No one who has read Mr. Smith's pamphlet, unless blind as a mole or obstinate as a mule, can feel surprise at the event .- Serrurier, without doubt, has been privy to all that has passed between Mr. Foster and Mr. Madison, and in the place of merely superintending the negotiation, has most likely dictated the answers given to the British Envoy.

MONSIEUR LE MARECHAL,-I have the honor to report to your Excellency that I am just arrived with the whole of the column, which is infinitely more numerous than I could have believed. I am endeavouring to organize it, in order to avoid disasters, and particularly plundering, which would make us die of hunger, and which I found at the highest pitch this morning upon my arrival at Almendralejo.

I found upon my arrival here a letter from M. Le Normand to Major D'Aubersac. I annex it herewith, after having acquainted myself with its contents. As I imagine that it can be only the 9th corps' which is at Almaraz, I write from hence to the Count d'Erlon, in order to induce him to hasten his march and to join you. However as it is also possible that they may be troops belonging to the army of the centre, commanded by General D'Armagnac, I write to him likewise, in order that he may move towards you.

I send an answer to Capt. Le Normand to intimate to him that he should correspond with your Excellen. cy. Major D'Aubersac having rejoined the army, I ordered him to collect a large convoy of provisions, and to accompany it to you, that it may the more securely reach you.

The great heat will do a great deal of harm to our wounded, the number of whom amounts to more than four thousand; especially as we have only five Surgeons to dress them. Some have died upon the road; amonst them M. la Pierre, chef de battalion of the 103 regiment.

I am still without any news of the Chef d'Escadron la Barthe; I shall have the honor of informing you the very moment I shall have been able to communicate with him. Spanish parties are at Los Santos and at Fuente del Maestro: and have appeared this morning at Almendralejo and Villa Franca. They made inquiries at the latter place as to the march of our column; and they give out that four hundred horse and a strong column of infantry are to arrive to-day at Los Santos; I do not give any credit to this movement, but at all events we shall see them, and I shall try to escape them. I beg your Excellency to receive the assurance of the sincere and respectful devotion with which I have the honor to be, The General of division, GAZAN. (Signed)

Mr. Haines' shop was likewise broken open on Wednesday night, and cash and goods to a considerable amount stolen.

A number of the inhabitants were also annoyed last week by having the brass knockers taken from their doors-and some windows were broken.

SAINT JOHN, MONDAY, JULY 29, 1811.

I We are this week enabled to gratify our readers with the Official Despatches relative to the battle of Albuera; for which we refer them to the first page.

To the letters of Marshal Beresford it is impossible that we can add any thing which can further illustrate this splendid victory. It is certainly the most important battle that has hitherto been fought, because for the first time we have the unequivocal testimony borne to the gallantry of the Spaniards, who, although deficient in military skill, did on this occasion distinguish themselves very honorably. We sincerely hope that the battle of the 16th, will have the most beneficial effects on the spirits of the Government and people in Spain. The ability displayed by Marshal Beresford, in his dispositions to repulse the attack made apon his right, and to regain the ground momentarily ceded in that quarter, is above all praise. It will be observed, that the severe loss which the British suffered, arose chiefly from an attack upon the rear of General Stewart's division, by a body of Polish lancers, who were unfortunately mistaken for Spanish cavalry. The judgment and activity of Marshal Beresford, in frustrating the intention of the enemy in this manœuvre, were equally conspicuous as in all his other arrangements. The Marshal's despatch of the 18th estimates the force under Soult at from 20 to 22,000 infantry, and 4000 cavalry, with a numerous and heavy artillery. But before Major Arbuthnot, who was the bearer of the official accounts, came away, it was ascertained that the French army fell very little short of 30,000. The allied army consisted only of about 26,000.
