

King; which they did also on the arrival of the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke of Kent, &c. The attendants were the same as on a full court; the yeomen of the guard and the royal footmen in their state regiments and the pages in their splendid uniforms—Carlton House and the entrances brilliantly illuminated.

The royal family, the Duke and Duchess of Orleans, and the Prince of Saxe Coburg, were conducted to the royal closet. The royal attendants from the door of the closet to the great Crimson Room, where the marriage was solemnized, which had previously been fitted up for the occasion with a temporary altar, covered with crimson velvet, the crimson velvet cushions from the Chapel Royal, St. James's Palace, and also the Prayer Books, &c.; the large massy candlesticks, plate, &c. from Whitehall Chapel.

The whole of the Foreign Ambassadors and Ministers, who were all specially invited by Robert Chester, Esq; the assistant master of the ceremonies, according to usage and etiquette, to be witnesses to the solemnization of the nuptials of the royal pair, to enable them to report to their different courts that they were witnesses of it. Their ladies were also invited. They all proceeded to the Great Crimson Alter.

At the time appointed for her majesty to leave the closet, her full attendants were conducted across the Grand Hall, and also the full attendants upon the Prince Regent, except those in waiting upon the Queen and Prince Regent.

The Princess Charlotte and Prince of Saxe Cobourg remained in the Closet.

The procession then moved through the suite of rooms towards the altar as follows:

The Lords of the Council who were in the Commission authorising the marriage, &c. &c.

The whole being assembled, they filed the spacious room, the ceremony being ready to be proceeded on, the Lord Chamberlain returned to the Closet and conducted the Prince of Saxe Coburg to the Altar; His Lordship then went again to conduct the Princess, and was accompanied by the Duke of Clarence, who conducted his Royal niece on his arm to the Altar, where she was received by the Prince Regent. The ceremony was performed in the most solemn and impressive manner by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and the whole was as interesting a scene as ever took place in Carlton House. The Princess Charlotte was given away by her Royal Father the Prince Regent His Royal Highness appeared in excellent health. He was dressed in regimentals, and wore all his splendid and distinguished Orders. The Russian Order of the Fleece was particularly brilliant.—His Royal Highness handed the Queen to a state chair to the right of the Altar, where her Majesty sat during the ceremony. At the conclusion the Royal Pair retired arm and arm, and received the hearty congratulation of all present.

The Bridesmaids were Lady Charlotte Cholmondely, Lady Caroline Pratt, Lady Susan Ryder, the Hon. Miss Law; and Miss Mannars, the His Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury's daughter.

Her Majesty, in the most handsome and liberal manner, gave directions for bride cakes, which have been preparing for some time, to be sent yesterday to all on the Royal establishments at the Queen's Palace, Windsor, her private establishment at Frogmore, at New Palace, amounting in the whole to near 500 persons, to celebrate the Royal Nuptials.

DIED] In the Parish of Westfield, on Monday last, after a long and painful illness, Mr. ANDREW HAMM, in the 62d year of his age—an old and respectable inhabitant of this Province.

This morning at the Indian House, Mr. GEORGE HANLY, eldest son of Mr. William Hanly, of this place. His death was occasioned by the bursting of a Swivel on board the Steam boat, which was usually fired on her approach to the Dock. Although a number of persons were standing near the gun at the time of her discharge, no one received the slightest injury except himself. Daring robbery.—On Sunday night some fellow entered the cabin of the British schooner Camperdown, capt. The chest was found open yesterday morning in Moore-street, and the trunk, with the bottom knocked in, was found in the yard of the new buildings corner of Pearl and Whitehall-streets. At the time the robbery was committed, the captain and his crew, six in number, were asleep in the cabin! and, next to the chest which was stolen, stood the captain's trunk, containing between 70 and 80 doubloons—and this, probably, was the booty the robbers had in view. Letter from the French frontier, May 9.

It is well known that the police lately found upon a Staff Officer, a ring on which was engraven an immonelle (a flower) and in which there was a portrait of young Napoleon, a little card with a number, and lastly the formula of an oath. This discovery excited attention, and was soon found out that their existed a society, under the name of the Philanthropic Society, which have particular views; 345 members of this society are already arrested. Among them is Mr. Fluet, who was under Fouche, the Chief of a division of his department, and composed the two well known reports

upon the conduct of the foreign troops. The violent and offensive expressions in these two reports, induced the Allied Sovereigns, who were at that time at Paris, to desire the dismissal of Fouche. This Philanthropic Society was the source of all the news and reports which caused so much alarm during the last two months.

SPANISH COLONIAL WAR.

Extract of a letter from Port-au-Prince, June 4.

"The news of General Bolivar's success has reached this place. He has captured Barcelona and Lagaira, and taken the Spanish Fleet in Cumana Bay. Three Thousand Spaniards joined him. He has liberated the Slaves."

On this subject we have received the following from our Baltimore Correspondent.

BALTIMORE, JUNE 27.

Capt. Watkins, arrived at this port from Port-au-Prince, has handed us the following, which was received there just before his departure.

Port-au-Prince, June 6.

"Copy of a letter from Mr. Farnis Sage, at Jacquemel, to Mr. Scribner, a merchant of this place.

"I arrived here last evening, and according to promise hasten to give you the news of the Carthaginian expedition, as received by a vessel from Curacao, that came into port yesterday. The fleet, it appears, proceeded to the island of Margareta, which they took with but little trouble, where they hung a shot seven or eight hundred Royalists—here they took 13 vessels of war and 200,000 dollars in cash. With this reinforcement they went to Cumana, which, together with six or eight other towns on the main, is in their possession; and the last news states, they were marching triumphantly towards Caracas, which no doubt is in their hands before this time. The Royalist General Morillo, has made several attempts to penetrate to Santa Fe, but has been often defeated; he is now cooped up in Carthagena, from which he cannot stir without the greatest hazard. In short, the Patriots seem to get the better of the Royalists in all parts, and it appears to me very probable they will carry their point."
