

have been sold, in order to procure money for the relief of Government.

Some late French Papers announce the departure of Oudenot, Duke of Reggio, for Antwerp, to take the command of the troops in that quarter. About 16 or 20,000 troops are also assembling at Boulogne, and a shew has been made of manœuvring and exercising the gun-boats on the coast. Bonaparte is mentioned as intending an immediate journey to Boulogne, and from thence to Antwerp. He was expected to reach Boulogne early next month.

Within the last ten days the funds have experienced a very considerable rise, Omnium as much as 2½ per cent. the Consols and other Stocks in proportion. In the best informed political circles this improvement is ascribed, we know not with what truth, to the belief that an increasing good understanding subsists between this country and the Cabinet of St. Petersburg. We are informed, however, that there are at present three ships in the River, taking in warlike stores for a Russian port in the Baltic, and that every facility is given them by Government to complete their lading.

Paris Papers were received on Wednesday of the 25th. By an article from Toulon, it appears that the great French naval hero, Admiral Emeriau has again been signalizing his prowess in that port, for it may reasonably be doubted, whether he ever ventured out of it. Our squadron blockading Toulon having sailed to some distance, and left only one "ship of the line, and some frigates" (so say the enemy themselves), Admiral Emeriau immediately unmoored twelve sail of the line and two frigates, drove away our one sail of the line, and actually manœuvred in presence of the whole squadron; a few ships of which sailed to watch him. Nay, further than this, the gallant Admiral really obliged our whole fleet, which had been previously "anchored without order, to draw up in three lines." The British Commander was certainly much imposed on if he did really expect that the French one meant to fight him. The object of this manœuvring is however acknowledged to be to facilitate the merchantmen passing from port to port on their own coast.

Lord Wellington it is understood has had a slight indisposition; but it has not been of a nature to interfere with his personal exertions, much less to render, as has been reported, a return to his native air necessary. He has himself directed the motions of the Allied Army in its march towards the Coa.—Gen. Beresford has just recovered from a severe indisposition.

SEPTEMBER 2.

Paris Papers to the 29th ult. have been received.—We lament to have to state, that they contain an account of the fall of Figueras. The garrison having consumed the last miserable means of subsistence, had resolved to cut their way through the blockading force; but an Aid-de-Camp of the Commandant, Martinez, deserted, and made his personal peace with the enemy by basely and treacherously giving notice of this extreme source of the distress and despair of his more worthy comrades. The consequence was, that the enemy, being perfectly prepared, opposed a resistance which the Spaniards did not expect, the sally was repulsed with the loss of 400 men, and the consequence was to surrender at discretion. The lives of the men were spared, though Marshal Macdonald says they should not be, thus making a merit that 3500 victims of the treachery of a cowardly comrade, were not butchered by their heroic conquerors in cold blood!

Every exertion is employed at Portsmouth and Plymouth to expedite the reinforcements for Lord Wellington. The 7th dragoons will be embarked as soon as cavalry transports are ready for them; the remaining regiments of the hussar brigade will follow. A squadron of the 11th, and another of the 13th dragoons, will be immediately embarked, to replace those which were unfortunately taken by the enemy.

General Campbell, of the Portuguese army, and suite, has left town for Portsmouth, to embark for Lisbon.

Distressing accounts have reached us from Gottenburgh relative to the fleet of merchantmen which was dispersed on the 13th ult. in the Baltic. It was apprehended that many of the ships would fall into the hands of the enemy; and that those which escaped would sustain considerable injury. Sir James Saumarez, the moment the storm abated, gave orders for the collection of the scattered vessels, with which view he despatched several ships of war; but, by the last accounts from Gottenburgh, an inconsiderable number only had been assembled.

SEPTEMBER 6.

Depots are said to be forming at Celorico, Penhel, and Guarda, all in the vicinity of Ciudad Rodrigo, but still more in the interior of Portugal. The heavy artillery is likewise reported to have been ordered up the Duero; and at Damego, on the same river, Commissaries have been directed to prepare two thousand wag-gons for immediate use.

A letter received yesterday from on board the American frigate the Constitution, Capt. Hull, of 44 guns, dated off Plymouth, Sept. 2, states, that Mr. Joel Barlow, appointed Plenipotentiary from the United States to the Court of Paris, was on board with his family and suite. Mr. Barlow left Washington on the 2d of August, for Annapolis, where he embarked on the 5th on board the Constitution. He is attended by Mr. Warden, who has returned to his former duties of Consul General at the French Court, and also by Mr. Lee, who resumes his situation of American Consul at Bordeaux.

From France the Constitution is to proceed to Holland, to convey the specie for the payment of the dividends due to that country on American stocks, and from thence to visit England for the like purpose, as to the dividends due to the subjects of Great-Britain.

Lisbon, August 18.—Our army has rapidly advanced, and some are of opinion that it will undertake the siege of Ciudad Rodrigo; but with the well informed here, that is doubtful. It is asserted that the enemy

has received a reinforcement of 25,000 men, and their army of Portugal is to be augmented to 80,000.

Lord Wellington has entered Spain with a large force, and it is supposed his views are directed against Salamanca, as our advanced guards have left Ciudad Rodrigo, two leagues in the rear."

A considerable promotion of Brevet Field Officers is expected to be announced in Saturday night's Gazette.

WINDSOR, August 30.

This morning, at 6 o'clock, His Majesty rose and walked about in his apartments with great cheerfulness for almost an hour; after which, he partook of rice milk for breakfast. At twelve o'clock the exercise of walking was resumed, during which his Majesty appeared in good spirits, occasionally conversing with those who accompanied him, and exhibiting scarce any symptom of bodily decay.

Windsor Castle, September 2.

"His Majesty has passed a sleepless night, and is not quite so well this morning.

Sept. 4.—"The King had some sleep last night. His Majesty is this morning nearly as he was yesterday.

September 5.—"His Majesty's symptoms are nearly the same as they were yesterday.

September 6.—"His Majesty's symptoms have not varied since yesterday."

PORTSMOUTH, August 31.

Thursday, the homeward-bound India fleet, passed this port. They left Madras on the 17th March, and St. Helena, 26th June.—General Gowdie, late Commander in Chief of Fort George, is arrived in this fleet. They have brought home five millions of money.

The troops assembling for the reduction of Java, are to be commanded by Sir S. Achmuty, having General Wetherall, as his second in command; the force at present consists of his Majesty's 14th, 59th, 69th, 78th, and the 22d light dragoons; and a large force from Bengal.

Wednesday arrived Sir J. Sydney Yorke's squadron consisting of the Vengeur, Sir Joseph Yorke, Capt. T. Brown; Danemark, Capt. Bisset; Edinburgh, Capt. Rolles; Pyramus, frigate, Capt. Dashwood; Rover, Capt. Finley.

The object of the cruise of the squadron off the Western Islands, was the protection of the valuable China and East-India fleets, neither of which, however, they were fortunate enough to fall in with.

SAINT JOHN, MONDAY, OCTOBER 28, 1811.

Since our last we have received London dates to the 6th September, via Halifax, and by the Ship William, from Liverpool, and have extracted that which appears most important and interesting.

The last accounts from Portugal state Lord WELLINGTON to have made a sudden and rapid movement towards Salamanca, the grand depot of the French army. The squadron under Sir Joseph Yorke had returned to Portsmouth.

FROM HALIFAX, OCTOBER 18.

Arrived, Monday, H. M. S. Melampus, Capt. Hawker, Quebec. Tuesday, schooner Juniper, Lieut. Vassal, Bermuda; Wednesday, brigs Alliance, Graham, Antigua; Union, from Newfoundland. Wednesday morning, H. M. S. Manilla, Captain Joyce, 37 days from Portsmouth, England.

In the Manilla came—His Excellency Lieut. General Sir JOHN COAPE SHERBROOKE, K. B. Governor of Nova-Scotia, and Commander in Chief of his Majesty's troops in the Province and its vicinity, &c. &c.—Lady Sherbrooke, Miss Sherbrooke, Miss Addison, Capt. Addison, 1st Drag. Guards, Military Secretary, Capt. Blackall, 4th Ceylon Regiment, Mr. Oates, N. S. Fencibles—Aides-de-Camp.

The Ladies landed at 10 o'clock, A. M. on Wednesday; and his Excellency and Suite, accompanied by General HUNTER, &c. left the Ship at eleven o'clock, under a discharge of cannon, and landed at the King's Slip. The Flank Companies of the 2d battalion of the 8th or King's Regiment were drawn up on the wharf. The Band struck up "God save the King," and his Excellency was welcomed on shore by his Honor the PRESIDENT, the SECRETARY of the Province, &c. and by them conducted to the Council Chamber; where his Majesty's Council being assembled, the oaths of Office were administered, in the usual form; and his Excellency was then attended to the Government House, at the gate of which was placed the Grenadier Company of his Majesty's 98th Regiment.

The Manilla left Portsmouth on the 8th, and has brought London papers to the 6th ult.

These papers contain accounts a few days later from Lisbon; and the rapid movement of Lord WELLINGTON's army to the Northward, leads to an expectation of some important event in that part of the Peninsula.

Several recent circumstances seem to strengthen the probability of a good understanding between the Courts of Great-Britain and St. Petersburg.

The equipment and sailing of the squadron under Sir J. S. YORKE, is now ascertained to have been, as hinted in our paper of the 27th ult. from *The Courier*, merely for the purpose of giving additional protection to the immensely valuable fleets from China and India; which have since arrived in safety.

Another convoy was said to be appointed to leave Portsmouth for this place in September; the Duke of Bronti, transport, with the Governor's horses and equipage—the Swift, with stores for the Naval Yard; and, probably, the long expected Britannia, from London, will take advantage of sailing with it.

Yesterday, in consequence of the recent promotion, Admiral SAWYER hoisted his Flag as Vice-Admiral of the Blue; which was saluted by all his Majesty's ships in the harbor.

We are sorry to learn, that Major-General HUNTER is about to leave this garrison, on his return to New-Brunswick.
