Ousely. The terms of the treaty are represented as highly favourable to British interests, and as well calculated to unite the two countries in the bonds of a lasting and advantageous connection. It has always been deemed a primary object to include the Heir Apparent, Mirza Abbas, in the stipulations of any treaty between Persia and Great-Britain. The French attempted to negotiate a treaty on a similar footing, but in that attempt they failed. Sir G. Ousely's endeayours have, however, been successful, and his success is attributed principally to his personal influence with the King of Persia, arising, perhaps, from his intimate knowledge of the Persian language, manners, and customs, and from the guarded propriety of his conduct since the arrival of the embassy in Persia.

The sailing of the expedition from Sweden is now

GOTTENBURGH, AUGUST 26 .- A convoy of upwards of 200 sail arrived from the Baltic on Saturday, and sailed for England on Sunday. There were 14 American ships among them, 10 of which, not having English licenses, were forwarded in charge of officers from the British fleet, by order of Sir J. Saumarez. SEPTEMBER 4.

Tuesday, and not before, a circular letter was addressed by Mr. Russel, the American Charge d'Affaires at our Court, to the American Consuls at the different ports of the United Kingdom, informing them that their functions were at an end.

Orders have been issued from the Admiralty, for an active impress for seamen, both in and round the Metropolis, and on other stations; and some of the Press masters have received severe reprimands for not being sufficiently active.

MORE GLORIOUS NEWS FROM MARQUIS WELLINGTON.

STAR OFFICE, TWO O'CLOCK. The Telegraph has this inst. announced to the Admiralty the arrival of an Officer at Plymouth with Despatches from the Marquis of Wellington .- His Lordship, with the advanced guard of the British Army, entered Madrid on the 15th ult. where he took Seventeen Hundred of the enemy prisoners, and found One Hundred and Eighty pieces of Cannon! His Lordshp was received by the inhabitants with great Joy. King Joseph has fled for France.

An Officer from the Marquis of Wellington is on his way to Town with the despatches.

STAR OFFICE, FIVE O'CLOCK. We again stop the press to state, that Major Burgh, the Officer sent home with the Despatches from the Marquis of Wellington has just arrived at the Office of Lord Bathurst, in Downing-Street. - The chaise, in which Major Burgh came to town, was decorated with laurels and other emblems of victory; and the despatches, of which he is the bearer, confirm, to the fullest extent, that which we have already announced. The Duke of York was waiting in anxious expectation the arrival of Major Burgh, whom he greeted with enthusiasm.

FROM HALIFAX, OCTOBER 16.

Arrived, Monday, H. M. Ship Nymphe, from a cruise; Shannon, from Sable Island, with Capt, Huskisson, officers and crew of H. M. S. Barbadoes lately wrecked there; Tenedos, from Portsmouth, England with four transports, &c. under her convoy, with 2d. Batt. H. M. 89th Regt. commanded by Lieut. Col. Morrison. H. M. brig Curlew, Capt. Head, and several vessels from Liverpool, Greenock, &c. sailed in co, with the Sophie, from Cork. H. M. brig Recruit from Shelburne, with several recaptured vessels, &c .--Wednesday, H. M. S. Morgiana, from Quebec, and schooner Paz, from Shelburne. A cartel Schooner 5 days from Portland, Mass.

This morning, arrived schooner Hunter from Sable Island; Lightfoot transport, with part of the 100th Regt. commanded by Col. Hamilton; a transport with flour from Quebec, &c.

The Herald sloop of war is reported, with several other square rigged vessels in the offing.

Sailed, since our last, H. M. ship Poictiers, Capt. Sir J. P. Beresford, for Bermuda, H. M. brig Mutine, for Quebec.

On Friday last, H. M. ship Nymphe saw 3 frigates an la brig, S. W. from Sambro Light House, distant about 50 leagues, supposed to be the squadron of Com. Rodgers.

We have been favored with London papers, procured by H. M. s. Shannon, from a vessel fallen in with at sea, from the 1st to the 4th of September, inclusive.

An evening paper of the latest date, states the arrival of Major Burgh in London, with despatches from the Marquis of Wellington, announcing his Lord. ship's entry into Madrid on the 15th of August. This is but a continuance of that series of success, which we trust, will soon effect the complete emancipation of another kingdom from the tyrannic grasp of the Grand Usurper.

Though accounts from Sweden, one day later than the letters which spoke of the French having been completely defeated on the 15th August, do not actually confirm that intelligence; yet, the previous details, down to the 2d of that month, are highly satisfactory.

The happy complexion which affairs, both in the North and South of Europe, have recently assumed, has had a conspicuous effect on the Public Funds; the 3 per Cent. Cons. were 591 to 60 on the 4th ult.

The whole force of the different Divisions of the French army in Spain on the 14th of July, was estimated at 130,500 men; -That of the Allies-British, Portuguese, and Spaniards, (exclusive, we believe, of the Guerillas) was said to have amounted to 175,000 men: - and the important victories which have followed almost in regular succession since that period, must have daily added new strength to the latter, while that of the Enemy has been rapidly on the decline.

The Scheldt fleet on the 16th of August, was said to consist of 19 ships of the line, 4 frigates, and 20 brigs, under the command of Vice-Admiral Varcilue, in the Charlemagne, and five Rear Admirals, all completely ready for sea. Ten of the ships were said to have 8000 troops on board.

Letters and papers received by the Morgiana from Quebec, speak in high terms of the loyalty and promptitude of the Militia. The Americans are making every preparation to advance; and the Canadians, to a man, are inspired with a patriotic ardour to resist those unprincipled Invaders.

We have been favoured with a Portland paper to October 8, brought by the Cartel from thence; but it contains nothing new or interesting.

CAPTURE OF THE LAURA, BY THE DILIGENT.

We published a few weeks since, Captain Grassin's account of the capture of the Laura, taken from a Philadelphia paper; the following particulars have been furnished us by one of the Laura's Officers:-Minutes made on board His Majesty's Schooner Lau.

ra. Lieutenant Charles N. Hunter, Commander. 64 September 8, 1812, at 2h. 30m. P. M. saw the French brig Diligent, Captain Grassin, of which we had received previous information by one of three American vessels we had captured, the last of which had been spoken with by the Diligent, a short time previous to her capture, off the Delaware; at this moment we were in the act of bringing to an American ship and sloop, and preparing to take possession -- but, being already reduced to forty in our total number, out of which but thirty-five could stand at quarters, and having already thirty American prisoners on board to guard, it would have rendered us entirely too weak to even think of bringing the Diligent to action (who had now hoisted French colours;) we therefore quitted the ship and sloop, and bore down on the Diligent, she being not more than three miles to leeward, the weather thick and hazy. Having sent the prisoners below, prepared for action, and within pistol-shot to windward of her, at 3h. 55m. we hauled up on the starboard tack, and the action commenced; at 4h. 10m. from the superior sailing of the Diligent, we were oblige ed to set the courses to keep abreast; at 4h. 15m. she tacked, and we, from missing stays, were obliged to

wear, which brought us almost along side, and the action continued; at 4h. 30m. the Diligent luffed up close to our quarter, and got right astern, and as she had now gained the wind of us, we put our helm up, to bring our broadside to bear again, but, her very superior sailing, prevented it, and at 4h. 40m. she ran her bowsprit over our stern and through the mainsail, (which held her there) and made several attempts to board under a heavy fire of musquetry and the bow guns, but was repeatedly driven back. Getting now still more reduced in our numbers, and obliged to repel hand and hand the enemy's boarders, we had but few to oppose their numerous musquetry. At 4h. 55m. no enemy's foot was, or had been, set on board the Laura; at which time Lieut. Hunter was shot in the head; he fell, and from excess of bleeding, was i capable of further effort, and, unfortunately, no officer was left to take command. In this situation, their great superiority of numbers, overpowered the opposers: they effected a boarding, and subdued further resistance.

"The Laura mounted ten 18-pound carronades, and two 9-pound guns; had forty men, officers and boys, at the commencement, out of which five were incapable of standing to quarters; thirteen were killed and wounded in the action and there were thirty prisoners of war to guard.

"The Diligent carries eighteen, but had only fifteen guns of different calibre mounted; had seventy-eight men after the action unhurt, and nineteen killed and wounded in it."
