

underwent the torture. He confessed the object of the conspiracy, and implicated many persons of distinction hitherto not suspected. The torture was next given to Yandiola, who confessed nothing. Gen. O'Donoghue was also destined to bear the torments: but from him the tormentors extorted no information beyond what they already knew. General Renoules, who was implicated, heard of the discovery of the conspiracy in time to escape; and the brother of Casatava was equally fortunate. Many Officers of rank and subalterns are implicated, and have been arrested. A few hours more, and the conspiracy would have succeeded. The letter which communicates these particulars was forwarded by an indirect channel to England; and intimates, that no positive information on the subject could be expected by any direct channels, as all letters for France and England were intercepted, to prevent the circulation of the intelligence.

APRIL 6.

The remainder of the Army Estimates were last night voted in the House of Commons, and a better testimony could not be borne to the severe system of retrenchment acted on by Ministers, than that their anxious and acute opponents have not been able to point out a single item in which further reduction could, with propriety, justice, or safety, be made. The Report on the Navy Estimates was also brought up, and generally agreed to, and only a few minor particulars objected to referred for future discussion.

**INSURRECTION AT BARBADOES**

By the Ann from St. Vincent, we learn that an insurrection had taken place at Barbadoes, and that such was the degree of anxiety and alarm occasioned by the event, that an embargo had been laid in St. Vincent. About 2000 Negroes lost their lives, in Barbadoes, and two whites who were ringleaders; only three other white persons lost their lives.

It appears that the slaves, under an impression that their friends in England, had obtained their freedom, demanded of their masters payment for their labour, which was of course refused; these deluded people, immediately set fire to the estates, and succeeded, as is stated, in destroying about 80 in the north part of the Island. The negroes stood the fire of the troops and militia, until the field pieces were brought up, when they fled in every direction.

We are anxious to hear further from the West-Indies, that some information may be obtained as to the extent of the insurrection; as it is reported that the blacks had got possession of the Island of Nevis, and some slight disposition to revolt had manifested itself in St. Vincent, where thirty of the militia had been ordered out to a plantation to preserve order.

Should the plans of the slaves in Barbadoes extend to the other Islands, we shudder at the result. As far as respects Barbadoes, its level and cultivated condition gives a decided superiority to the white population; but the mountainous formation of many of the other Islands, renders their situation more critical. We have, we must confess, long apprehended some dreadful explosion of this nature in the West-Indies; for nothing but aarchy and bloodshed could be expected to result from agitating among the negroes schemes for their emancipation—schemes which contemplated changing the situation of an unfortunate class of beings, who are only prevented from committing the most violent excesses, by the salutary restraints of authority.
