QUEBEC, MARCH 11.

The Militia of the districts of Quebec, and Three Rivers, and part of the district of Montreal, have recently been drafted to furnish a large proportion of men, to be embodied on the Frontiers, and the drafted men are now proceeding for the Upper districts.

The River St. Lawrence opposite this City, is now frozen over. The ice has been stopt at Point Levi, since the 23d ult. and at Courage for upwards of a month.

Some of the officers and men of His Majesty's 10th Regiment arrived in Town yesterday; the whole Corps may shortly be expected.—1 o'Clock.—the Grenadier company is just marched up.

We have the pleasure to state, that Gen. Winchester, Col. Lewis, Major Madison, and some others of the Prisoners taken near Detroit, arrived at Montreal on Sunday evening last.

We learn from undoubted authority that at the attack at Ogdensburg, a Bombardier Anderson, of the Royal Artillery, being advanced under fire of the American Artillery with a gun which he found could not be brought to bear to his mind, caught hold of a handspike, and the rest of the men doing the same, they rushed upon an American gun, knocked down the gunners, and turned the piece against the enemy.

KINGSTON, (U. C.) FEBRUARY, 23.

Ogdensburg fell into our hands yesterday morning; the garrison in part, 11 pieces of cannon, 600 stand of arms, a large supply of provisions, ordnance and marine stores, and camp equipage, shared the same fate, and are now at Prescott.—This punishment has been inflicted for the wanton and unnecessary depredations committed at Brockville, and is announced as a measure solely of retaliation. Private property was held sacred by the troops.

"Tecumseh has defeated Harrison's rear guard and has sent to Amherstburgh, besides the prisoners, five hundred Oxen, and as many Hogs. The American army had in consequence retreated to Sandusky Bay."

The above took place on the 7th. The Oxen, &c. arrived at Amherstburgh on the 14th.

BOSTON, MARCH 9.

The privateer brig Hunter, Upton, of Salem, 14 guns and 73 men, was captured Dec. 23, by the British frigate Phebe, Capt. Hillyar. She threw 12 of her guns overboard in the chase. The Hunter had taken a transport and brig, belonging to a fleet under convoy of the Nimrod brig of war.

MARCH 20.

The privateer Paul Jones, Dobson, has arrived at New-York, from a cruise of 3 months, off the Western Islands, having made 9 prizes, and about 300 prisoners, without losing a man, or receiving a shot. Dec. 17, fell in with the wreck of privateer Teazer, which had been burnt by Ad. Warren. Dec. 31, boarded ship Concordia, of Marblehead, from Baltimore, for Cadiz. Jan. 3, boarded brig George of Boston, 22 days from Charleston, for Lisbon;—7th captured ship Scaton, of 12 guns, from St. Salvador for Lisbon, with flour, &c. 9th boarded ship Mary, of Boston from Charleston, for Cadiz;—25th, recaptured brig Little-James, from Lisbon for Salem, had been captured by the British sloop of war Jasper, ordered her for N. York;—28th, captured British ship St. Martin's Planter, 12 guns, from London, for Malta, with sugar, spices, &c. value 150,000 ds; same day, captured British transport ship Canada, of 10 guns, 100 soldiers, and 42 horses, ransomed her, (after disarming the troops) for 3000 ds; same day, captured British ship Quebec, 12 guns, from London for Gibraltar, with 750 packages dry goods, including 100 bales of India prize goods, &c. estimated at 300,000 ds;—31st, boarded ship Stranger, from New-York for Liverpool, via Lisbon.—Feb. 2, captured sloop Pearl, of London, from St. Michaels, with fruit;—same day, captured brig Return, of London, from Corunna, for St. Michaels; same day captured brig John & Isabella, of Berwick on Tweed;—3d, captured brig London Packet, 6 guns; both the latter blown out of St. M's Roads; gave the John & Isabella up to the prisoners.—24th boarded ship Enterprize, Jupper, of Hallowell, from Savannah for Cadiz.—5th March, spoke ship —, of Bath, 5 days from Philad. for Lisbon.

Portland, March 15.—On Thursday last so much of our wooden walls as was allotted to the protection of the District of Maine, consisting of four thrice redoubtable gun-boats, sailed from this port for Portsmouth, N. H.—Whether they are to be hauled up in the mud, there to rot, or designed to protect the 74 gun ship about to be built against the British navy, is unknown to most of the sovereign people.

We are sorry to learn by an arrival from Indian Island, this morning, that H. M. sloop of war Peacock, was fallen in with off Surinam, by the United States sloop of war Hornet, and sunk after a short engagement.—No particulars is received.

Arrived, yesterday, H. M. schooner Bream, and this morning, H. M. S. Rattler, from a cruise:—they have captured during their cruise, five schooners and three sloops, chiefly laden with lumber, three of the former and two of the latter have arrived.

The English Mail for January, arrived at the Post-Office, in this City, on Thursday morning last.—London dates are only to the 16th of that month.

Friday evening last the schooner Lady Hunter, Capt. Pine, arrived here from St. Andrews, having on board Major MAULE, with a detachment of the 104th Regiment. We are happy to learn that every man has returned that went to Saint Andrews except one poor man who died.

The following Address was presented to Major MAULE previous to his departure from St. Andrews: SAINT ANDREWS, 30th MARCH, 1813.

The Magistrates and Inhabitants of Saint Andrews, being informed that you are about to leave this important Post, with the detachment under your command, cannot omit this opportunity of expressing their regret that His Majesty's service requires your removal.—The ability with which you have conducted, and the exemplary and very satisfactory manner with which you have promoted the safety and welfare of this County, will impress on their minds a lasting remembrance of your residence with them.

They will ever be solicitous for the happiness of yourself and family, and that those distinguished talents you possess, may long be exerted for the honor and prosperity of our common Country.

To Major J. MAULE, 104th Regiment, commanding at St. Andrews.

To which the subjoined reply was made:

To the MAGISTRATES and INHABITANTS of SAINT ANDREWS.

GENTLEMEN,

The regret I feel at leaving a cheerful and pleasant Society is much increased by the unlooked for public testimony of your regard, making known a similarity of sentiment.

Your own loyalty and zeal for the defence of the Province have led you to overrate my exertions for promoting the safety and welfare of this County.

I sincerely thank you for your good wishes for myself and my family. I shall ever wish the prosperity and happiness of Saint Andrews, its safety against hostile attack I confidently look to, in the active exertions of its Inhabitants.

The American privateer ship John, of Salem, (14 guns, 4's and 6's) has been taken by H. M. Brig Peruvian, (18 guns). She was of small value, having been an old merchantman.

The British Transport Storeship, No. 431, of about 300 tons loaded to the beads, prize to the privateer Mars of New-London, has arrived at Newport.

The United States Brig Viper, of 12 guns commanded by Capt Henley, was captured on the 17th Jan. by the Narcissus, frigate, and sent to Bermuda.

Several American privateers have been taken and sent to England.

The report of the capture of a British frigate by the Essex, proves to be entirely without foundation.

The Belette sloop of war, of 18 guns, Capt. Sloane, was lately lost in the Categat, and all on board except 5 sea men perished.

The Ferret of 18 guns, was lost in the North Sea; and 60 sail of vessels driven on shore at Landsrona, Dec. 30.—28 sail of vessels from Alicant were stranded in Catalan Bay, Dec. 29, and many lives were lost. Seven sail of vessels from Malta were lost Dec. 29, back of Gibraltar rock, only two persons saved.

The Chichester packet sailed from New-York 20th ult. for the Chesapeake, to take on board Mr. BAKER, for England.
