FRANCE, TURKEY, AND RUSSIA. Hitherto the attention of Bonaparte has certainly been withdrawn in a very great degree, from the affairs of Spain and Portugal. There cannot be a reasonable doubt, but that he has but just escaped from a most difficult negociation with Russia and Prussia. The latter Power, indeed, is too weak to be enabled to venture even a shew of opposition, and therefore her late conduct must be imputed to the countenance and support of the Court of Petersburgh. The Emperor Alexander, however, timid in his nature and in his councils, could not but understand, that the acquisition of the fortresses demanded by France would bring the latter too immediately in his neighbourhood. Prussia has reached that point of insignificance in which every State would naturally wish her as a barrier against a stronger power, and would defend and adopt her interests for that purpose. . It has frequently happened in the history of Europe, that a very weak State, by this happy position, has interested all its neighbours in its safety and in its existence, and thus has continued to exist, through centuries upon the mere basis of its imbecility. Such was the state of Switzerland before the war and the revolution-France and Austria were equally anxious to preserve her as a barrier between them, and thus between their jealousies of each other, Switzerland, in any event, had a sure protection from one or the other.-Russia, therefore, is now become the protector of Prussia and Russia.

Whilst Russia has been thus secretly encouraging Prussia against France, and dictating to her a tone which she would not have ventured from herself, France, upon her part, has been playing the same game in Turkey. Under the pretext of mediation, she has been encouraging the Turks to resist the demands of Russia, and to make another venture before they gave up Wallachia and Moldavia. The Turks are the most proud and obstinate and fanatic of all the people upon the surface of the earth, and therefore are the more easily duped by a dexterous intriguer like France. . The result will be, that Turkey may deem the war well concluded, if she keep Constantinople. France will most probably purchase the good will of the Emperor Alexander

by the sacrifice of Turkey.

Letters from Lisbon state, on the authority of deserter that the part of the French army which is at Placentia amounts to 35,000 men, and that Drouet's corps which had left Grenada, was at Ciudad Real, on its way to join Marmont. It was understood, however that Marmont would undertake no operations until the season was favourable, as he had determined not to run such a risk as that incurred last year by Massena; on this account it is believed, that as soon as the rainy weather has fairly set in, Lord Wellington will fall back with a considerable part of the army towards Lisbon.

Some accounts were received on Saturday from Jer., sey and Guernsey of the 12th. The expectations of invasion seem to have subsided; but every necessary pre-

caution was still taken.

Admiral Young has issued orders to the ships of his fleet in the Downs, that no Officer is to go on shore except on duty, in order that they may be ready to sail at a moment's warning.

OCTOBER 24.

Accounts from Cadiz say, that General Ballesteros attacked the French under Gaudinot, Sept. 27 and 29, with considerable success, taking upwards of 400 prisoners. Blake has been successful against the French in Valencia; in consequence of the drafts made from thence to strengthen Ciudad Rodrigo.

Letters from Oporto, Oct. 14, say that Lord Wellington was again advancing, to compel the enemy to unite his forces, and afford the Spanish Guerillas an opportunity of cutting off his supplies .- The French are known to be already much distressed for provisions.

The express from Windsor yesterday stated, that His Majesty was not worse, and had some sleep during the night.

Dr. Reynolds, one of His Majesty's physicians, di-

ed on Tuesday last. Mr. Thornton goes to St. Petersburgh, 'tis said, to offer the mediation of Government in bringing the war in Turkey to a conclusion, which will enable it to proceed more decisively as respects France.

Lord William Bentinck has sailed in the Menelaus

for Sicily-his Lordship's measures on his arrival, we are told, will be prompt and determinate.

Capt. G. Cockburn, is to hoist a broad pendant in the Grampus 50, at Portsmouth, for South America-The Commissioners for mediating between Spain and her Colonies, of which Capt. C. is a member, go out in that ship,

The Arethusa frigate, Capt. Coffin, takes Admiral

Stirling to Jamaica.

Sir S. Hood sailed from Falmouth on the 20th inst. in the Owen Glendower, for the East-Indies.

Admiral Young, with Vice-Admiral Ferrier and Rear-Admiral Strachan, arrived in the Downs on Friday, with the blockading squadron, 13 sail of the line, from Flushing-A small squadron of observation is still kept off the Scheldt.

The accounts from Constantinople, communicated to Government by Sir Harford Jones, are said to be of an unfavorable nature.

Sir J. Gambier has resigned the office of British

Consul-General in the Brazils. Major-General M'Farlane is appointed to the Staff in Sicily.

Admiral Apodaca, late Ambassador to our Court from the Spanish Cortes, has embarked in the Swift. sure, Capt. Temple Hardy, on his return. The Swift. sure will join the fleet off Toulon.

All the disposable small craft at Plymouth have been ordered to be fitted out with the greatest expedition .-A report was current at Plymouth of it being the intention of Government to call out the local militia.

The following extract from the Statutes for the preservation of His MAJESTY's Timber in America is republished in order that no person may plead ignorance thereof-And Notice is hereby given that the Acts herein referred to will be strictly carried into execution, in this Province.

Y 8 Geo. I. ch. 12, it is enacted, That every Per. son who shall presume to cut down, fell or destroy any White Pine Tree, within His MAJESTY's Province of Nova-Scotia, or any other of the Colonies in America, or be aiding and assisting therein, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay the following sums, viz. -

For every White Pine Tree of Twelve In-

ches diameter, and three foot growth from the earth, 500 From 12 to 18 inches, 10 0 0 18 to 24 20 0 0 24 and upwards, 50 0 0

To be recovered in the Courts of Admiralty. It is further enacted, That all White Pine Trees, Masts and Logs made from such Trees, which shall be found cut or felled without Licence, shall be forfeited

and seized for the King.

By 2d Geo. ch. 35, it is enacted, That no Person within the Province of Nova-Scotia, or any other of the Colonies that now belong or hereafter shall belong to the Crown of Great-Britain, shall presume to cut down, fell or destroy any White Pine Trees, notwithstanding the said trees do grow within the Limits of any Township laid out, or to be laid out hereafter, without His Majesty's Royal Licence for so doing first had and obtained, on Penalty of the forfeitures mentioned in Act 8, Geo. 1.

All Persons therefore who shall cut down, fell or destroy, any White Pine Trees within the limits of this Province without Licence (contrary to the true intent and meaning of the said Acts) shall be prosecuted as

the Law directs.

And all Persons are hereby cautioned against cutting Trees of any kind upon the Lands reserved for the use of the Crown, or committing any other depredations thereon, as they would avoid the penalty of the Law in that case made and provided.
