dispatch of the 29th of January, (which formed but one part of his instructions to me) in the formal manner required, I considered that it would be in vain to lay before the government of the United States the dispatch in question, which I was at liberty to have done in extenso, had I thought proper. — But as I had such strong grounds for believing that the object of his Majesty's government could be attained, though in a different manner, and the spirit, at least, of my several letters of instruction be fully complied with, I felt a thorough conviction upon my mind, that I should be acting in conformity with his Majesty's wishes, and accordingly concluded the late provisional agreement on his Majesty's behalf with the government of the United States.
"The disavowal by his Majesty is a painful proof to me that I had formed an erroneous judgment of his Majesty's views and the intention of my instructions; and I have most severely to lament that an act of mine (though unintentionally) should produce any embarrassment in the relations between the two countries."

NEW-YORK, DECEMBER 14.

Latest from Lisbon.—By the Ship St. Lawrence, Capt. Dunbar, in 41 days from Lisbon, which port she left on the 2d of November, we learn verbally, that about 150 sail of British transports lay in the Tagus, 50 of which had recently arrived—that no battle had lately taken place between the British and French armies; and that it was reported that Bonaparte was marching an army of 100,000 men into Spain; that the British troops had evacuated Bilbao; and that no fresh troops had lately arrived from England.

RUPTURE WITH MR. JACKSON.

The Resolution approving the conduct of the Executive in refusing to receive any further communication from Mr. Jackson, the British Minister, was read a third time; and, without debate, on the motion of Mr. Goodrich, was decided by yeas and nays as follows:—Yeas 20—Nays 4.

LONDON, NOVEMBER 9.

An expedition has sailed from Malta, the object of which is differently stated—some suppose it to be destined to take possession of the Seven Islands, which are said to have shown symptoms of revolt—others imagine that it is gone to take possession of some of the Greek Islands, with the concurrence of the Turkish Government.

NOVEMBER 10.

Expectations are entertained in France that the Americans will make common cause with France and the northern powers against this country.—The following observations are extracted from a recent number of a periodical work published at Paris, the political part of which is under the direction of a member of the Senate:—

"In fact, the peace with Russia is but the happy prelude to that which is about to unite all the Northern flags, like a fasces, against that flag which pretends to keep them all in a state of humiliation. It is beyond a doubt that Sweden will treat with Denmark, with Prussia, and obtain from France oblivion of the past. On their side, the United States approximate as much as possible the powers of the North by bringing as a first guarantee of their amicable dispositions, the resentment which has been produced by the conduct of England towards them.—Their Ambassador to Russia is arrived at Copenhagen. The Americans do more—they have rejected the English Minister Mr. Jackson.

From HALIFAX, December 26.

The American Congress was convened the 29th ult.—The President's Message alludes to the arrangement entered into with Mr. Erskine, and of His Majesty's disavowal of it—of the recal of Mr. Erskine, and appointment of Mr. Jackson—and says: that "From the first official disclosures of the new minister, it was found that he had received no authority to enter into explanations relative to either branch of the arrangement disavowed; nor any authority to substitute proposals, as to that branch which concerned the British Orders in Council: and finally, that his proposals with respect to the other branch, the attack on the frigate Chesapeake, were founded on a presumption, repeatedly declared to be inadmissible by the United States, that the first step towards adjustment was due from them—the proposals at the same time, omitting even a reference to the officer answerable for the murderous aggression, and asserting a claim not less contrary to the British laws, and British practice, than to the principles and obligations of the United States."

DECEMBER 29.

The New-York papers received since our last, contain a few articles extracted from London papers to the 12th Nov.

"The Englishman," a London Sunday paper of Nov. 12, is said to contain intelligence of the destruction of a French convoy, from Toulon for Barcelona. Two ships of war, one of 90 and the other of 84 guns, are said to have been driven on shore, and blown up. The explosion was heard at Nismes, 8 leagues distant—and the news was confirmed by way of Hamburg and Amsterdam.

The same paper states, that a convocation of Cardinals was speedily to be held at Paris, for the double purpose (as is supposed) of conferring the Papal dignity on Cardinal FESCH, and divorcing the Emperor from his present wife; who, it is added, is to be succeeded by a daughter of the King of Saxony.—N. York paper, Dec. 15.

The treaty between France and Austria having been finally signed and ratified—the Emperor Francis was preparing to return to Vienna—He loses several large slices from his dominions particularly to the Emperor of Russia, a tract in the Eastern part of Galicia, with a population of about 400,000 souls—He accedes, of course, to the prohibitory system against England, during the present maritime war. We observe, however, with pleasure, an article of amnesty for the brave inhabitants (insurgents they are called) of the Tyrol and Vorarlberg—And thus, there is to be peace, and "friendship," between the conquerors and conquered—"forever."

The Secretary of the American Treasury, has given a melancholy statement of the finances—That, even on the peace establishment, a loan of 400,000 dollars will be required.

The American frigate John Adams, had sailed for England with dispatches—and with 100,000 dollars in specie for Holland; being six months interest on the Dutch loan to the United States.
