

The conduct of every individual engaged, and which includes the whole of the troops, regular and militia, stationed at Prescott, appears to have been highly honorable to them:—

The following officers are particularly noticed by Lieutenant-Colonel M'Donnell, as having distinguished themselves—Captain Jenkins of the Glengary Light Infantry, who the Commander of the Forces lamented to find is severely wounded—as also Lieutenant Empey of the Militia, who has lost a leg—and Lieutenant Powel of the King's regiment, slightly wounded—Staff Adjutant Ridge of the King's regiment, who led the advanced guard—and Lieutenant Mac Aulay of the Glengary Light Infantry.

Lieutenant-Colonel M'Donnell reports that he was well supported by Captain Eustace, and the Officers of the King's Regiment, by Colonel Fraser and Lieut. Colonel Fraser, and all the Officers of the Militia, as well as by Captain Le Lievre of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, attached to the Militia.—The Field Artillery was well served by Ensigns M'Kay, of the Glengary Light Infantry, and Kerr, of the Militia—and the good conduct of Lieutenant Gaugrebin of the Royal Engineers, is likewise particularly noticed.

The Commander of the Forces was induced to authorize this attack, not by any means as an act of wanton aggression—the troops under his command having been ordered at all times to abstain from all acts of that nature; but as one of a just and necessary retaliation, of that which was recently made on the British settlement of Brockville, by a party from Ogdensburg, and in consequence of frequent depredations from that garrison, committed on the persons and property of His Majesty's subjects within its reach—and in announcing its result His Excellency feels much pleasure in publicly expressing his entire approbation of the gallantry and judgment with which it appears to have been conducted.

His Excellency directs that the officers and men taken prisoners on this occasion, be sent to Montreal, there to remain until further orders.—A Salute to be fired immediately.

**THE LABRADORE FISHERY.**

THE Halifax Committee of Trade having by Petition to the Governor requested that he would be pleased to apply to the Admiral on that Station for protection to the Labrador Fishery, in the ensuing season;—the Fleet to leave port on the 20th of May and return on the 10th of September.—His Excellency has been pleased to give a favorable answer to the same;—and there being but little doubt that a proper protection will be afforded to this branch of trade, the Committee give this early notice, that all concerned may act accordingly.

The Committee mean likewise to request that the fleet from the westward be directed to rendezvous at Halifax and those to the eastward at Canso;—and that convoys may be furnished to collect the vessels along the several shores of Nova-Scotia and of the other Northern Colonies, in proper season;—

Arrived, Monday last, American schooner Expedition, prize to the Rattler.

Tuesday, n. r. Brig Nova-Scotia, with the Nautilus transport, ship Prince Regent, and schooner Union, under convoy, from Halifax.

FROM HALIFAX, APRIL 5.

Friday last arrived H. M. Brig Curlew, Capt. Head, with a most valuable prize—the elegant American Letter of marque Ship Volante, from Bourdeaux bound to Boston—captured a few days previous, by her, about 70 miles from Nantucket—H. M. Ships La Hogue and Valiant being in sight.

The Volante mounts 24 guns—had 90 men on board—and is laden with Wine, Brandy, Silks, Jewellery, &c.

FROM BOSTON, APRIL 2.

Extract of a letter from Salem to the Keeper of the Exchange-Coffee-House Books, April 1.

"A British brig, with a cargo of 160 hhd. rum, &c. from Jamaica for St. Johns, N. B. arrived at Marblehead this morning, prize to the privateer brig Alfred, Bessorn, of this port, which sailed from hence 3 days since. The brig was taken from a fleet bound into St. Johns and Halifax; and others of the fleet were in sight. The prize is a new vessel, and was taken the 4th day after the Alfred sailed. Two days out, the Alfred was chased by two frigates and had a narrow escape."—[The above prize arrived at Salem yesterday afternoon—she is called the Rover, late Everett master, of St. Johns, N. B. (owned by Thos. Millidge) and has a cargo of 184 puncheons rum. She was one of a fleet of 8 sail, under convoy of a sloop of war and a brig, and when taken was 28 days out.

Privateer captured.—The privateer Revenge of Norfolk, mounting 16 guns, is captured by the British frigate Acasta, one of the Chesapeake blockading squadron.
