AT the Court at Carlton-House, the 31st of July 1812.

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

IT is this day ordered, by His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that no ships or vessels belonging to any of His Majesty's subjects be permitted to enter and clear out for any of the ports within the territories of the United States of America, until further order And His Royal Highness is further pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice aforesaid, to order, that a general embargo or stop be made of all ships and vessels whatsoever, belonging to the citizens of the United States of America, now within, or which shall hereafter come into any of the ports, harbors, or roads, within any part of His Majesty's dominions, together with all persons and effects on board all such ships and vessels; and that the Commanders of His Majesty's ships of war and privateers do detain and bring into port all ships and vessels belonging to the citizens of the U. States of America, or bearing the flag of the said U. States, except such as may be furnished with British licences, which vessels are allowed to proceed according to the tenor of the said licences; but that the utmost care be taken for the preservation of all and every part of the cargoes on board any of the said ships or vessels, so that no damage or embezzlement whatever be sustained; and the Commanders of His Majesty's ships of war and privateers are hereby instructed to detain and bring into port every such ship and vessel accordingly, except such as above excepted; And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Extract of a Letter from the Earl of Bathurst, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to His Honor the President, dated Downing-Street, 10th August, 1812.

PUBLISHED BY AUTHORITY.

"I am commanded to acquaint you that His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT has had the most lively satisfaction in witnessing the readiness which the Legislature of the Province of New-Brunswick has shewn to contribute, to the utmost of its power, in aid of those exertions which His Royal Highness will cheerfully make in defence of His MAJESTY'S Provinces in North America, should they be required; and His Royal Highness reposes with perfect confidence in the liberality of the Legislature, the zeal and energy of his officers, Military and Civil, and in the known courage, and determined spirit of resistance of the loyal inhabitants of New-Brunswick."
