MONITOR.

There is hardly any propensity, which without being numbered in the list of crimes, is at once more common and more injurious to society, than that of malignant censure.—This is a propensity, which secretly lurks in our most familiar circles, which mingles itself with our most friendly intercourse, and, finding constant opportunities for indulgence it imperceptibly settles into an inveterate, unyielding habit. It delights to spy the trivial failings of a neighbor, to mark his little singularities, to pervert his doubtful expressions, or to give a meaning to his most insignificant looks. It watches those moments of easy freedom, when our lips and conduct are the least upon the guard, and carefully treasures all, that passes, in the storehouse of memory, to be summoned into use at the first favorable opportunity. It even basely employs the confidence of friendship to gratify its malicious designs. Those who most indulge this propensity, soon become hardened to all regard for their neighbor's character, and if they but obtain for themselves a reputation for wit, they are utterly indifferent to every other effect. As detraction and ridicule never want language to display their bitterness, they generally employ the most glowing and exaggerated colors; though perhaps the very failings, on which they love chiefly to dwell are those, which every one else perceives to be most conspicuous in themselves. But either their pride keeps them in total ignorance, or if their self-knowledge rises a little higher they hope to force the censure which they are conscious of deserving by raising their own voices in loud and bitter invectives against their neighbors.

But this we may safely assert is not the temper which our religion enjoins. Christianity continually warns us to turn from the faults of our neighbors, to the observance and correction of our own. It forbids us rashly to judge of others; but commands us to place all our jealousy and watchfulness upon ourselves. It enforces the duty of friendly admonition; but condemns as utterly opposed to its amiable spirit every envious or malignant censure. Could we behold the hearts of our fellow creatures, no doubt the virtue we so highly praise, the failings we ridicule, or the crimes we abhor, would often appear in very different forms. Perhaps the goodness we think so perfect and which we are ready to extol to Heaven, would then be seen mingled with much of selfish or polluted passion, while the crime, which now glares upon us with such enormity, would appear to have been committed with tardy unwillingness, with heart-rending compunction. These secret feelings, it is true, cannot be known to the world, I therefore ought not on the one hand to silence the praise, that is due to virtue, nor prevent on the other the arm of justice from falling on the criminal.—If however the alloy, which, though unseen by us, is mingled with the goodness we praise, will deduct from the glory of its future reward; and if the secret remorse, with which the worst crimes may have been committed, will serve to abate the rigors of divine justice, we certainly should be cautious not to extol too high any human virtue, nor to reproach too bitterly any sinning brother.—No human moralist has given us a better precept nor has the bard of Scotland in all his verse a nobler sentiment than this:—

"Who made the heart 'tis he alone
Decidedly can try us;
He knows each chord—its various tone,
Each spring—its various bias."
"Then at the balance let's be mute—
We never can adjust it;
What done, we partly may compute,
But know not what's resisted."

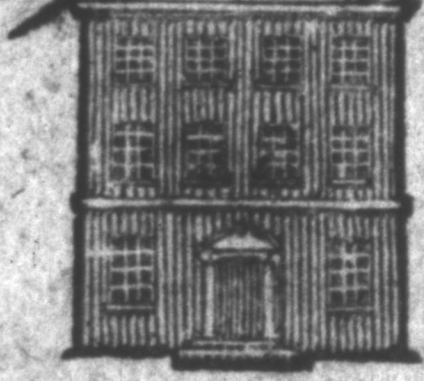
A PROCLAMATION.

BY Virtue of the Power and Authority granted to me in and by an Act of Parliament made and passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of His MAJESTY'S Reign, intituled "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His MAJESTY'S Colonies and Plantations in North-America and in the West-India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His MAJESTY'S said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West-Indies." I do, by and with the advice and consent of His MAJESTY'S Council, publish this Proclamation, hereby authorizing and permitting Scantling, Planks, Staves, Heading, Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort; Horses, Neat-Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Pease, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley, or Grain of any sort, to be imported by British Subjects in British built Ships, owned by His MAJESTY'S Subjects, and navigated according to Law, from any of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, for and during the term of SIX MONTHS from the first day of July next:—And of this Proclamation all Persons whom it may concern will take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
