In the night the enemy destroyed the bridge on the Ceira, and retreated, leaving a small rear guard on the river.

At a COMMON COUNCIL holden at the City Hall of the City of Saint John on Monday the second day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eleven.

READ AND ENACTED THE FOLLOWING LAW.

An Ordinance to establish the rates of Cartage.

BE it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of Saint John in Common Council convened, that the following be the rates or prices of cartage to be taken by the licenced Cartmen on the Eastern side of the Harbour, to wit,

From the Market place or landing at the foot of King-Street or from any of the wharves northward of Saint James' Street, to any part of John Street, or any part of Prince William Street as far down as Duke Street, and as far up as Mr. Samuel Miles' house inclusive, or to any part of King Street as far as the edge of the Square, or to any part of Germain Street northward of the Church,

For a load containing a quarter of a Cord of Wood or twelve bushels of Oats, Potatoes, or other articles measured by the bushel, nine pence.

For a Pipe of Wine, Gin, or Brandy, three shillings.

For a Puncheon of Rum, two shillings.

ditto of Cyder, one shilling and nine pence.

For a Puncheon of Molasses, a Hogshead of Sugar or Tobacco, two shillings and six pence.

For a Hogshead of Lime, or Earthen ware, one shilling and three pence.

For six barrels of Flour or five barrels of Fish, Tar, Turpentine, or Pitch, or half a ton of Iron or small Cordage (to three inches,) or a common load of Household or dry goods, one shilling.

For Cables and other Cordage per ton, six shillings and three pence.

For Bricks per thousand, five shillings.

For Boards or other Lumber per thousand feet, four shillings.

For Hay per ton, screwed, three shillings and six pence.

ditto loose, six shillings.

And to any other part of the said Eastern District, For a load of Wood, Oats, or other articles as aforesaid, one shilling.

For a Pipe of Wine, Gin, or Brandy, three shillings and six pence.

For a Puncheon of Rum, two shillings and six pence.

ditto of Cyder, two shillings.

For a Puncheon of Molasses, a Hogshead of Sugar, or Tobacco, three shillings.

For a Hogshead of Lime or Earthen ware, one shilling and six pence.

For six barrels of Flour, one shilling and three pence.

For six barrels of Fish, Tar, Turpentine or Pitch, or half a ton of Iron or small cordage (to three inches) or a common load of household or dry goods, one shilling and six pence.

For Cables and other Cordage per ton, six shillings and nine pence.

For Bricks per thousand, six shillings.

For Boards or other Lumber per thousand feet, five shillings.

For Hay per ton, screwed, four shillings.

ditto loose, seven shillings and six pence.

For Boards or other Lumber from either of the Mills on the borders of the City, per thousand, six shillings. II. And be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, that two sixty-gallon Casks or four barrels or quarter-casks shall be considered as equal to a Pipe or Puncheon and paid for at that rate.

III. And be it further ordained by the authority aforesaid, that if any Cartman shall demand or receive from any person or persons any greater rate or price for Cartage than is above allowed and ordained, he or the owner of the Cart shall forfeit and pay for each and every offence the sum of ten shillings.
