

BOSTON, DECEMBER 31.

From ALBANY, DECEMBER 24.

"The army at Buffalo is represented as in a most deplorable state—a fatal sickness is raging among the troops—and the inhabitants of the village of Buffalo are flying from its contagion.

"The affair of honor between Generals Smyth and Porter, took place on the 14th inst. on Grand Island—After the first fire, a mutual explanation took place: General Porter retracted his charge of Cowardice, and General Smyth explained that he knew nothing derogatory to General Porter as a gentleman and officer.—Seconds, Colonel Winder and Lieutenant Angus."

From WASHINGTON, DECEMBER 23.

"The President communicated a Report of the Secretary of the Navy on the subject of the rewards formerly voted to the Navy by Congress. By this report it appears, that the gold medal voted by Congress in 1805 to Commodore PREBLE had been presented to him; and that an extra month's pay had been allowed to petty officers, seamen and marines of his squadron, but that the Swords which were directed to be presented to the commission officers and midshipmen had never been presented; owing to the difficulty in ascertaining who were the particular officers who had distinguished themselves, when all had acted gloriously.

"The Committee on Ways and Means reported, that it is inexpedient to grant the prayer of the petitions of the agents and owners of privateers, which prayed for a reduction of the duties on Prize Goods: the Committee considering such partial reduction as inconsistent with sound policy and rational legislation, and that a general reduction would diminish a revenue, where it does not distress the consumer, and would not produce any material gain to the captors."

"You will see by the proceedings of the House, that the Military Committee have asked and obtained leave to sit during the sessions of the House. The truth is, Mr. Secretary Monroe has informed them that the war requires that the Standing Army should be augmented to FIFTY THOUSAND men; and that the bounty on enlistment ought to be increased to 40 dollars, and the bonus to the officer for every recruit ten dollars. The Committee are about to enregister the edict, which is also to proceed for the appointment of a Lieutenant-General, with suitable pay and emoluments. Colonel Monroe is certainly to fill that office, and as far as office talents go will fill it very well.—General Bloomfield is talked of to succeed to the war office.

"We have passed two very important bills. Thanks to our gallant navy they have made an addition to our wooden walls which they did not contemplate when they were gathering their laurels:—They have in fact been the cause of the addition of the four 74s and six frigates, which have been ordered. We ought to thank Heaven that no account of any accident to our gallant defenders reached us during the long discussion. Had such arrived, the bill would have been dry docked."

"There are rumors here that propositions for Peace have been made from Halifax; but these rumors ill accord with the language and the measures of the cabinet.

"A change will soon be made in the Navy Department. Mr. Calhoun has said, that the abuses in this department are sufficient to sink any administration."

Good news from Congress.

The Bill from the Senate for Building four 74s and six 44s has passed the House, and only waits the President's signature. This looks like doing something.

The Bill from the Senate for cancelling the merchants Bonds for goods imported from Great-Britain and her dependencies, by striking out dependencies; and making the cancelling conditional, on the payment of duties, has also passed the House.

Extract of a letter from Washington, December 23.

"By direction of the Secretary of War, (alias of State,) the Military Committee are preparing a Bill to increase our army to 50,000—to give 40 dollars bounty, and 10 dollars to the recruiting officer for every soldier enlisted."

CHANGES IN THE CABINET.

It is confidently stated at the seat of government, that Mr. Monroe is to be appointed Commander in Chief of the Northern Army—Mr. Pinkney, Secretary of State—General Dearborn, Secretary of War, and Walter Jones, jun. Esq. Attorney General of the U. States. [Alex. Gaz.]

STANDING ARMY.

It is generally believed, that the Committee on military affairs are about to bring forth a proposition for raising a standing army of 50,000 men—a bounty of fifty dollars to be given for each man who shall enlist—40 dollars to the recruit, and 10 dollars to the officer—making in the whole the sum of two millions five hundred thousand dollars!! Extract of a letter to a gentleman in Baltimore, dated Bordeaux, October 25, 1812.

"Colonial produce is not expected to fall, the Emperor being determined no longer to permit importations from England as heretofore under Licences. It is expected Imperial Licences will shortly issue for all kinds of Colonial Produce. The products of your soil continue to be admitted without such document: as this government, since the declaration of war against England, give the highest protection to the American flag."

The strong body of Revolutionists, commanded by Colonel Magee—an intrepid officer and native of Boston, left St. Antonio the 13th October, to proceed over the Rio Grande to co-operate with a division of Gen. Bayon's army.

A gentleman arrived in town last evening from Marblehead, which place he left about 4 o'clock, P. M.—Says, "that, two large ships were seen distinctly previous to his leaving, standing for this port; that a boat had just returned from Tinker's Ledge, which took one to be a frigate, the other a sloop, and were under full sail for Boston."

BALTIMORE, DECEMBER 21.—Arrived privateer Bona, Dameron, Nov. 29, off Barbadoes, after a smart action, boarded and took a ship of 22 guns, long Tom having previously burst and broke a man's leg. Two sail, a ship and schooner heaving in sight, left the prize, gave chase—next morning saw nothing of the prize, and fear she is retaken. Six days before, in co. with the privateer Tom, of Baltimore, captured the Townshend Packet, from Falmouth to Barbadoes. The mail was picked out of the sea as it was sinking, and is on board the Bona. The Packet was ransomed, and pursued her course.
