THE ARMISTICE.

LANGSINGBURGH, AUGUST 18, 1812.—The suspension of arms mentioned in our last to have been concluded between Adjutant General Baynes and General Dearborn, is confirmed. Its duration, however, was not fixed. This was hereafter to be determined, should the armistice be approved by the President of the United States. But in any case, four days notice is to be given of the renewal of hostilities, at the several posts under Gen. Dearborn's command. Gen. Hull is not included in the armistice. It is understood that he refused the office of Brigadier-General, unless he could hold his command independent of Dearborn, and receive his orders directly from the Secretary of War.

The N. York Gazette of the 20th, stated, on the authority of a letter from Washington, "that the President had ratified the armistice, for sixty days." How far this is correct, we cannot say, as we know not the authority on which it rests; but it should be observed, that neither the *Intelligencer* of the 18th, nor the *Alexandria Gazette* of the 19th, which must be of later date than the above letter, make any mention whatever of the subject.

COMMUNICATION.

I say who is this miscreant, who is thus filling up the measure of his political iniquity?—Oh! I blush for my country, and blush still deeper for my degraded government.—To say this arch-leader of the ruling party, who is the mouth piece of the executive, and who enjoys the fullest confidence of our imbecile administration, is an English Renegade—a Yorkshire man, who is a traitor to his own Country, and a Judas, who would betray ours for thirty pieces of silver.

The Intelligencer of Thursday last furnishes us with two columns of very interesting matter. We have now a new inducement to exert our powers—we see, by the feeling displayed in this paper, that Mr. Madison begins to be alarmed—he finds the opposition grow serious; and he begins to fear he must abandon Bonaparte, and make a peace with Old England, or he will be unhorsed by the patriots of New England who are not yet, and never expect to be, ready for an alliance with Bonaparte.

The "Virginia Cabal" is in alarm—The Dynasty is in danger—Clinton may be elected—The hopes of Madison, of Munroe, and of Eppes, are blasted, unless the friends of peace are soothed—Already we see an armistice of 60 days, and soon we may see negotiations proposed—a sham negotiation, only intended to allay the fears of the friends of peace and commerce, till Madison is re-elected—and when Madison is again secure of four years reign, he may call on Bonaparte for the means of giving perpetuity to the Dynasty of the "Virginia Cabal."

Let the friends of peace be on their guard against the wiles of the Jeffersonian policy.

Proposed suspension of hostilities by sea.

The Boston Centinel of Wednesday last, states that Admiral Sawyer had written to the Secretary of War of the United States by the Gleaner, communicating the repeal of the Orders in Council, and that if the U. States wished it, he would agree to a suspension of hostilities and withdraw his squadron now on our coast, until the repeal was officially known.

As the Orders in Council are alleged to have been the principal cause of going to war, and as there cannot now be a question but these Orders are revoked, it is hoped that the President will avail himself of the pacific disposition of the British Government, speedily to open a negotiation for the restoration of an honorable peace and a return of our former prosperity.
