At a COMMON COUNCIL holden at the CITY-HALL of the City of Saint John, on the nineteenth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nine, and in the forty-ninth year of His Majesty's Reign.

READ and ENACTED the following LAW:

A Law in addition to a Law, entitled "A Law to regulate the Fisheries within the limits of the City of St. John."

1st. WHEREAS it is necessary in order to preserve the breed of the different kinds of fish, resorting to the Harbor and River of Saint John, that some further restrictions and regulations should be adopted, in the mode carrying on the Fisheries in the said Harbor.—Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, in Common Council convened—That from and after the passing of this Law, no wear or fish garth of any kind or description, shall be erected or made use of, and no net or nets of any kind or description whatsoever, shall be set, placed or made use of for the purpose of catching Salmon, Shad, Herrings, or any other kind of Fish, or any obstruction to the free course of the Fish erected, within the limits of the said City of Saint John, below the Saw-Mills belonging to Messrs. John Black, & Co. on the western side of the Harbor of the said City, to the Eastward of a line drawn (and laid down on a plan on file in the Office of the Common Clerk of the said City) which line commences at a stake on the outer part of the bar, in front of the said mills, and runs South three degrees and forty-five minutes West, to the lower or westernmost point of Patridge-Island, under the penalty of ten pounds for each and every offence to be paid by the person or persons acting contrary to, or being guilty of a breach of or offence against the provision of this Law.

2dly. And be it further ordained, That no drift net shall be made use of in any way or manner whatsoever, for the purpose of catching Salmon, Shad or Herrings, or any other kind of fish below or to the Southward of a line drawn from Pagan's point, so called, to the said Saw Mills, under the penalty of ten pounds for each and every offence; to be forfeited and paid by the person or persons making use of any such drift net contrary to the provisions and true intent and meaning of this Law.

3dly. And be it further ordained, That no drift net shall be made use of for the purpose of catching Salmon, Shad, Herring or any other kind of fish, in any part of the said Harbor, which net shall be more than thirty fathoms in length, and that no drift net shall be made fast to another, but that each and every drift net shall be made use of separately and by itself; and that no drift net whatsoever shall be made use of for the purpose of catching fish in any part of the Harbor of the said City, in the current year, after the first day of June next, under the penalty of ten pounds for each and every offence, to be forfeited and paid by the person or persons making use of any such drift net contrary to the provisions and true intent and meaning of this Law.

4thly. And be it further ordained, That it shall be the duty of the directors of the Fishery, in the said City, and each of them, to seize and take up all, and every net or nets which be found set, placed, or made use of contrary to the true intent and meaning of this Law; and to prosecute all and every person or persons whom they shall know to have been guilty of any offence against a breach of this Law, or any of the provisions thereof, under the penalty of forty shillings for each and every offence, in so neglecting or refusing to discharge the duty hereby enjoined.

5thly. And be it further ordained, That the forfeitures and penalties imposed by virtue of this Law, shall and may be recovered upon oath of one or more credible witnesses or witnesses before the Mayor, Recorder, or any one of the Aldermen of the said City, and shall be levied by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of such offender or offenders, by warrant under the hand and seal of the said Mayor, Recorder, or any one of the Aldermen of the said City, to the use of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the said City, rendering the overplus if any, to the owner or owners thereof, the necessary charges of making and selling such distress being first deducted, one half of which forfeitures and penalties shall be paid into the hands of the Overseers of the Poor, for the use of the Poor of the said City, and the other half to such person as shall inform and sue for the same.
