Coroner's Office, Halifax, Saturday, 4th, May.

An inquest was this day held upon the body of Capt. John Westmacott, of the Royal Staff Corps; the verdict of the Jury was—"That the said John Westmacott came to his death by wounds received, while on duty on the morning of the 17th of April, from two persons supposed to be Artillery Drivers."

We understand that the murderers of Capt. John Westmacott of the Royal Staff Corps, stationed at Halifax, have been apprehended at that place.—They proved to have been two men of the 64th, which had been left behind that Regiment at its departure from Nova-Scotia, which were of the most depraved character.

BRUSSELS, MARCH 30.

The reports that the French army will not be completed this year, are confirmed. The Regiment of cavalry at Lille and Arras, have not more than 2 or 300 men, and take no recruits. The number of horses required for them are complete, most of them are from the army of the Loire. The national guards do the duty with the greatest zeal, in those fortresses where there are no garrisons of the Allied troops.

The first and de-camp of the Duke of Wellington is arrived here from Paris, charged with a special mission, the object of which is not known. It seems that the delay of the departure of the Duke of Wellington from Paris, to review the army of occupation, which has been so often announced, is connected with some affairs of great importance which is not yet sufficiently cleared up.

All the French who are named in the ordinance of the 24th July, must absolutely leave this city. The necessary orders have been given to hasten their departure. Merlin de Douay, who was already embarked, but wrecked off Flushing, is going to Antwerp to embark again for America. Gen. Excellmans is gone. Messrs. Flarel and Bory de St. Vincent, who wrote in the Nain Jaune, and who had staid beyond the time that was granted them, have been conveyed out of the city by the police. The number of houses that are to be pulled down for the purpose of fortifying Charleroi is 160; steps are to be immediately taken to indemnify the proprietors, so that none of them suffer by that measure.
