

"In the above action the Belvidera had three men killed and eighteen wounded."

On the arrival of the Belvidera, Admiral Sawyer sent Capt. Thompson, in the Colibri, to New-York, to request an explanation of the matter; despatched the Rattler to Bermuda, and the different cruising stations, to order all his squadron to assemble at Halifax; and sent Capt. Hargrave in the Mackarel to England with despatches for Government. The Mackarel has had a passage of 26 days from Halifax. Capt. Hargrave, the moment he had landed, set off for London.

Such are the accounts which have been given of this affair. It is hoped by Government that America may give some satisfactory explanation. The Belvidera may possibly, it is thought, have been chased under the impression that she was within the waters of the United States, from which our ships of war are excluded. The American ships fired in chasing, and the fire was returned by the Belvidera. But they did not, we understand, make any effort to come up with her though they could have done it, two of their largest frigates, of 44 guns each, sailing quite as fast as she did.

It is extraordinary that the despatches from Mr. Foster are not yet arrived.—*Courier.*

SAINT JOHN, MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 1812.

Friday, arrived, H. M. Brig, Plumper, Lieut. Bray from a cruise, bringing in with him the three following English brigs, recaptured; and an American sloop loaded with lumber.

The Hector, Capt. Newport, was taken the 23d August, by the three-masted schooner privateer Dart, Capt. Curtis, of 9 guns and 46 men, from Portland. The Hector engaged the privateer for 40 minutes, and obliged him to tack and stand off, but relaxing her fire from the want of ammunition, the privateer made a second attempt, when the Hector after expending her last shot was obliged to strike.

The Dart had the evening previous to the capture of the Hector, taken the brig Argo, Capt. Askew, from Penzance, bound to Pictou.

The brig Howe, Capt. —, from the Brazils, laden with Cotton, and Dye Woods, bound to London, taken by Commodore Rodgers Squadron.

Saturday, Ships Comet, Eddington, and Naiad, Nichols, from Halifax.

Extract from the Log-Book of the Ship Comet, from the 10th to the 11th of September, 1812.

"Thursday, 10th of September—Ship Naiad in company—At 10 A. M. the man at the mast-head, saw a sail a beam coming before the wind; at 11 A. M. observed her to be a schooner without a topsail—she hoisted a red English Ensign at her main peak, Jack forward, and a blue Flag at her main, then fired one gun to leeward; at meridian, observation in 43, 5, all hands at their quarters, (Friday 11th,) she afterwards fired 7 guns with shot, the two last of which reached us;—to try one of our guns, gave him it and hoisted English Colors; he then bore away for us; at 1/2 past 12 the Naiad fired one gun at him, shortly after he shifted his Colors and hoisted an American Ensign and pendant, and bore up under the Naiad's stern with his Jib-boom run in, with an intention to board the Naiad; in 10 minutes of 2 P. M. gave him our stern guns as he passed, then bore up before the wind across the bows of the Naiad (close too,) gave him our larboard guns, which made him heave about, and prevented him from boarding the Naiad; gave him a few guns more when he made sail on the opposite tack; made sail after him; could see T in his blue Flag, which confirmed us it was the Teaser out of New-York;—at 3 P. M. hauled again towards him; 1/4 of 4 P. M. being close, he bore up, fired one gun, hauled down his colors, and set all sail before the wind;—at 5 P. M. he jibed and stood to the East;—went on board the Naiad, got two barrels of Powder."

Much praise is due to Capt. Nichols and his crew, for the bravery they displayed in defending their Ship, as the shot from the privateer was chiefly directed at the Naiad.

The Brig Resolution, Capt. M'Kinney, from Quebec for Halifax and this port, and Schooner Ferebe & Phæbe, from the Labrador with 300 quintals of Fish, for this port, have been taken and carried into Ports-mouth, U. S.

We have this day presented our readers with the most gratifying intelligence that has reached us for some time past, which is the Total Defeat of the French Army in Spain under MARMONT, by EARL WELLINGTON, received via Halifax; and the surrender of Detroit with the whole of General HULL's Army, consisting of 2500 men, and 25 pieces of ordnance, to the forces under the command of Major General BROCK, in Upper Canada, received via Fredericton, on Thursday last.

A Royal Salute was fired at FORT HOWE on Thursday last, immediately after the receipt of the confirmation of General BROCK's victory, by the Troops in Garrison under the command of Major DRUMMOND, and in the evening a feu de joye by the St. John County Regiment, under the command of Lieut. Colonel WETMORE.

Extract of a letter from a Gentleman at Quebec to his friend in this City, dated 1st September, 1812.

"Our successes in Upper Canada have been great beyond expectation, GENERAL HULL and 2500 men with the Fort of Detroit surrendered with 25 Brass Field Pieces, which had been taken with BURGOYNE's Army at Saratoga. The vessels on Lake Erie have also been taken."
