New-York, Dec. 1.—Arrived, sloop Margaret and Mary, Shadrack Meais, from Cherry-floce, Virginia—27th ult. 20 miles S. of Sandy Hook, was taken by the Plantagenet, cargo taken out, and after being stripped of her rigging, given up to Henry Scarborough, the owner, and himself and crew parolled. Mr. S. was informed by the Capt. of the P. that there were two ships and a brig cruising off the Delaware, which he believes correct, as he saw a brig of war anchor under Cape Henlopen, 26th ult.

Philadelphia, Nov. 27.—Arrived, Sloop Harriot, of Petersburg, 6 days from Norfolk. Sailed on the 19th inst. bound to New-York—passed the fleet the same night, consisting of three ships, three brigs, and two tenders but being chased and having head winds, was obliged to put in here. On the 20th inst. 10 miles from Cape Henlopen light, fell in with the sloop Experiment, Capt. Thomfon, of N. York in distress—supplied him with an anchor—which vessel had been captured on the 19th inst. by a British tender, off Cape Henry, prize master Barrs and 3 men put on board, and two of the Experiment's men taken out, the Capt. and one man being left on board. She was ordered for the fleet in Lynhaven Bay. Same night wind blowing fresh from the S. W. Capt. T. with the assistance of part of the prize crew, recaptured his vessel, slipped her cables, and stood to the northward. On Saturday evening, the prize-master, having prevailed on his men to assist him, made an attempt to retake the sloop, but was prevented by our taking him and one man on board, whom we kept for 4 days when we met with the gun boat of Christiana Creek, who took them for us.

Also arrived chebeco boats Fox, Hodgdon, and Mary, Peal, 14 days from Salem, in ballast. These vessels have been captured by the Jaseur, off the Delaware, and ransomed for a few hundred dollars.

Sch. Federalist, from Richmond, for New-York, with coal captured and sent into Cape May, by a brig for money to pay ransom, has been taken possession of by the citizens of that place, and the British seamen set at liberty. The Lieut. has come up to this city. The brig was fitted and commissioned at Halifax; she carries 18 guns, and has about 70 men.

Charlestown, Nov. 15.—The packet boat Eagle, returned yesterday from another visit to the British brigs, and brought up about 30 bales of goods from the Doterel, of the Inca's cargo. The Recruit went in chase of a top-sail sloop, to the Eastward, on Saturday afternoon.

The chebeco boat Nymph, Lee, fr Boston, for this port, was captured on the 12th inst. in 4 fathoms water, by the Doterel and Recruit. Capt. L. came up in the Eagle. The British offer to ransom his vessel and cargo for 2000 dollars. It was supposed the enemy would go into Bull's Bay, for water, in a few days, as they were getting short.

After taking out the cargo of the schooner Nymph, captured off this port on Friday last, on board the Doterel, and hoisting out the masts for spare spars, they gave her up yesterday morning to the mate and crew, with instructions to deliver her over to the Captain, (Lee) on their arrival in town. They also put on board the Nymph the remainder of the crew of the sloop Inca, who assisted in sweeping her up to town—The cargo taken out, consisting of cheese, onions, apples, pears, soap and many other articles. Capt. L's trunks, &c. were sent to him in charge of the mate—The application made by Capt. Lee for a flag to go down and ransom the Nymph, had been refused.

LATEST NEWS FROM THE ESSEX FRIGATE. By the ship Criterion, Capt. Clarke, which arrived at this port on Thursday last in 82 days from Tulhuana, (coast of Chili) we have received the following late news from the Essex frigate.

Capt. Clarke was informed in August last, by our consul at Santeago, (in Chili) that the frigate Essex, Capt. Porter, had captured during her cruise on the Leeward coast, and at the Gallapagos Islands, eight English whaling ships, viz.—Policy, Montezuma, Hector, Atlantic, Catherine, Georgiana, Rose and Greenwich.—Capt. Porter had fitted out the Atlantic, and called her the Essex Junior; she was commanded by Mr. Down, first Lieut. of the Essex, and carried 20 guns and 90 men: she arrived at Valparaiso on the 12th of August, with the Policy, Montezuma, Hector, and Catherine, and the ship Barclay, Captain Randall, of New-Bedford, which the Essex had recaptured with her boats from a Spanish privateer at the entrance of the port of Callioa. The Essex was cruising on the coast to intercept the four remaining English whalers. The Essex Junior was to leave Valparaiso about the 25th August, to convoy the American whaling ships off the coast, and then to join the Essex, which was cruising off Lima on the 10th of August, having in company with her, as tenders and

store ships, the Greenwich and Georgiana, both armed with 20 guns and 80 men each. The Rose had been given up to the prisoners.

Capt. Porter experienced no difficulty in obtaining men; he had fitted out three of his prizes, and had upwards of 300 men on board the Essex.

The American consul at Valparaiso had received information from the consul at Buenos Ayres, that the Phoebe frigate of 36 guns, and the Cherub and Racoon ships of war, 20 guns each, had left Rio Janeiro on the 5th of July, bound round Cape Horn to intercept the Essex.

Capt. Clarke was also informed by the consul, that he had received information from our consul at Buenos Ayres, stating that an American frigate [probably the Congress] had captured off the River Plate in August last, an English ship, bound to England, with 400,000 dollars in specie on board.

FURTHER OF THE NORTHERN WAR.

We learn that an officer, arrived in town from French Mills, who left there on Friday, 26th, informs that Gen. Wilkinson, was sick in camp near French Mills, but was not considered dangerously ill. [The report of his death in our Thursday's paper we presume is premature.]

Gen. Hampton left the army at Plattsburgh for Burlington, without issuing an order, that he should be absent any length of time, but on his arrival off Burlington, concluded to visit his friends at the southward once more before he went to Montreal.

A gentleman from Burlington, who left there on Monday last, says Gen. Izard was dangerously sick at Plattsburgh.

Gen. Boyd was at Burlington on Monday last, to leave there soon for Boston.

He did not hear that Gen. Hampton had been arrested.

FROM ALEANY—NOV. 30.

At the last days from the army, Gen. Wilkinson was so seriously indisposed, as to render his recovery doubtful.

Gen. Hampton arrived here on Sunday from the northern army.

The order for Hampton's division of the army to march to St. Regis has been countermanded, except as it respects the 2d battalion of the 11th and a company of the 5th.

Mr. Arthur's brigade has arrived at Sackett's Harbor, on board the Squadron from Fort George, the enemy having abandoned Burlington Heights.

Southern Champions.

By a gentlemen who was at Washington during the last session of Congress, we understand that the members of the cabinet, and their adherents, attributed the disasters and disgrace which had attended their expeditions against Canada, to the circumstance of the armies having been under the command of officers from the Northern States. But now said these wise acres, "We have got rid of your Dearborns and Hulls and, and have given the command to Generals from the South—such champions as Wilkinson and Hampton—and it will be seen that Canada will be immediately taken; and even John Bull made to tremble for the safety of his "fast anchored Isle."

Without advancing arguments in favor of the talents, "more or less," of either Dearborn or Hull; who by the way, were appointed without doubt for the very purpose of placing a stigma upon the character of the people of New-England; we can now say of Wilkinson, Hampton, &c. that we have witnessed the prowess of these mighty warriors—these boasted champions of the South—these paragons of military skill, and of bravery—and we may with propriety, feelingly say, from such military chiefs as these—Good Lord deliver us.
