Threatened Attack.

ALEXANDRIA, MAY 7.—We understand that an officer of the privateer schooner Revenge, who was nearly four weeks detained on board the blockading squadron, states with confidence, that the District of Columbia will receive a visit from them in the course of a few weeks. It was said among the officers of the squadron, that they were in daily expectation of receiving an additional force of fifteen transports, three bomb vessels and a rocket ship, upon the accession of which they were to proceed up the Potomac.

Burning of Georgetown and Frederick.

WILMINGTON, MAY 8.—A gentleman, passenger in the stage, and who left Georgetown, Roads Kent County, Maryland, at about half past seven o'clock last Thursday morning, says that the British had landed at that place, from 14 to 15 barges, and were opposed by between 3 and 400 militia. The force landed by the enemy was not known by our informant, who heard the firing for the space of an hour and a half or two hours, at which time he had nearly got to Warwick, when the firing ceased and he saw a great smoke arise. He concludes that the enemy had succeeded in burning the town. Fredericktown, on the opposite side of the river has, without doubt, shared a similar fate.

A letter from Elkton, confirms the foregoing and adds, the foe are devastating the neighboring country.

Confirmation.—A gentleman who arrived here this day (Friday May 7th) from Georgetown Roads, confirms the above unpleasant intelligence. He saw both Georgetown and Fredericktown in flames. The militia made little or no resistance. No lives were lost on either side.

At Georgetown nothing was left standing, except the church, these modern vandals still pretend to respect it. The above may be relied on.

Fredericktown, in Cecil county, Md. is a small place on the navigable waters of the Sassafras river, about 14 miles above where it empties into the Chesapeake. There were two or three store houses in the town for the deposit of merchandize. Regular packets lately sailed between this and Baltimore.

Georgetown, (in Kent county, Md.) is a beautiful village on the same river, opposite to Fredericktown, but much larger than the latter place, and has carried on a considerable trade with Baltimore.

The people of Annapolis were at the last dates May 8, in great fear of an attack upon that city.

Further accounts from the Western Army.

The following account, which represents our loss as much less than the accounts before received, is from Albany:—

York was evacuated by our forces; who brought off two small vessels only, and burnt a third on the stocks. The loss of the Americans in the whole affair was only 18 killed in the battle, and 36 by the explosion of the mine—among the latter, Gen. Pike. No Indians were captured, and three or four only of their dead bodies found on the scene of action. Of the British force about 900 militia, and 100 regulars, were made prisoners. The militia were paroled. These particulars may be relied on.

Portsmouth, May 12—Arrived, British brig Mars, (late Gemil.) Jenkins, prize-master, from Jamaica for Halifax, with rum, hides, &c. The Mars was captured off Seignin by the privateer schooner Fox, Handy, of this port.
