SOAP OUT OF SNOW.

Mr. Poulson,

The experiment has been fairly tried, and succeeded beyond my most sanguine expectation.

Having lately seen a piece in your paper relative to making Soap out of Snow, I was induced to make a trial—fearful it might be a burlesque or hoax, I took but half a pound of hard soap, & according to the receipt recommended, cut it into small pieces, melted it in an iron kettle gradually, then added four pound of snow and let it boil or simmer slowly about three hours, until a froth appeared.—I then added about half a table spoon full of fine table salt, stirred it up well, and put it by to cool; the product was one and three quarter pounds of fine hard soap, of the first quality.

Quere—Would it not be worth while for Chemists to try other experiments with snow? Surely this is an experiment worth knowing. Facts are convincing proofs; notwithstanding the ridicule of the Soap-boiler in your paper of the 16th instant, thirty pound of good hard soap, according to this trial would make about one hundred pounds of superior quality hard soap—this was made with wet snow, during the rain.

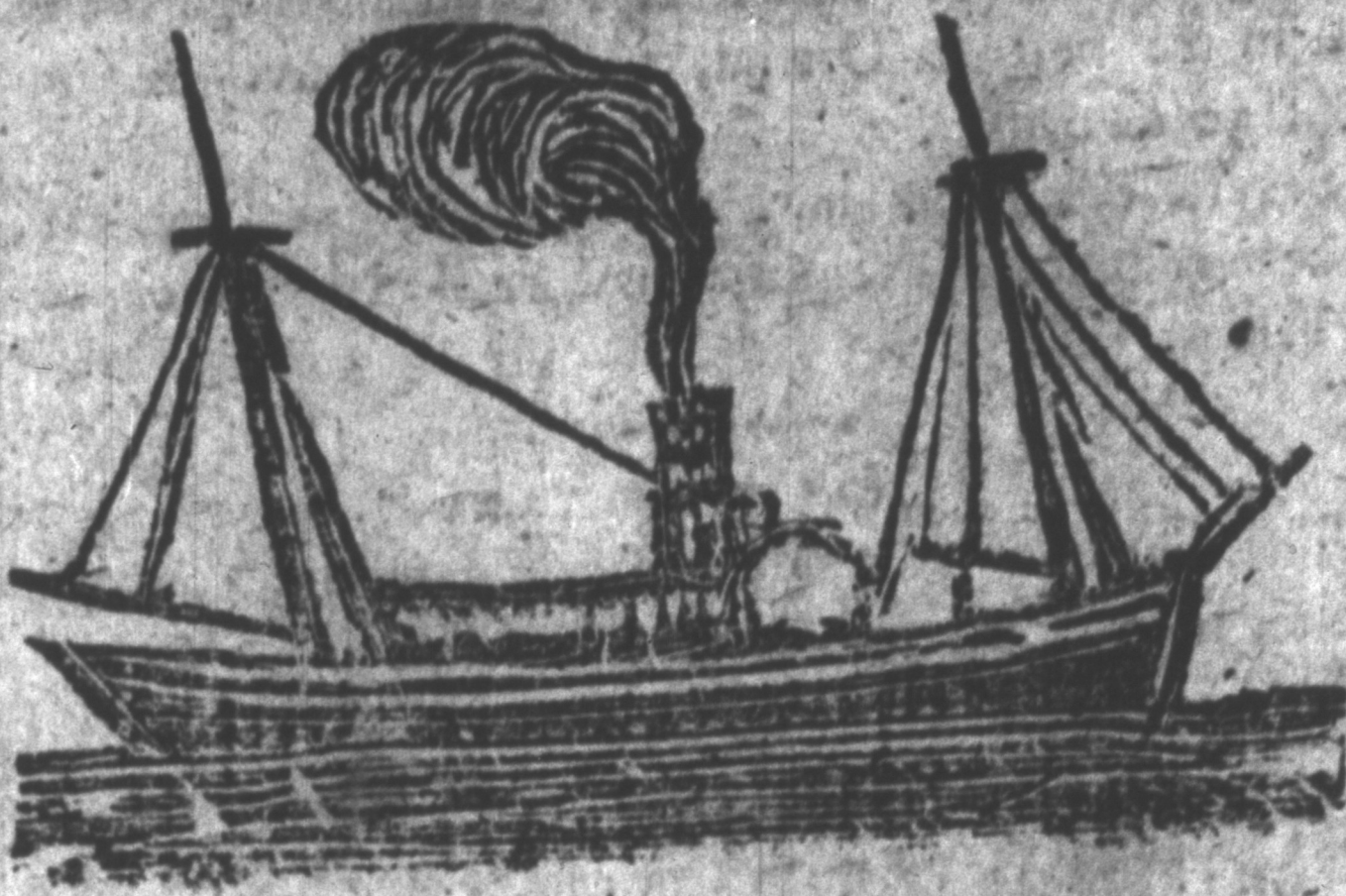
