

with an immense quantity of stores, &c. in the short period of less than two months.—How the enemy can suffice to repair such continued waste, it is difficult to imagine, particularly when it is seen that the resistance and destruction they have to encounter seem daily to increase. Indeed it is impossible to contemplate the present efforts of Spain after the accumulated calamities she has so long endured, and the renovated energies with which she emerges from their pressure without harbouring the most confident and even the best grounded hopes of her ultimate triumph.

The private accounts from our army in Portugal, state, that so rapid was the late flight of General GRAHARD before our brave troops, that he was every where the bearer of the disaster which had befallen him; and some days after his arrival at Head-quarters, had been put under arrest by MARMON's orders, preparatory to examination before a Court of Inquiry.

EARTHQUAKE.

It appears by the following communications that a smart shock of an Earthquake was very extensively felt along the Hampshire and Sussex coasts on Saturday morning last.

RYDE, NOVEMBER 30.—This morning about two o'clock, a smart shock of an Earthquake was felt in this town and neighbourhood. Many of the houses and furniture were greatly agitated for about a minute; those who happened to be awaked at the time, were much alarmed at such an unusual occurrence.

CHICHESTER, NOVEMBER 30.—The inhabitants of this city were this morning much alarmed, about three o'clock, by an unusual noise, which continued for many seconds, somewhat similar to the rolling of thunder, and closed with a tremendous crash, which can only be compared to some dreadful explosion. Its effects were the same at Midhurst, Petworth, Arundel, and all the adjoining places, but is considered to have been most severely felt along the coast, Bosham, Sildesham, Selsea, Pagham, and Bognor; at the latter place, much alarm was created; the consternation of the different villages cannot be so well described as conceived.

PORTSMOUTH, NOVEMBER 30.—A violent shock or concussion of the earth was felt this morning, between two and three o'clock, in these towns. It commenced by a smart shock, which is described by the persons who felt it to be very alarming; in many instances the whole furniture of the rooms shook, and the handles of the drawers rattled against the wood: the bed of a workman, in the Water Works, was moved four inches from the wall. Many of those who felt it got up and came down to the street, to ascertain the cause of so unexpected an occurrence. The shock was followed by a deep rumbling noise, like that of a waggon passing over the street, and immediately after by a flash of lightning. It was distinctly perceived in all these towns, in the Isle of Wight, at Havant, Emsworth, Chichester, and Bognor. The general conjecture is, that an earthquake must have happened in some distant spot. At the time of the great earthquake at Lisbon, the concussion was visibly felt here, and one of the gates of the Dock-yard burst open.

FROM A GUADALOUPE PAPER. PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir ALEXANDER COCHRANE, Knight Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Island of Guadeloupe and its Dependencies, Vice-Admiral of the White Squadron of His Majesty's Fleet, &c. &c. &c.

IN order to encourage and promote the Navigation, Industry and Commerce, of the British Colonies in North America and Newfoundland, the following Bounties will be given for such of the undermentioned Articles as may be imported in British Bottoms, navigated according to Law, for the use of this Colony; and the same to continue in force SIX MONTHS from the date hereof, and further until THREE MONTHS notice be given in the Gazettes of Basse-Terre and Point-a-Petre, that such Bounties are cancelled.

British Vessels having taken from this Island or its Dependencies, Cargoes of their natural Produce to the Ports of the United States, and importing from thence in return for the use of this Colony, all, or any, of the following Articles admissible from them, shall in like manner be entitled to the said Bounties during the above period.

And when it may so happen that there is a superabundance of Provisions in the Colony, and that application is made for leave to export the same from Point-a-Petre or Basse Terre, Licences will be granted for that purpose, on paying into the hands of the Respective Naval Officers of those Ports, a sum equal to the Bounties previously paid on the importation of such articles: and if the Articles so intended to be exported have not been imported in British Bottoms, then half the amount of the Bounties, as specified in the annexed table of Bounties, shall be paid to the Naval Officer before Licence is granted for the exportation of such Articles; which sums shall be appropriated to pay the Bounties proposed on the Cargoes imported by British Vessels.

MARTIN HUNTER. A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by Act of Parliament passed in the forty-eighth year of His present MAJESTY'S Reign, power is given to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander in Chief, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to allow the importation of certain enumerated articles from the United States of America into this Province, for the purpose of re-exporting the same.

I have therefore thought fit, with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council, to publish this Proclamation, hereby authorising and empowering British Subjects, for the space of Six Months from the date hereof, to import and bring into this Province, from the United States of America, in British built ships or vessels, owned and navigated according to Law: Scantling, Planks, Staves, Heading, Boards, Shingles, Hoops, or Squared Timber of any sort; Horses, Neat-Cattle, Sheep, Hogs, Poultry, or Live Stock of any sort; Bread, Biscuit, Flour, Pease, Beans, Potatoes, Wheat, Rice, Oats, Barley or Grain of any sort; and British Subjects, during the same period, are hereby authorised and empowered to export in British ships, owned and navigated as aforesaid, all or any of the said herein before enumerated articles to any other of His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations.
