## FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

GOTTENBURG, MARCH 6.  
Every day brings us some political news. Report states, that the King of Prussia has entered into a treaty with Napoleon, and has consented, that all the Prussian ports, except Colberg, Memel, and Konigsburg, shall be garrisoned by French, with an equal number of Prussian troops. It is also said that the Prussians are to furnish 5000 men to France, in case of hostilities with Russia. The three following places in Prussian Pomerania are already in possession of them, Schweinemunde, Anclam, and Usedom. Bernadotte is on a visit to all the ports in Sweden; and wherever a person is found in favor of France, he is sent immediately out of the country.

RUGENWALDE, FEBRUARY 21.  
The French troops have begun their march through the Prussian dominions. Their destination is Poland and they are not to remain in Prussian Pomerania, a treaty has been positively signed between France and Prussia, but the particulars have not as yet transpired.

COLBERG, FEBRUARY 28.  
The French troops have arrived in our neighborhood, and we expect every day that this fortress will be delivered over to them, by order of our Sovereign. A declaration of war on the part of Sweden, against France, is hourly expected to take place. Letters from Berlin dated the 7th February, state, that the French troops are approaching that capital, and all was in the greatest consternation there.

GOTTENBURG, MARCH 6.  
Matters are fast accommodating between Sweden and England. It is said that Russia is to join in the Treaty as France is making vigorous preparations against her. Napoleon is marching troops in large bodies northwards through Holstein, and has already a very considerable army likewise close upon Colberg. LONDON, MARCH 12.

A Mail from Heligoland arrived this morning. It has not brought such late intelligence as we received yesterday from Gottenburg; but prayers are said to have been ordered to be put up in Saxony for the success of the French arms! There is a story of Bonaparte having given his Austrian consort a beating and sent her back to Vienna!

HELIGOLAND, MARCH 5.  
By persons arrived from the opposite coasts, we have various reports respecting Continental affairs. They mention that it was currently reported at Hamburg, that the French Empress had left Bonaparte, and returned to Vienna, after having received a corporal chastisement from her husband on the 15th ult.

We have heard so much about the Northern War, that it may be thought a stale repetition to state, that every report from the coast agrees in mentioning it as an event determined upon. There must undoubtedly be some grounds for the prevalence of this general opinion. The most obvious are, the whole of the French troops having been marched from the coast, of their being a numerous French army concentrated on the Frontiers of Poland, and the probability that Bonaparte, after having seized upon Swedish Pomerania, will stretch his grasp to get the other ports of the Baltic under his immediate controul, and that the Emperor of Russia will make an effort to oppose so enormous an aggression.

Thursday the 27th ult. was to be observed as a holy day throughout all Saxony, and orders were given to put up prayers in all the Churches for the success of the French arms, on the eve of an approaching battle, which it was supposed alluded to some expected engagement with the Russians.

The Danes have fitted out a number of privateers in the Elbe and Eyder; they are also said to be forming a large camp in the neighborhood of Ringsburg with a view to make their neutrality respected in case of a rupture."
