for a change of linen, as his baggage was not come by the coach; from that he was refcued by the kindnels of the gun maker, who supplied his wants, and he was thewn to a room up flairs, and there changed his linen, and went out, to return in an hour. He did not keep his word, and on the lady of the house going up flairs, the milled a pair of curious pultols, and various other articles, befide the linen. He has not fince made his appearance to claim the two pair, which it is hardly necelfary to fay he did not pay for.

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BOSTON, JANUARY 24. CONSTITUTIONAL MEETING. Yefferday the Innabitants of this town affembled in Fanucil Hall, agreeably to legal notification illued on Friday lall.

"To take into confideration the alarming fituation of our public affairs, to express their folemn opinion thereon, to address the Legislature of this State (if they should see caufe) to interpose for their conflicational relief against the late arbitrary, unneceffary and unjust violations of the rights of the people ; and to take fuch other peaceable and orderly measures, as to the faid inhabitants might seem proper and expedient."

The enlarged Hall, supposed to be able to contain upwards of 4000 perfons, was thronged at an early hour .----STEPHEN CODMAN, Elq. was chulen Moderator. After the meeting was thus organized, Col. T. H. Perkins thus delivered his sentiments in a very impressive manner, on the prefent lituation of our Public Affairs; and concluded by offering the following Refolutions : "Whereas it is provided in the Declaration of Rights of this Commonwealth, that the people have a right in an orderly and peaceable manner, to affemble to confult upon their common good, give inflructions to their Reprefentatives, and to request of the Legislative Body; by the way of addresses, petitions or remonstrances, redress of the wrongs done them, and of the grievances they fuffer :----"Therefore, Refolved, as the fenfe of this Town, that we view with the deepeft concern, and aftonilhment the determination of the General Government, to perfevere in a system of Commercial Reflriction, which is equally repugnant to the true intent and defign of the Conflictution, and to the best interests of the Union; or to relax it, with a view only to a flate of hoffility, which must probably terminate in an unneceffary and ruinous War with Great-Britain, and fatal alliance with France; that having heretofore expielled our disapprobation of the Laws impoling an Embargo on commerce, and fignified to the conflituted authorivies of the Union our earnest with for their repeal, we perceive, with indignation and regret, that unprecedented, arbitrary and unconflicational means have been provided, for enforcing them, and that no refource remains to us but in the protection of our State Legislature. " Refolved, That a respectful petition be presented to the Legislature of this Commonwealth, expressive of these sentiments, and praying for their interpolition, to fave the people of this Commonwealth from the defiructive confequences which they apprehend to their liberties and property from the continuance of the prefent fyftem, and pledging the Inhabitants of this metropolis to support them with their lives and fortunes, in fuch measures as they may adopt for that purpole."

SAINT JOHN, February 20, 1809.

It feems to be well afcertained, that the American Government is collecting a confiderable military force at New-Orleans-Whether to annoy their neighbours, or to defend the territory lately purchased from Bonaparte, does not appear; but, from the number of men (4 or 5000 reported) we should rather suppose the latter. -Should fuccess or misfortune, attend the Spanish cause in Europe :- Should even the prefent government, like that of Portugal, be compelled to feek an afylum in the New World, it is not probable, that it will quietly relinquish fits pretensions to fo valuable a country as Louisiana; and it may yet coll the Americans another 17,000,000 of dollars, to defend their fraudulent purchase.

The Congress having authorised the President to raise and equip 50.000 men, without any oftenfible occasion for fuch an army, has excited much furprife and uneafinefs .----As the officers will be appointed by the Prefident they cannot be viewed as Militia-and mull therefore, be confidered as a formidable ftanding army, which the people will be called upon to support, at a time when their revenue is annihilated !

Indeed, affairs in America, generally, begin to indicate the speedy approach of an important crifis-and war, foreign or domestic, may be confidered as almost inevitable. So little is the American Embargo thought of in the Britifh West-Indies, that the Affembly of Jamaica, had it actually in contemplation to impose a new duty on provisions, &c. imported in American vessels, and a new tonnage duty on their fhipping; but were prevented, by an unfortunate mifunderflanding relative to the mutiny at Fort Augufla--the House requiring further information of the particulars of that melancholy affair, and Major-General CAR-MICHAEL, commanding His Majefty's forces, not permittipg it to be given-the Duke of MANCHESTER thought proper to proregue the Allembly before the bulinels of the fellion was completed. READ and ENACTED the following LAW. " A LAW to regulate the fize of FISH BARRELS, " and the appointment of INSPECTORS thereof, within " the City of Saint John." as in

DE it Ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Com-D monalty of the City of Saint John, in Common Council convened, That from and after the palling of this Law, all Barrels made for the purpole of putting up pickled Fifh of any description (Salmon excepted) within the City of Saint John, and all Barrels which shall be brought into the faid City for the purpose aforefaid, shall be so made as to contain twenty-eight gallons, wine measure, and thall be made of Staves found and free from rot and black or red rotten fap, not lefs than twenty-eight inches in length and half an inch in thickness at the bilge and three quarters of an inch in thickness at the chime, and shall be full hooped, that is two thirds of the Barrel covered with hoops, and that have the heads made of proper fluff revid for the purpole and not less than three quarters of an inch in thickness and alfo found and free from rot or fap.

II. And be it further Ordained, That there shall be appointed within the faid City, three Infpectors of Fish Barrels, two for the diffrict on the Eaflern fide of the faid harbor, and one for the district on the Western fide of the faid harbor of the faid City, each of whom shall find good fecurity in the sum of two hundred pounds for the faithful difcharge of his duty, and shall be also sworn to the faithful discharge thereof.

III. And be it further Ordained, That all Barrels which shall be made in the City of Saint John for the purpose of packing or putting up pickled Fish of any description (Salmon excepted) and all Barrels which fhall be brought into the faid City for the purpose aforesaid, before they or any of them thall be fold or offered for fale, thall be duly inspected and branded by one of the Inspectors of Barrels herein beforementioned to be appointed, and in cafe any fuch Barrel shall be fold or offered for fale not having been so inspected and branded, the person or persons who thall buy, fell or offer to fell any fuch Barrel not having been so first inspected and branded, shall for each Barrel so bought, fold or offered for fale, forfeit and pay the fum of three shillings, one moiery of which penalty shall be paid to the perfon who will give information of the offence. IV. And be it further Ordained, That if any perfon or perfons shall as an Inspector of Barrels brand any Barrel as inspected, who shall not have been duly appointed and who Iball not have obtained his Warrant of appointment, fuch perion shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay the sum of five pounds, one moiety of which shall go to the perfon who will give information of the offence. V. And be it further Ordained, The Inspectors of Fish Barrels herein beforementioned to be appointed, shall be entitled to demand and receive one penny for each Barrel inspected and branded as aforesaid, to be paid by the owner or vender of fuch Barrel, VI. And be it further Ordained, That no Inspector of Barrels shall be appointed an Inspector of Fish. In Teffimony whereof, we the faid Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalis of the faid City of Saint John, have cauled the Common Seal of the faid City to be hereunto affixed. Witness, William Campbell, Elq. Dr. Euflis then moved a postponement to Monday next, which was negatived.

The Refolutions were supported by Mr. S. Perkins, Capt. D. Sargent, and the Hon. Mr. Dexter. The laft gentleman went at large into the fubject, and delivered his fentiments in his usual clear and impressive manner. A pottion of his arguments went to thew the unconflitutionahty of the Embargo Laws.

In the opposition, were, the Han. W. Euflis, Mr. W. Jarvis, Mr. Auflin, and G. Blake, Elq. The two laft mentioned gentlemen hold offices under the present national administration.

On taking the queflion, there was a very large majority in favor of the Refolutions; and the following gentlemen were appointed to draft and report a Petition to the Legillature of the flate-Col. T. H. Perkins, Hon. J. C. Jones, Hon. S. Dexter, Dr. J. Warren, W. Sullivan, Efq. Hon. J. Mason, and T. Lyman, Esq.

The meeting was then adjourned to this day, at 10 A. M. to receive the report of the committee.

ST. JOHNS, (N. F.) DECEMBER 29. Saturday last arrived here the brig Elizabeth, Captain Way, in 23 days from Lifbon. Capt.
