**THE SUM OF RELIGION.**

Written by JUDGE HALE, Lord Chief Justice of England, and was found in the Closet amongst his other Papers, after his decease.

He that fears the LORD, of Heaven and Earth, walks humbly before Him, thankfully lays hold of the Message of Redemption by JESUS CHRIST, and strives to express his Thankfulness by the sincerity of his Obedience.—He is sorry with all his Soul, when he comes short of his duty. He walks watchfully in the Denial of himself, and holds no Confederacy with any Lust, or known Sin; if he falls in the least Measure he is restless till he has made his Peace by true Repentance. He is true to his Promises, just in his dealings, charitable to the Poor, sincere in his Devotion.—He will not deliberately dishonour God, although secure of Impunity. He hath his Hopes and his Conversation in Heaven, and dares not do any thing unjustly, be it ever so much his Advantage; and all this, because he sees Him that is invisible and fears him because he loves him; fears him as well for his Goodness as his Greatness.—Such a Man, whether he be an EPISCOPALIAN or a PRESBYTERIAN, an INDEPENDENT or an ANABAPTIST; whether he wears a Surplice, or wears none; whether he hears Organs, or hears none; whether he kneels at the communion, or for Conscience sake stands, or sits, he hath the life of Religion in him; and that Life acts in him, and will conform his Soul to the Image of his SAVIOUR, and go along with him to Eternity, notwithstanding his Practice, or Non-practice of things indifferent. On the other side, if a man fears not the eternal GOD, he can commit Sin with Presumption; drink excessively, swear vainly or falsely, commit adultery, lie, cozen, cheat, break his Promise, live loosely, though at the same Time he may be studious to practise every Ceremony, even to a scrupulous Exactness, or may perhaps as stubbornly oppose them. Though such an one should cry down Bishops, or Presbytery; though he should be rebaptized every Day, or declaim against it as Heresy; and though he fast all the lent, or fast out of Pretence of avoiding Superstition; yet notwithstanding these, and a thousand external Conformities, or zealous Oppositions of them, he wants the LIFE OF RELIGION.

**SPECIMEN OF A CALCUTTA HOAX.**

Some time ago a most wonderful and affecting story was brought for insertion in the Mirror, in which it was affirmed, that an Alligator had for some time preceding, infested the River, close to a public ghant, in the vicinity of Kerdah, much frequented by Hindoo females, many of whom were carried off by this Alligator. At length, in an attempt to make prize of a strapping Nymph from Balafore, the Alligator caught a Tartar—the moment this heroine was seized, she was conscious that she was assailed by something more like the hands of a man, than the teeth of an Alligator; and resolutely plunging her arms under water, she seized the assailant, and bellowing out for assistance, the monster was secured, brought on shore, and being uncafed, proved to be a young Fisherman, who, adding to other qualities that of an expert diver, and being ingeniously masked as a huge Alligator, had personated his amphibious character, with great dexterity and success, until he was fortunately caught, and delivered over to justice.—This Fisherman had two or three associates, on board a dingy, moored in the river, at some little distance from the ghant, who, from having communication by ropes, under water, with the pretended Alligator, retained the bodies of the females, of whom he had made prey in a convenient situation beneath the surface, and at leisure stripped them of their most precious ornaments, to acquire which was the sole object of the parties.

No less than 18 women were reported to have been thus carried off.—The story was minutely related, and all its parts so well adjusted, as to form a consistent whole. Yet still it appeared upon close inspection so monstrous and improbable as naturally to excite doubts of its truth, and being desirous to ascertain on what foundation it rested, before publishing it, we had the satisfaction to find upon enquiry, that the whole was a fabrication, contrived by some native Bengalese wits, who in imitation of the practice of certain wits of a different complexion, delight to amuse themselves with the credulity of their neighbours.—The hoax succeeded, the whole country for many leagues around, re-echoed for a week or more, with nothing but the wicked ingenuity of the masked Alligator and his fortunate capture; and some hundreds of people travelled many a mile to see the human Koomer and the Beebere of Balafore.—*Calcutta Journal.*

**Ghost of a Dog.**—The following whimsical story is from a Dublin paper:—"A circumstance, attended with curious but we fear, fatal consequences, has lately occurred in this city. A child, belonging to an old woman, who lives in Wine-tavern street, was some time since, scratched by a dog, who, from residing in the neighbourhood, used occasionally to visit her apartment. Although the injury done was very trivial, the mother viewed it as such a flagrant breach of hospitality, that nothing would satisfy her but the offender's life. A positive refusal to this awful retribution being made by the owner, she applied to a Magistrate, for an order for his execution; which having obtained, he was suspended over the Coal-quay wall, and, having hung a considerable time, was cut down, and dropped in the river. Some friends of the deceased, however, contrived to take the body away privately; and having placed it in hot althes, poured spirits and milk down the throat; applied bottles of hot water to the soles of the feet, and adopted other means recommended for restoring suspended animation, their efforts so far succeeded, that the dog was, in about three weeks, able to run about as usual. The first use he made of his new animation, was to see his old friends; but having run into the old woman's apartments, as he was wont to do, she was so terrified, having believed him dead, that she fell into fits, and now lies so dangerously ill that fears are entertained for her life.

**A PROCLAMATION.**

BY Virtue of the Power and Authority granted to me in and by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of His MAJESTY'S Reign, intitled "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His MAJESTY'S Colonies and Plantations in North-America and in the West-India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His MAJESTY'S said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West-Indies." I do, by and with the advice and consent of His MAJESTY'S Council, publish this Proclamation, hereby authorizing and permitting Scantling, Planks, Staves, Headings, Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort; Horses, Neat-Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Pease, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley, or Grain of any sort, to be imported into this Province by British Subjects, in British built Ships, owned and navigated according to Law, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, for and during the term of Six Months from this date: And of this Proclamation all Persons whom it may concern will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
