

We have been favored with the following particulars respecting the operations of our army at St. Domingo, communicated by an officer present, dated July 7.

The British flag is now flying on the walls of St. Domingo. As rapid and bold movements were the surest means of success with a brave enemy. General Carmichael established his head-quarters in the first instance at St. Carlos, under the muzzles of the enemy's guns. He received the French General's request for an armistice, pressed him within his walls with advanced piquets, and cut off his communication with the strongest post and Fort Jerome. A storming party of the Royal Irish, under Major Walker, in his front; an intercepted correspondence and prisoners taken; the enemy seemed determined not to lay down their arms. On the 30th the enemy requested Commissioners might meet to arrange articles of capitulation. The enemy's proposal of the garrison being put on its parole, and allowed to go to France, was peremptorily refused by General Carmichael. On the 6th scaling ladders and all other preparations for an assault being in readiness, the columns of 500 British troops were formed within musket-shot, when General Carmichael sent a message to the French General, giving the option of a surrender or an assault with its consequences, allowing an hours consideration. At the expiration of that time Gen. Carmichael sent Major Twigg to know the cause of a white flag being hoisted, which was ascertained to announce the surrender of the garrison as prisoners of war. The General is now employed in returning good for evil to Jamaica, by his endeavors to promote its commercial interests with the Spanish Commandant, who seems cordially disposed to prove his friendship and gratitude to the English. Return of French 1200 regulars and 300 militia. The British force for the assault amounted to 288 rank and file.

A letter from an Officer in the St. Domingo expedition, dated St. Carlos, July 7, 1809, says "We have just time to inform you of the city having surrendered without any resistance. We have experienced considerable inconvenience from the incessant rain, and no place but a hut to shelter us in. We landed a week since at 40 miles distance, and had to pass a rugged and uneven country, full of rivers. Little or no assistance has been received from the Spaniards. In about two days time we shall enter the city."

LEYDEN, JUNE 30.

According to letters from Turkey, by way of Zara, the Turks and English had sent an expedition to the Black Sea, for the purpose of invading the Crimea.

VIENNA, JUNE 20.

M. De Esplanay, a Staff Officer, is arrived from Petersburg. He passed through the head-quarters of the Russian army. Prince Serge Gallitzin entered Galicia on the 4th, in three columns, viz. General Levis's by Drohyezen; Prince Gorzakoff's by Therepo; and Prince Suwarrow's by Woldzemerz.

BOHEMIA, JUNE 14.

The Austrian account of the battles of the 21st and 22d of May has now been published, and occupies 25 pages in quarto. The strength of the Austrian army in this battle is given in this account at 103 battalions, and 148 squadrons, or 75,000 men. The Austrian artillery amounted to 288 pieces.

The Austrian army lament the death of 87 superior Officers, and 4199 subalterns and privates. Field Marshals the Prince de Rohen, Dedovich, Weber, and Fregel, with several Generals, 663 Officers, and 15,651 privates were wounded, of whom Field Marshal Weber, 8 Officers, and 829 privates, were made prisoners by the enemy.

FROM PORTUGUESE PAPERS.

LISBON, JUNE 20.

Letters from Seville, of the 14th inst, and from Carolina, of the 12th, written by a person of great respectability, state, that Joseph left Madrid for La Grange, taking with him all the artillery, ammunition, &c. together with the sick and convalescent, several waggons with tapestry, and the plate of Don Bellares.

An express, who arrived this afternoon from Montijon (in Arragon) has brought letters for Gen. Venegur, which state that Gen. Blake had entered Saragossa.

The Seville Gazette of the 10th June contains the particulars of the victory gained by General Blake in Alcaniz. The French lost 2000 men.

Intelligence has been received that Alcantara is again occupied by four battalions of Portuguese troops under the orders of his Excellency Marshal Beresford, and that Victor has abandoned all his positions, and is retreating with the utmost precipitation.

In Madrid, and its environs, are about 6000 men, and about forty pieces of very heavy artillery, twenty of which are mounted in Chiva, and the rest in the small forts which have been constructed in Retico. According to letters from Badajoz, of the 6th inst. the French are retreating from the left bank of the Guadiana in the direction of Montanebez. It appears, by an official report of General Blake that the enemy's force in Arragon consists of from 6 to 7000 foot, and about 500 horse. The said General having been ordered by the Central Junta to dislodge the enemy from Alvarez, executed the command with complete success.

Letters from Viana, referring to others from Tuy, dated the 10th inst. state that a French division of 3000 men, on the 9th marched against Cadellar, but was defeated near that place with considerable loss.

HALIFAX, AUGUST 18.

Extract of a letter from Leish, dated July 6, 1809.

H. M. S. Quail arrived this evening from Heligoland; which place she left on Sunday last—Capt. Osborn, her commander, declares, that, as he was quitting the harbour, a Messenger from the seat of war, arrived with intelligence, that the Austrian army, under the Archduke CHARLES, had obtained a decided victory on the 26th ult. over the French—Two Field Marshals, twenty Generals, and 40,000 men, killed, wounded, or taken prisoners. "Capt. Malcolm, of the Delight, left Heligoland five

hours after the Quail:—He brings the duplicate of a proclamation, issued by the Archduke CHARLES, for a general Thanksgiving, in consequence of the victory. A vessel from Rotterdam, which sailed on the 2d instant, brings similar accounts."

A letter also from the master of the ship Ruby to his Owners, states that he left Palermo on the 1st of June with dispatches—That General Sir J. STEWART had embarked with 23,000 British and Sicilian troops under his command, intending to proceed, in two or three days, for the coast of Naples.

That dreadful Epidemic, the Yellow Fever, has lately made its appearance in Brooklyn, near New-York, and the Mayor of that City has publicly interdicted all intercourse with those parts of the village, where the infection has appeared.

By the brig Evelina we received New-York papers to the 7th—and Boston papers to the 10th inst. inclusive.—H. M. Brig Conest, Lieut. Gregorie, arrived in Hampton Roads on the 20th ult. 36 days from Portsmouth, with dispatches for Mr. Erskine.

The Boston papers say—"Letters from Paris, July 6th state, the negotiations for a Commercial Treaty, between the United States and France, had commenced between Gen. Armstrong and M. Hauterive; that the decree of September last had been revoked—and that there was every probability of their commerce being renewed."
