BALTIMORE, NOVEMBER 2.

A gentleman recently arrived from Buenos Ayres, informs us that Don Balihar de Cisneros, vice king of that province, appointed by the Supreme Junta of Spain had arrived there a short time before his departure, and had rigidly interdicted foreigners, (English as well as others) trading to that province; and it was expected that he would order away all those who had not become regularly Spanish subjects.

Liners and the Marquis of Sobremont the two former vice kings, with several officers of different ranks, had orders to proceed to Spain in a frigate that was preparing for the purpose and to carry specie to the Junta.

Genera, Ellio, the governor of Monte Video continued in his command.

HALIFAX, NOVEMBER 17.

Arrived, Wednesday, H. M. sloop of war Driver, Captain Lawrence, from a cruise—and Opossum, Capt. Byam, from Portsmouth—In the evening the Thames, sloop, from Portsmouth, sailed under convoy of the Opossum.

We were, yesterday, politely favored with the perusal of London papers to the 8th and 10th ult. received by H. M. brig Opossum; and have hastily extracted the most interesting articles contained in them.

It will be seen, that although the Armistice between the Austrians and French was prolonged to the 20th September, there was little probability of its being followed by an amicable adjustment. Austria may, indeed, be finally compelled to submit to the imperious dictates of the Usurper; but even in that event, he will find it still necessary to keep a strong army on her frontiers.

A letter dated St. John's, Newfoundland, 23d ult. says—"We have letters of the 3d inst. from Oporto, which state, that the armies in Spain were inactive; the French had rather shewn a disposition to retreat, and leave that country. General Wellesley (Lord Wellington) had been considerably reinforced."

FOSTER HUTCHINSON, Esq. as Junior Counsel for the Crown, opened the pleadings, and gave a brief historic sketch of the origin and powers of Courts thus instituted for the trial of crimes committed on the high seas. The Solicitor General detailed, minutely all the dreadful circumstances of the case; and then proceeded to examine the evidence for the prosecution.

The examination of the two first witnesses, John Stairs, and Pigott, ended about half past 4 o'clock; when the Court adjourned until ten this morning.

ST. JOHN, N. B. 1st DECEMBER, 1809.

GENTLEMEN,  
I HAVE little or no claim to the honor you have conferred on me, in addressing me, on leaving this Province; the duties of my profession having led me to reside principally at the seat of Government, I have had fewer opportunities than I could have wished, of cultivating your acquaintance; but I should indeed be ungrateful, did I not acknowledge the many acts of friendship, and marked attention I have met with, on my visits to this City.

I can however, safely say, whenever employed in a public station, or whenever power has been placed in my hands, I have ever aimed at administering justice with impartiality. That my public conduct should have merited your approbation affords me the most heartfelt satisfaction. The temperate decisions of the Magistrates have materially contributed to preserve that harmony so strongly inculcated by His Majesty on his Subjects of every profession, and which has so happily subsisted between the Inhabitants of Fredericton and all ranks of the Regiment I had the honor to command.

THE zeal and alacrity displayed by the Militia, when they voluntarily tendered their services to be embodied in the hour of danger apprehended; proved their Loyalty, and claimed my attention; the exertions of their Officers, the ready obedience of the Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates, their exemplary conduct in quarters, and anxiety to receive instruction, soon ensured them a perfect state of discipline; and I feel happy in declaring, that fewer unpleasant circumstances occurred than I could possibly have ex-

pected in any similar occasion, even in the Mother Country. Be assured I quit your society and this Province with heartfelt sorrow, and nothing but the hopes of being more actively employed, would have induced me to leave you, or the Regiment I belong to; but should His Majesty be pleased to employ me hereafter in America, I will eagerly embrace any opportunity that offers of returning to this Colony; I shall always take a lively interest in whatever concerns you, and my poor services will be ever at your command.—I have the honor to be,
