

**BOSTON, JULY 16.
SHIPPING MEMORANDA.**

Capt. Mills, arrived yesterday was boarded on Wednesday last, off West Quoddy, from the privateers Argus, of Boston, and Lion, of Marblehead; Jefferson, of do. and 2 others in co. They intended to make an attempt on the shipping at St. Andrews that night if the wind and weather was favourable. The Lion put on board Capt. Mills two New-York gentlemen, who were taken in a Machias schooner from Eastport, one of them had taken from him by the privateersmen 1000 dollars in guineas.

Schooner Cordelia, Smith which arrived on Sunday, left Oporto, June 3.—June 26, lat. 41, 32, lon. 51, spoke the homeward bound Jamaica Fleet, of 117 sail; boarded from a brig of war, and informed they had boarded that morning the schooner Dorcas Ann 35 days from Lisbon for Portland. July 7, lat. 42, 40, lon. 63, spoke boat Hunter, Green; said they had seen a few hours before Four Men of War standing to the S. apparently English. Same afternoon, was boarded from Privateer Polly of Salem, and was told that the night before they had had an engagement with a frigate's launch containing about 40 men, with a swivel and small arms, and beat her off. The Polly had 4 men wounded; supposed the launch suffered considerably. The frigate was lying to leeward becalmed.

BALTIMORE MOBS ONCE MORE.

The following letters detail the particulars of another mob at Baltimore.

Extract of a letter dated June 24, from a citizen at Baltimore, of the highest credit and respectability.

"The evening Mr. Wagner left town, the prowling parties of the mob tracked him to every place he stopped, and late in the night, or rather early in the morning, pursued him two miles on the turnpike. If he had ten thousand lives he would have lost them all. The loss of two of their principal men, who were killed in destroying the printing office, exasperated the mob to savage ferocity, and the life of the Editors could only have glutted their vengeance. At 12 o'clock the mob surrounded the house of Mr. Rabourg, a highly respectable citizen, father-in-law of Mr. Wagner. Nothing but a search would appease them. One of Mr. R.'s sons stood at the door, and agreed to admit two or three, who entered and searched every part of the house. They then went and attacked the Branch Bank of the United States in search of Charles Hanson, whom they mistook for his brother. The house was defended by a number of armed young men, who kept the mob at bay, without firing a piece, and they then went off being assured, that neither Hanson nor Wagner was there. They then returned to Mr. Rabourg's and insisted upon a second search. A brave man by the name of Gould, sea captain, stood at the door, told them they had no right to search, as Mr. Wagner did not live there, and they should not come in; that he would go with them to Mr. W.'s residence, but if they injured the house in the least or removed a single brick, they would abide the consequences. They then threatened Gould's life, who with great difficulty was got into the house. They then went and searched Mr. Wagner's house, and not finding him, again returned to Mr. Rabourg's and knocked violently at the door and huzza'd. Mrs. W. who acted the heroine, as soon as she was acquainted with her husband's security, went to the door with a light, and said to them distinctly, laying her hand on the arm of the supposed captain of the banditti—"Gentlemen, enter and search, I will go before you with a light, you will find none but females, and then I will go with you to our house, or you may have the keys and convince yourselves." She then laid her hand on one of them and said "If you find my husband will you harm him?"—"Yes (replied one of the ruffians) I would blow his brains out with this pistol." They then went off, one of them ordering the rogues march to be played by the music, but the one whom I took to be the captain, cried out, "Order, gentlemen, Washington's march." They left the door, most of them remaining all night in the neighbourhood, watching for their intended victim. All next day they were on the look out rowing vengeance. Not an effort of the civil authority to protect person or property. The Mayor, after consenting twice to issue his proclamation, and sent it to the papers twice, had it suppressed. Baltimore is ruined."

Extract, July 1st, 1812,

James P. Heath, after displaying a noble spirit and drawing upon himself the name of madman, for his gallantry has at length been compelled to move his family and abandon his house. Last Saturday evening, in broad day light, five ruffians rushed into his house with large clubs, threatening him with immediate destruction, and searched from garret to cellar for him. Not finding him at home they left a note concluding thus—"Give this challenge an acceptance, and by doing so you prove yourself a traitor, and if you dont, a coward." (Signed Adam Allberger.) "Immediately upon the receipt of the above Mr. Heath called upon Judge Scott, who issued a warrant for his apprehension, but to this hour (Wednesday) the man has not been taken, nor can any civil officer, I believe, be induced to serve the warrant upon him: such is the deplorable situation of the city.

"On Monday night they went in a large body in pursuit of Heath again. God knows when or how this will end. Two distinguished democrats are suspected upon good grounds of being the managers of this plot behind the curtain, and to distribute money among the banditti. Sufficient proofs have not yet been collected to hold them up to the world. One of them is a Judge, a man of abandoned character, malignant, revengeful, dishonest to notoriety."
