"The British flag is now flying on the walls of St. Domingo. As rapid and bold movements were the fureft means of fuccefs with a brave enemy. General Carmichael ellablished his head-quarters in the first inftance at St. Carlos, under the muzzles of the enciny's guns. He received the French General's request for an armistice, preffed him within his walls with advanced piquets, and cut off his communication with the ffrongest post and Fort Jerome. A forming party of the Royal Irila, under Major Walker, in his front; an intercepted correspondence and prisoners taken; the enemy feemed determined not to lay down their arms. On the 3d the enemy requefted Commissioners might meet to arrange articles of capitulation. The enemy's propofal of the garrifon being put on its parole, and allowed to go to France, was peremptorily refused by General Carmichael. On the 6th feeling ladders and all other preparations for an affault being in readinefs, the columns of 500 British troops were formed within musket-shor, when General Carmichael fent a message to the French General, giving the option of a furrender or an affault with its confequences, allowing an hours confideration. At the expiration of that time Gen. Carmichael fent Major Twigg to know the caufe of a white flag being housed, which was afcertained to announce the furrender of the garrifon as prifoners of war. The General is now employed in returning good for evil to Jamaica, by his endeavors to promote its commercial intereffs with the Spanish Commandant, who feeros cordially disposed to prove his friendship and gratitude to the English. Return of French 1400 regulars and 200 militia. The British force for the affault amounted to 528 rank and Ele." A letter from an Officer in the St. Domingo expedition, dated St. Carlos, July 7, 1800; fays " We have just time to inform you of the city having furrendered without any resillance. We have experienced confiderable inconvenience from the inceffant rain, and no place but a hut to fhelter us in. We landed a week fince at 40 miles diftance; and had to pass a rugged and uneven country, full of rivers. Little or no affiftance has been received from the Spaniards. In shout two days time we fhall enter the city."

hours after the Quail ;-He brings the duplicate of a proclamation, iffued by the Archduke CHARLES, for a gene-. ral Thanksgiving, in consequence of the victory. A veffel from Rotterdam, which failed on the 2d inftant, brings fimilar accounts."

A letter also from the mafter of the ship Ruby to his Owners, flases that he left Palermo on the 1ft of June with disparches-That General Sir J. STEWART had embarked with 22,000 British and Sicilian troops under his command, intending to proceed; in two or three days, for the coast of Naples.

That dreadful Epidemic, the Yellow Fever, has lately made its appearance in Brooklyn, near New-York, and the Mayor of that City has publicly interdicted all intercourse with those parts of the village, where the infection has appeared.

By the brig Evelina we received New-York papers to the 7th-and Bofton papers to the toth infl. inclusive .-H. M. Brig Contell, Lieut. Gregorie, atrived in Hampton Roads on the 30th ult. 56 days from Portsmouth, with difpatches for Mr. Erfkine.

The Bofton papers fay-" Letters from Paris, July 6th flate, the negotiations for a Commercial Treaty, between the United States and France, had commenced between Gen. Armflrong and M. Hauterive; that the decree of September laft had been revoked-and that, there was every. probability of their commerce being renewed."

#### BOHEMIA, JUNE 14.

The Auftrian account of the battles of the 21ft and 22d of May has now been published, and occupies 25 pages in quarto. The firength of the Auffrian army in this battle is given in this account at 103 battalions, and 148 Iquaerons, or 75,000 men. The Auffrian artillery, amounted to 288 pieces.

The Auffrian army lament the death of 87 Superior Officers, and 4199 fubalterns and privates. Field Marshals the Prince de Rohen, Dedovich, Weber, and Frevel, with several Generals, 653 Officers, and 15 651 privates were wounded, of whom Field Marshal Weber, 8 Officers, and 829 privates, were made prifoners by the enemy.

#### FROM PORTUGUESE PAPERS. LISBON, JUNE 20.

" Letters from Seville, of the 14th init, and from Carolina, of the 12th, written by a perfon of great respectability, flate, that Joseph left Madrid for La Grange, taking with him all the artillery, ammunition, &c., together with the hck and convalicent, feveral waggons with tapettry, and the plate of Don Bellares."

An express, who arrived this afternoon from Montijon (in Arragon) has brought letters for Gen. Venegur, which flate that Gen. Blake had entered Sarragoffa.

The Seville Gazette of the 10th June contains the particulars of the victory gained by General Blake in Alcaniz. The French loft 2000 men.

Intelligence has been received that Alcantara is again. occupied by four battalions of Portuguele troops under the orders of his Excellency Matshal Beresford, and that Victor has abandoned all his politions, and is retreating with the utmost precipitation.

In Madrid, and its environs, are about 6000 men, and about forty pieces of very heavy artillery, twenty of which are mounted in Chiva, and the reft in the small forts which have been confiructed in Retico. According to letters from Badajoz, of the 6th inft. the French are retreating from the left bank of the Guadiana in the direction of Montanebez. It appears, by an official report of General Blake that the enemy's force in Arragon confilts of from 6 to 7000 foot, and about 500 horfe. The faid General having been ordered by the Central Junta to diflodge the enemy from Alvarez, executed the command with complete fuccefs.

Letters from Viana, referring to others from Tuy, dated the 10th infl. flate that a French division of 3000 men, on the 9th marched against Caldellar, but was defeated near that place with confiderable lofs.
