Mr. Maurice Margarot, one of the Delegates from the London Corresponding Society to the British Convention, held in Edinburgh in the year 1794, arrived in Sheffield, on Tuesday last. He has suffered the sentence of the High Court of Justiciary, viz. fourteen years banishment to New South Wales, for sedition, and returned to this country only a few weeks ago .-About the same year, Messrs. Skirving, Gerald, Palmer, and Muir, received similar sentences; and Mr. Margarot is the only survivor, the other four having long since died. He left Sheffield on Thursday evening, for London. Mr. Margarot, his wife, and a faverite cat, which they took along with them, are now the only living objects of all those who sailed in the vassel from this country. The cat is blind, grown grey in the service of his master, and is permitted to repose itself on a bed of wool.

On the first day of this Term the gaoler of Ennis-killen appeared in the Four Courts, Dublin, with four-teen insolvent debtors, whom he brought up from prison for the determination of their respective cases.—Such has been this worthy gaoler's humanity and meritorious conduct to all the unhappy prisoners whose misfortunes had thrown them into confinement, and such a feeling of grateful honesty it did excite in their bosoms, that the whole fourteen accompanied him to Dublin without any other guard than their own honor. They were seen attending him closely in the Hall, and not one among them would quir him for a moment in a crowded place, where escape could not have been prevented.

The annual average importation of sugar from all the Colonies, the produce of which is admitted to the home consumption of Great-Britain, was proved by the official returns laid before the Distillery Committee of the House of Commons, in 1807, to be 270,000 hhds. The same authority shews the regular consumption of these kingdoms to be 200,000 hhds, and the Distilleries now consume 50,000 more, leaving a disposable surplus of only 20,000 hhds. per annum. The quantity is so inadequate to supply the demand for exportation, that since the substitution of sugar for grain in the Distilleries, the glut then on hand has completely disappeared; for the returns of the West-India Dock Company prove that the quantity in their warehouses, on the 16th June last, including Foreign as well as British plantation sugar, was only 18,430 casks, equal but to five weeks consumption. This plain statement proves that the British planters are rendered completely independent of the decrees of Bonaparte. The bankruptcies that have lately taken place are

Her Majesty's death bed was attended by the Count De Liste and all the Princes and Princesses of the Royal Blood, of whom she took the most affectionate leave.

It is confidently stated, that an attempt was lately made on the life of Bonaparte, as he was passing the Bois de Boulogne, by a Priest, who was seized and carried to prison. Great precautions were taken to prevent any account of the circumstance from transpiring, and the circulation of the report has since been checked by the interference of the police.

By a letter from Varel, received yesterday, dated the 12th, it is said that 39 waggons loaded with English manufacture, have been publicly burnt.

A singular circumstance took place at a fashionable supper party at Brighton last week. A gentleman, during the entertainment, in shaking the water which adhered to a root of celery, he had taken from the salad-bowl, accidentally sprinkled the face of a beauty in the decline of life, whose cheeks were immoderately painted, which circumstance prohibiting the use of her handkerchief, aroused her resentment to such a degree,
