Montreal, Aug. 10. On Tuesday morning the Steam-boat Melsham arrived, crowded with soldiers and passengers. Curious to know the number on board, we made enquiry of an officer of the 104th regiment who told us that the whole of the Battalion came up, which, with officers, non-commissioned officers, privates, women and children, amounted to 850 persons. Besides these, there were of settlers and other private passengers on board to the number of 80 more. The Melsham had all the baggage attached to each individual of the 104th regt. and a considerable quantity of goods shipped by the merchants at Quebec.
