LONDON, AUGUST 4.

A proclamation from the Royal Chamber (Consulado) of Commerce of Cadiz has been addressed to the Merchants. of that City, dated the 4th ult. in which, after having demonstrated to them the facred ties and reciprocal duties exilling between the State and the Citizens, which oblige them both to affift each other in their urgencies it places under their eyes the fituation in which the perfidy of the French Government has involved them, and draws as the consequence, that the greatest efforts are to be made by them to extricate themselves from it. It proceeds to shew, that without great fums the war cannot effectually be carried on, and that in consequence of the existing wants, the Supreme Junta of Seville addressed the Royal Chamber of Commerce on the 30th of June, directing them to open a voluntary loan of two millions of hard dollars, at the most favourable premiums, the Supreme Junta binding themfelves to pay capital and interest in two years, and in two equal payments, out of the revenues of the Customs of Cadiz, expecting that the loyal inhabitants of Cadiz, who had thewn themselves so liberal in far less pressing circumstances, would now come forward, notwithstanding the state of depression in which commerce had been so long plunged .--The Chamber of Commerce therefore, in virtue of the powers granted them by the Junta, declared the opening of the loan, allowing 12 per cent, per ann. interest, and the interest to be paid every fix months. They further pledged themselves, that if the payments could be made sooner, it should be done. The Proclamation concludes by expresfing the necessity of such a loan, and that if sacrifices were now to be made, they would contribute to prevent much greater ones, which would certainly take place, should the enemies of their country succeed in their unprincipled attack.

CANINE SYMPATHY .- The following Narrative is given by a gentleman of respectability, living at Stoke Green, near Windfor:-

"On Wednesday last my groom went to Windsor on horseback, accompanied by three dogs, two pointers, and a terrier; on his return, within about half a mile of home, the horse on which he rode took fright, threw him, and ran home, attended by two of the dogs, the terrier and one pointer; the appearance of the horse at home without the man, naturally excited in the hearts of the other fervants an apprehension that some accident had befallen him, and two of them, a man and woman, went in quest of him; after searching in vain about two hours in the lane which is in the direct road from hence to Windfor, they were induced to look into the cross road, whither they went through a field; whilst in the field, the man called the groom's name aloud, which was answered by the barking of a dog. The woman observing that the thought it the voice of the dog which had not come home, they directed their course to the spot whence the voice proceeded. As foon as they got into the lane, they descried a dog at a distance making towards them, which proved to be the very dog. Upon coming up to them, he discovered alternate symptoms of joy and uneasiness, and ran before them, as if desirous of shewing them the cause. They followed, when lo! he conducted them to the spot where lay the man in a ditch by the road fide,

apparently lifeless. They dragged him along home, and laid him in a bed, the dog flaying with him the whole time, and by a whining noise discovering his anxiety. The perfons who were in the room made several attempts to turn the dog out, but without success; they were at length so won by the creature's manners, that they allowed him to remain, when he at length placed himself on the man's bed, and watched him with the most painful anxiety, and as he groaned, so did the dog mourn, proportioning the height duration of his voice to that of the man; nor did he quit the bed until twelve o'clock of the following day, when the man seemed restored to his fenses! What is more remarkable is, that from the time he was laid upon the bed, the man was alternately affected with a stupor or total insenfibility, and a most ungovernable frenzy, and in the latter state directed his violence to the poor animal, treating him most unmercifully, but the dog would not leave him."
