

Multiplied defeats have even given vigour to a spirit which we had almost thought extinguished among the oppressive restraints and enfeebling superstitions of the public mind in the Peninsula. Our army has learned the lesson of war in a cause which would give a new splendour to victory, and take its disgrace even from defeat; the tried courage of our troops abroad has given fearlessness to the native strength of our population at home and we can despise invasion.

There is no nation to whom peace is not desirable—but with a navy which wanders over the seas without an enemy to find, or to subdue—with an army now unequalled by the same number in the world—with an increasing military character, the only one that was still wanting to our national glory—with allies faithful and bold, and persevering under all their misfortunes—with resources in our national strength, wealth, and spirit, which, whatever may be said, have scarcely been touched on, we can have no occasion for a degrading peace.

Extract from the Petition of the University of Oxford against Catholic Emancipation, presented yesterday to the House of Lords by Lord Grenville, as Chancellor of the University:—"That your petitioners see also much reason to apprehend that a compliance with the prayer of the abovementioned Petitions would lead, and they fear by direct and necessary consequence, to the removal of all restraints whatever, on account of religion, whether they affect Roman Catholics or Protestants, throughout the whole of this United Kingdom; and to the entire abrogation of those oaths, declaration, and tests, which are by law required of every person admitted to sit or vote in either House of Parliament, or to fill offices of trust and power; all which your Petitioners, still humbly conceive to be essentially necessary to the security both of our civil and religious establishments."
