

that cause, or pay into the Court where the same cause is depending, all the rent and arrears, together with the costs, then and in such case all further proceedings on the said judgment, shall cease and be discontinued; and if such lease or leases, his, her, or their executors, administrators, or assigns, shall, upon such bill filed as aforesaid, be relieved in equity, he, she, or they, shall have, hold, and enjoy the demised lands according to the lease thereof made, without any new lease to be thereof made to him, her, or them.

XXV. And whereas the expenses attending the process in suing out Replevin in the Courts of Record in cases of trespasses, by horses, neat cattle, sheep, goats and swine, where the value of the damages does not exceed forty shillings, should be prevented.

Be it further enacted, That in all cases where a trespass or supposed trespass shall have been committed by horses, neat cattle, sheep, goats, or swine, and the value of the damages alleged to be suffered, shall not exceed the sum of forty shillings, the same shall be heard and tried by one Justice of the Peace, in the same manner as in cases of debt to that amount.

XXVI. And be it further enacted, That in all such cases as aforesaid, where it may become necessary, any Justice of the Peace in the County, shall grant a Replevin, and take security for prosecuting the same with effect within a term not exceeding seven days, which Replevin shall be directed to a Constable of the Parish in which the fault is to be made, and shall be in the form following, to wit—

You are hereby commanded to replevy to A. B. his which C. D. unjustly as is alleged detains, under pretence of having committed a trespass not exceeding forty shillings; and also to summon the said C. D. to be, and appear before me on the day of at o'clock in the noon, then to answer such things as shall be objected against him by the said A. B.—Witness my hand and seal this day of

And shall hear the merits of the case between the parties, and shall give judgment, and grant execution, as in other cases to the same amount, and shall receive no more, nor greater fees, than in such other cases as aforesaid.

XXVII. And be it further enacted, That the Clerk's Courts in the several and respective Counties, and the City Court in the City of Saint John, shall have the like Powers as are given in the two last preceding Sections, to a Justice of the Peace, and shall and may proceed in the like cases, according to the form and course of proceedings in such Courts respectively.

From HALIFAX, May 7.

The Princess Amelia, Packet, Capt. Moorlorn, arrived yesterday, with the Mails from Falmouth, 26 days, bringing London papers to the 6th ult.

We lay before our readers in a preceding column, an article which announces the vote of the House of Commons, "for Sir Francis Burdett to be taken into the custody of the Serjeant at Arms and sent to the Tower." This circumstance originated in the first place, in a defence which Sir Francis had made in defence of a Mr. JOHN GALE JONES, who had been committed to Newgate, for what the House was pleased to consider Libellous practices, waged against some of the members of that body, filling other important situations in the affairs of state. Sir Francis having urged the irregularity of the proceeding of the House, in the case of this man, had moved his discharge, which was negatived, upon which Sir Francis published a letter in Cobbet's paper, addressed to his constituents, with arguments annexed. What has been deemed the most obnoxious in the many pointed passages in this publication, is the following extract from the arguments, and is said "to substantiate all complaint."

"But no wonder when they have so entirely departed from the ends of their institution, as was offered to be proved by Mr. MADDOCKS, and acknowledged by themselves in the never to be forgotten morning of the 11th of May, 1809, when being the lower or inferior (for it is the same sense, one being an English, the other a Latin word) branch of Legislature, they have been the proprietors by burgage tenure of the whole representation, and in that capacity inflated with their high-flown fanciful ideas of Majesty, and tricked out in the trappings of royalty, think privilege and protection beneath their dignity, assume the sword of prerogative, and lord it equally over the King, and the people."

After the lengthy examination of the Walcheren expedition in the House of Commons, which has engaged so much of the time of that body, we find that Lord Porchester after recapitulating many of the points of evidence, in a very lengthy speech, moved a string of resolutions, the last of which is as follows, and may be deemed the essence of the whole—"7th. That such the conduct of His Majesty's advisers, deserves the severest censures of this House."—After a lengthy debate on the adoption of the resolutions, which continued for two days, a division took place—Majority for Ministers 48.

The American frigate, John Adams, which has been waiting at Cowes for dispatches from Mr. Pinkney, the American Minister, failed the 1st ult.

LONDON, APRIL 2.

Never circumstances occurred more prejudicial to the well-founded hopes of the country, and more conducive to the ultimate escape of the Walcherenites, than the ill-timed letter of Sir Francis Burdett. Every sensible man sees with pain, the avidity with which Ministers lay hold of it, to divert public attention from their own forsaken condition, at this crisis of their fate. We do trust, however, that an occurrence of a nature so infinitely subordinate to the Parliamentary decision upon the guilt of those who have involved their country in such unprecedented calamity by the Expedition to the Scheldt, will not be suffered to absorb one particle of that interest, which is exclusively due to the highest subject. Sincerely do we regret that such a circumstance should have taken place at such a period. It is indeed most *mal-a-propos*; but let it be observed, whatever handle ministers may please to make of it, (and we have no doubt that they will make the best, for little minds are dexterous in availing themselves of paltry expedients,) yet still is the Walcheren question totally unconnected with, and unaltered by it. This is the arrow which is still ranking in the heart of the country; whilst those who have lodged it there, have an unlucky occasion afforded them of directing the cry and turning the pursuit to other objects.

APRIL 6.

SIR FRANCIS BURDETT ORDERED TO BE SENT TO THE TOWER.

The debate of Sir FRANCIS BURDETT'S letter was resumed yesterday, in the House of Commons. At the early hour of ten o'clock, the avenues were blocked up, by a great crowd, eager for admittance; and, the moment the doors were opened, the gallery was filled almost to suffocation. Few instances have occurred of so great a crowd and pressure, but no accident happened. The lobbies remained crowded during the whole of the night, and an extraordinary number of Constables were on duty, to preserve order. A corps of the Horse Guards, we understand, were under orders, to act, if necessary, in case of any tumult or disorder. The debate lasted until half past seven this morning, when, on the motion of Sir Robert Salusbury, Sir Francis Burdett was ordered to be sent to the Tower, by a majority of 38. There were very few strangers about the House when it adjourned.—Sir Robert Salusbury is a Member for Brecon, in Wales.

We understand that the Serjeant at Arms was then ordered to take Sir F. Burdett into custody.

Sir F. Burdett, and his brother, were during the debate, in the vicinity of the House of Commons. They afterwards went to the Baronet's house in Picadilly.

Orders were sent to the Tower, this morning, to prepare a room for his reception.
