor Napoleon. People here expect the best results from this mission.—The letters from Petersburg afford every proof of the continuance of friendly relations between the Courts of Petersburg and France.

PARIS, MARCH 25.

The Emperor received, several times in the course of this day, telegraphic intelligence relative to the Empress.—Her Majesty arrived in Strasburgh on the 22d inst. at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. She was to take her departure from thence on the 24th, and stop the night at Luneville. Her Majesty enjoyed the best state of health.

Count Clary, Lord Chamberlain of the Empress of Austria, was presented to the Emperor in Compeigne, and delivered to his Majesty letters from the Emperor and Empress of Austria.

His Highness the Prince of Neuchatel is expected here on the 28th inst. The robe in which the Empress is to appear at the festival of the marriage is so uncommonly magnificent as to beggar all description. It is embroidered all over with diamonds, and the intervals are filled with Malines lace; its value is estimated at 500,000 francs (about £22,000 sterling.) It is supposed that their Majesties intend to proceed from St. Cloud to the Thuilleries, through the wood of Boulogne, along the road of Neuilly to the above palace.

It is certain that the civil marriage of the Emperor will take place on the 31st of March, at St. Cloud, the religious ceremony on the 1st of April, at Paris. On the 31st March, and the 2d of April, the Theatres will be open, gratis.

PROCLAMATION FOR PARDONING DESERTERS FROM HIS MAJESTY'S LAND FORCES.

WAR-OFFICE, Office, October 24, 1809

WHEREAS it has been most humbly submitted to the KING, whether on the joyful occasion of His Majesty's entering into the fiftieth year of his reign, it might not be desirable to distinguish so memorable an epoch by an act of grace to all deserters; and his Majesty having graciously approved of his free pardon being extended to all such deserters from his Land Forces as shall deliver themselves up within two months from the 25th instant, these are publicly to declare his Majesty's benevolent intention; and to direct that all deserters surrendering themselves to the Commanding Officer of any Regiment, or to any of the Superintending Field-Officers of the Recruiting Service, whose Stations are mentioned in the margin hereof; to the Commandant of the Army Depot in the Isle of Wight; or, where there is no Military Post, to a Magistrate, shall be pardoned, and they are hereby pardoned accordingly.

Such Deserters, if from the Regular Forces, being able-bodied men, and fit for Service, shall be sent to the Regiments from which they respectively deserted, or be appointed to such Regiments in the United Kingdom as His Majesty may be pleased to command; and when so placed, shall not be liable to be claimed by any other corps to which they may formerly have belonged; and if from the Militia, shall be sent to the Regiments to which they respectively belonged, &c. &c. &c.

His Majesty has further been pleased to direct, that Deserters now actually in confinement as such, shall have the benefit of this his Royal Pardon.
