

ing letter from on board the *Rolla*, now in the Downs:—“On Sunday, the 6th of October at 6 o'clock p. m. we discovered a lugger to leeward of us, off Dieppe; but she was so close in with the land, that we had no other method of taking her than by hoisting French colours over the English. Having our plain side to her, she took us for a captured West-Indiaman; and we, having a press of sail, were under close reef top-sails, and main-top-gallant sail set, with a fore-top-gallant mast down in merchant-man fashion, keeping 6 men only on deck, the marines and rest of the ship's company lying down to leeward, with their small arms, out of sight. When within half a mile of the lugger, we hauled down the French colours, hoisted English, let down our ports, and fired into her with musquetry, grape, and canister; the effects of which are visible in her masts and rigging. The lugger then endeavoured to hoist her main lug to get away from us, we going at the rate of nine knots; but he fell under our lee, we calmed him, and hooked his main-rigging with our sheet-anchor. At this instant, Lieutenant BRADBY, Mr. ACKERS, Master's-mate, Mr. SLAYTON, and ten men, boarded the lugger in a gallant style, driving about forty of the enemy from the deck. She proves to be *La Pralse*, out of Dieppe, had made no capture, and is pierced for fourteen guns.” One of the Officers of this privateer says, that it is generally reported and believed in France, that the invasion of Guernsey and Jersey will be immediately attempted. In order to man the ships of war and transports for this expedition, the crews of merchantmen and privateers are impressed and marched off in irons, without any distinction.

LONDON, OCTOBER 22.

The fresh Paris journals which were received yesterday still present us only with BONAPARTE on his tour. He reached the capital of Holland on the 9th, and continued there on the 11th. The addresses of the Constituted Authorities, at Amsterdam, to their new Sovereign,—that is, of his own Constituted Authorities,—are such as become the basest slaves of the most brutal master. BONAPARTE, on hearing them, must have really felt the right of an arch-knave like himself to rule over such an herd of abject miscreants. Our readers will recollect the addresses of LOUIS BONAPARTE, last year, on taking leave of his Dutch subjects; wherein he assures them, that he had done all in his power to rescue them from the last and lowest of humiliations,—their annexation to France,—but in vain; and yet Dutchmen are now found to declare to the author of this calamitous debasement of their name and nation, that they “*die more Frenchmen, in heart, than in consequence of the union.*”

MACDONALD, it is said, in consequence of his violent sufferings from the gout, has obtained leave of BONAPARTE to quit his command in Spain, and return to France.

The letters by the Anholt mail which arrived on Sunday, were delivered yesterday; but they throw no new light on the affairs of the North. Indeed, the writers from that quarter have exhausted the subject in predictions and counter-predictions, on the probability of a war between the Northern Powers and France.

The most recent accounts from St. Petersburg announce, that the exchange had fallen to 14½, and that colonial produce was still continuing on the rise.

The *Stork* sloop of war, which arrived at Plymouth on Saturday last, fell in with an American vessel, off Scilly, and took out of her an English gentleman of rank, and two Frenchmen. The former had been detained as a prisoner ever since the re-commencement of hostilities, and made his escape through the medium of the two Frenchmen who came over with him; they assisted him to get on board an American vessel, where, in order to avoid detection, in case of a search, he was put into an empty cask, in the hold. The Frenchmen who came over with him had obtained passports, under pretence of going to America. These people are stated to have brought over some important information.

NEW-YORK, NOVEMBER 25.

On the night of the 14th inst. about 60 French sailors, belonging to the privateer *La Vengeance*, and another, name unknown, but both lying in Savannah, collected in one of the principal streets, armed with cutlasses, knives, bludgeons, &c. and attacked about twenty American seamen, many of whom they cut and mangled in the most barbarous manner, and one of whom, namely, the mate of the brig *Hetty*, of Philadelphia, they stabbed to the heart, so that he expired immediately. Having cleared the streets they at length returned in triumph on board of their vessels.

VACCINATION.—A late London paper mentions, that the practice of vaccination has been extended to the remoter provinces of the Russian Empire, and letters from Orenburgh, state that in March and April last it was introduced with the greatest success among several of the Tartar tribes.
