

and it was supposed the *Lerant* was re-taken. The *Cyane*, it is said was commanded by Capt. Gordon.

The *Cyane* mounts 22 32-lb carronades on her main deck, 10 18-lb carronades on her quarter deck, and 2 long nines on her fore-castle.

Wreck of the privateer *Surprise*.

We have some further information of the 133 unfortunate beings left on the wreck of the above schooner. Fifty of them perished. The remainder drifted on various parts of the New-Jersey shore, on pieces of the wreck, on Thursday morning. Such as were able went in search of relief, which was soon afforded, and the survivors were carried to Shrewsbury, where every comfort was administered to them. It is stated that the sailing-master, surgeon, boatswain's mate, and a number of midshipmen, from the *Lakes*, who were left on board the wreck by the long-boat, are among the number saved. Fourteen of the bodies had been driven on shore.

Four of the number saved have arrived in New-York. They inform, that the number of persons who perished, was 49; and that 73 got on shore in safety. The body of Mr. Cowan, second officer of the *Surprise*, had washed on shore, and had been buried.

BOSTON, April 15.

The *Norfolk Ledger*, of 7th inst. says, "The *Menelaus* British frigate, capt. Dix, has been for some time in Hampton Roads; she brought despatches from Ad. Cochrane for the Secretary of State. We have learned that those despatches contain a request from the British Admiral, made by order of his Government, that the Government of the United States will furnish any information which it possesses, proving that slaves taken from this country, have been sold in the British colonies. We believe that no answer has yet been received from Washington."

Letters from Canada mention the probability that all the British regiments now in the Canadas, Nova-Scotia, &c. &c. will be retained there on the Peace Establishment; but that the officers will receive furloughs to visit their friends in Europe.—Several of them are now in the U. States; among them Gen. Brisbane, the Marquis of Tweeddale, and the Hon. J. B. O'Neill, Colonel of the 19th Light-Dragoons, and brother to Earl O'Neill.

Latest from New-Orleans.—Letters of the 10th March, from New-Orleans, state that Martial Law still prevailed there, notwithstanding the commanding General had been in possession of the news of Peace, for several days, though it does not appear that he was officially informed of the President's ratification. The District Judge and District Attorney had both been arrested by a military guard, and marched off to Headquarters, for having issued a writ of habeas corpus, to release from confinement a citizen of New-Orleans, who was about to be tried by a Military Court Martial, for having written and published a paragraph which did not meet the approbation of the commanding general. Another Judge of one of the Courts having attempted to interfere for the release of his brother Judge, shared a similar fate. The letter writer goes on to state that all was fear and dismay. No one could tell whose turn it would be next, to fall under the displeasure of those exercising the powers of the government.

Portuguese and French Pirates.—Capt. Sousa, of the Spanish ship *La Concepcion*, arrived at N. York, from Havana, informs, that on the 27th March, in lat. 32, long. 74, he was boarded and robbed by a small privateer, of 3 guns, and 20 or 30 men. Two of the men were Portuguese, and the residue Frenchmen. They displayed British colours, and pretended to be from Wilmington, N. C. They plundered 11 gold watches from one of the passengers, and robbed the ship of seven trunks containing wearing apparel; 2 cables, and anchor, all her compasses, 3 quadrants, several charts, and many other articles.

The privateer brig *Avon*, Capt. David Nye, jr. of this port, has been captured in the W. Indies, by the British brig of war *Barbados*, formerly the letter-of-marque *Herald*, of Bal. after a well contested action—the *Columbia* brig of war, (formerly the *Curlew* privateer, of Boston,) 16 guns, in sight.—The *Barbados* is rated 14 guns. The *Avon* was an elegant new vessel of 388 tons, built upon the model of the *Reindeer*. She mounted, when she sailed from Boston, (Jan. 20.) 8 long 9 lbs. and 224 lb. gunnades on pivots, with a crew of 130 men, Geo. Taylor, 1st Lieutenant.

MONTREAL, MARCH 18.

The following horrid circumstance, has been communicated to us by a friend from *Glengary*, under date the 12th March, 1815.

"A melancholy affair happened in this neighbourhood on Thursday last; a German Soldier, I believe of De Meuron's Regt. came to a tavern at Martin's Mills, River Raisin, in company with a boy; after being some time in the house, the soldier went off, and left the boy behind. He had not been long gone before the young man missed a bundle which he had brought with him, and fell a crying; upon which the tavern keeper, a Dr. Brown, and one of the name of Montgomery, who had his sleigh at the door, rode after the thief, and soon overtook him with the bundle under his arm. He made no resistance: but while they were on their way, and not suspecting any mischief, the villain pulled from his pockets two knives, sprang on the man that was before, diving the horses, and run the knives thro' his Heart; he expired without uttering a groan. Then turning to Dr. Brown, gave him a desperate stab betwixt the Shoulder and the Collar Bone; and thinking him despatched he made off. The horses kept forward until met by a person, to whom the Dr. who was languishing for the loss of blood, related what had happened. He brought back the sleigh to the Dr's house; and two young men, armed went in pursuit of the villain, whom they soon overtook by his track in the snow, he having left the road. They commanded him to surrender, which he refused, saying he was not the person they were in pursuit of, at the same time coming up to them with his hands and the knives in his bosom. One of the men then cocked his gun to shoot him, but it missed fire; upon seeing this he sprang upon him but the young man fell down to avoid the blow that was aimed at him, while the other with his fixed bayonet ran in upon him, and pierced him through the body; he fell with the knife still in his hand, making a back-handed stroke at his adversary, in doing of which he wounded himself in the thigh or leg. Having secured and bound him, they drew the bayonet from his body and brought him to Dr. Brown's house. He was sent off to Cornwall jail, where he is languishing, refusing medical assistance, and will not let any one come nigh him. Dr. Brown is alive, but in a very low condition, far from being out of danger."
