

Zayas had not returned with the whole of the force with which he sailed; but that he had lost a considerable number of his troops at Ayemont, whilst pursued by the Prince d'Artemberg. He is also said to have lost many of his cavalry. These letters allude pointedly to the existence of party differences, which had created great alarm, and which it was feared would soon produce serious consequences. It is stated, that a leading Member of the Cortes had been thrown into prison.

The Duke del Infantado had been appointed Capt. General of the Province of Catalonia.

A letter dated Cadiz, April 13, stated—"Our Regent Blake, takes upon himself the command of an expedition, which is about to sail. It will embark tomorrow and sail on the 15th. The troops under his command will amount to 14,000 men, to be composed of British and Spaniards."

The 91st regiment of the line, at present in Canterbury, have received orders to hold themselves in readiness to embark for Canada. The 103d regiment is also under orders for a similar destination.

NAVAL APPOINTMENTS.

Captain Harvey, of the Cephalus, acting, to the Cumberland; Lieut. Clifford (Tigre,) to command the Cephalus; Captain Richard Dacres is appointed to the Guerrier, and takes his passage to Halifax in the Tartarus, Captain Pasco; Capt. A. F. Evans is appointed Commissioner of the Navy, to be resident at Bermuda.

GREENOCK, MAY 1.

Two Anholt mails have arrived. The papers bring no material intelligence from the Continent, but Government have received information by it of a rupture between Sweden and Denmark, of which notice has been given at Lloyd's. An article dated Copenhagen, the 6th inst. contains a letter from the gallant defender of Anholt to the Commander in Chief in Jutland, commending in high terms the bravery of the Danish troops who attacked that Island. The British Governor proposes an exchange of prisoners, and that twenty British would be returned, for the same number of Danes, released upon their parole. Governor Maurice adds, that the Commander in Chief of the Danish expedition shall be interred with all the honors due to the bravery which he had manifested.

An article dated Constantinople, the 5th of Feb. says, that the Russian General had made fresh propositions to the Grand Vizier to terminate the war, but that the Porte shews little anxiety for peace, and that the Turkish army had just been reinforced, and a great number of Greeks enrolled in the service.

A letter dated Gottenburgh, April 22, states—"Things are better in Russia since the Emperor Alexander's declaration to Napoleon to preserve a strict neutrality, to maintain which he has ordered an army of 300,000 men to be in a state of readiness. Napoleon, it is said, has consented to Alexander's plan."

MAY 3.

A mail has arrived from Anholt, bringing German Papers to the 16th ult. and letters from various parts on the coasts of the Baltic to the 23d. The indications in the Journals, of an approaching rupture between Russia and France, are greatly strengthened by the private communications. Alexander, it is said, wishes to avoid a war, but in consequence of the Memorial from the Merchants, which will be found in a subsequent column, and the representations of the higher orders, he is anxious to make peace with this country, or at least to renew a commercial intercourse with us. It was, however, considered as certain, that Napoleon would not give his consent to either of those measures; and, therefore the Russian Government had resolved to prepare for the worst. The troops in Finland, with the exception of 4000 men, had been ordered to Russian Poland, where there is actually said to be an army of Observation consisting of 50,000 men. The Imperial Guards were to leave the capital on the 10th ult. for the same destination. Various corps, mentioned in some of the letters as being in march for the Danube, are stated, in others of a later date, to have been countermanded, and to have also received a route for Poland. It is much feared that the King of Prussia will, in the impending contest, be found on the side of his oppressor. The French have an army of 40,000 men in Westphalia, and within the last three months more than 1000 pieces of artillery have passed the Elbe; so that, whether his Prussian Majesty declares for or against Napoleon, the occupation of his territory will be the immediate result of a rupture with Russia.

The immediate cause of the quarrel between the Swedes and Danes, as stated in a letter of the 22d ult. from Gottenburgh is, that some Danish and French privateers lately made a joint attack upon the small Swedish port of Matwick, from which they cut out three vessels. This the Swedish Government naturally considered as an act of hostility, and immediately determined on reprisals. The resentment is not confined, it seems, to the mere fitting out of a frigate, but permission has been given to a number of privateers to cruise against the Danes. As Bernadotte, in his quality of Prince Regent, must have given his sanction to this proceeding, we are naturally led to suspect that Bonaparte has some secret view in embroiling these two Powers.

The four Russian ships of the line at Trieste, after undergoing some repairs, and receiving on board provisions, for three months, attempted to start on the 12th March, but were chased back by three of our cruisers. It was reported at Trieste, that their design was to effect a junction with the Venetian flotilla, and afterwards attempt to raise the blockade of Corfu.

"Accounts have this moment been received, that the brave BALLASTEROS has been engaged with the French at Frigal de la Sierra, in which the enemy lost two thousand men."

HALIFAX, MAY 31.

We were favored by a gentleman who came Passenger in the brig Friends, arrived yesterday from Liverpool, with London Papers to the 25th ult. inclusive.

Though they contain no account of any general battle in Portugal; yet we find that the French still continued to retreat before the victorious Allies; and there is room to hope, that the panic which has seized MASENA'S Army, may prove contagious to the Invaders of the adjoining Kingdom.

The Ship Neptune has arrived at La Haye, 23 days from Greenock. We have been politely favored with a Greenock paper, brought by Major DRUMMOND, 10th Regt. who came passenger in the Neptune, of the 3d inst. containing London dates to the 29th April.

Two French frigates are said to have been captured lately in the Mediterranean.

SAINT JOHN, June 10, 1811.

Last Tuesday being the Anniversary of the Birth of our most Gracious Sovereign, the same was observed with every demonstration of real joy by the inhabitants of this loyal City. The Troops in Garrison paid the usual respect to the Day, by firing Salutes. The Militia were under arms, and also fired the customary Salutes. These were followed by firings from the Ships in the Harbour. Public entertainments were given, and in short every step taken to evince the grateful sentiments of persons of every description, that the life of their beloved Sovereign has been so long preserved to them.
