

**BOSTON, JULY 6.  
THE BELVIDERE.**

The Philadelphia Papers have published an idle rumor of the capture of the Belvidere, by Commodore Rodger's squadron; but our last dates from that city state the report to have been a mere hoax.—The following article may have some truth in it.

**NEW-YORK, JULY 2.**—Capt. Heldridge, who arrived this morning from Philadelphia, spoke off the Capes of Delaware, a brig from Londonderry, and was told by the Captain that on the 24th June in lat. 40, 30, long. 67, 12, he fell in with the British frigate Belvidere, on her way to Halifax, having been dismasted; and was in so distressed a condition that they did not think fit to send him in.

The frigate Essex, Capt. Porter, having been completely repaired, sailed yesterday morning with a fine westerly breeze. On her foretop-gallant-mast was hoisted a white flag with these words, "*A free trade, and Sailors rights.*"—*N. Y. E. Post, July 2.*

RUMOR OF MIGHTY WAR.**

Some Flemish fisherman report, that a great battle between the Russians and French had been fought for two days; the result unknown, but it was said three particular French regiments were cut to pieces. This event is not improbable, though the account is doubtful.

**MARINE NEWS.**

**Successful Cruise.**—On Thursday evening the privateer schooner Fame, (2 guns, 30 men) Capt. Webb, returned to Salem, having taken a ship of about 300 tons, with a load of square timber, and a brig of about 200 tons, loaded with tar. The ship had two 4-pounders loaded, but was prevented from any defence by the suddenness of boarding. Most of the prisoners were landed at Machias. The ship and brig arrived yesterday.

A ship and 2 brigs, bearing a privateer company's private signal, we learn were entering Salem harbour yesterday noon.

**Another Prize.**—An English ship, loaded with rice and flour, said to be from St. Andrews bound to London, arrived at Cape-Ann yesterday, prize to the privateer schooner Madison of that place.

A small fishing-boat, with specie, is said to have been captured near the lines, and sent into Eastport, by one of our privateers.

A British boat captured an American vessel on Lake Erie, soon after the news of the war received there.

**Jamaica fleets.**—Three fleets of merchant ships leave Jamaica for England, this Summer—one sailed in May, and has probably arrived out safe; the second sailed in June, and is the one pursued at last accounts by Commodore Rodgers; the third it is said will sail about the 15th inst. and to consist of near 170 sail.

The following privateers have sailed from Salem:—Cutters, Jefferson, 1 gun, 30 men; Polly, 4 guns, 60 men; schooners Fame, 2 guns, 30 men; Fair Trader, 1 gun, 35 men; Dolphin, 3 guns, 50 men; Buckskin, 5 guns, 50 men; Active, 1 gun 50 men.

The privateers Atlas, Matilda, Gov. M'Kean, and Shadow, were ready to sail from Philadelphia 4th inst. The privateers Paul-Jones, and Teazer, sailed from New-York 6th inst.

The Manhattan is the only privateer fitting out at Newburyport.

The French privateer Diligent, of 18 guns, Capt. J. A. Garislew, 60 days from New-Orleans, on a cruise, laden with Spanish goods, arrived at Norfolk 1st inst.

The French privateer schooner Gen. Morlot, Brookman, from St. Sebastians and a cruise on the Spanish Maine, arrived at Baltimore 3d inst.

**NEW-YORK, JULY 6.**

The following is the only authentic information received of Commodore Rogers' squadron since our last.

**American Squadron.**—Capt. Robinson, of the ship Eric, from Lisbon, arrived here yesterday from New-London, where he left his ship.

He informs, that on Saturday the 27th ult. in long. 64; he was boarded by the Hornet, sloop of war, Capt. Lawrence, (the remainder of Commodore Rogers' squadron in sight,) and informed that two days before they descried a frigate supposed to be British, when they gave chase; but the wind being light could not come up with her. The next morning the weather was thick, and when it cleared off the frigate was not to be seen. Was further informed that the squadron intended to cruise between Halifax and Bermuda.—When Capt. Robinson left them they were steering S. E. under easy sail.

Capt. R. also informs, that before he left Lisbon, information had been received, that the strong fortified position of Almaraz, in Estramadura, was taken by Gen. Hill on the 19th May.—The British lost 250 men killed, the French 400 killed, and 500 prisoners. *N. Y. Gaz.*

*Extract from a letter dated St. Andrews 17th inst.*  
"Mr. Scott's ship Jarratt, inward bound, was taken 3 days ago—the crew have arrived here."

Since the sailing of His Majesty's sloop Indian, and Plumper brig, for St. Andrews, we understand, by a variety of reports, that they have taken, sunk and destroyed a number of American privateers.

We learn from Partridge Island, that the Spartan frigate, Capt. Brenton, from Halifax, is in the offing with two prizes in tow, we believe privateers.

**MELANCHOLY!**—On the 29th ult. three men, viz. Charles M'Neil, Gilbert Daniels and Stephen Prime, set off from Long Island, to go to Gulliver's Hole, along the Nova-Scotia shore, in a small skiff, it being very stormy, and coming out to thunder and lightning very hard soon after, it is feared they must have all perished in the storm, as no tidings have since been heard of them;—the two former have families to lament their loss.
