MASONIC INSTALLATION!

The Installation of the Officers of *Wellington Persevering Lodge*, No. 20, took place, according to advertisement, between the hours of three and seven o'clock, P. M. on Wednesday the 24th ult. at the Assembly Room in Tesseyman's City Tavern. A part of the ceremonies were public, and were attended by one hundred and thirty Brethren, and a numerous circle of Ladies and Gentlemen, among whom many Canadians were conspicuous. The Rooms were fancifully decorated by appropriate Banners, among which, was one representing the Union of the two Rival Fraternities of England, under the auspices of His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT, as Grand Patron of the order. His Royal Highness EDWARD, Duke of Kent, as last Grand Master, according to the old Institution, and his Royal Highness the DUKE of SUSSEX, at present General Grand Master of the United Fraternity; combined with the respectable names of DENBCHAU and COULSON, the present Provincial Grand Master and Deputy of Lower Canada. In the centre was placed an altar fancifully decorated with scarlet, gold and fine linen, the ascent to which, was by three steps o'er shadowed by an Arch of Crimson Silk, with fringe and tassals, surrounded by double triangular Candelabras, of rich plated ware. The Holy Writings were placed upon this Alter, and the Warrant of Union Lodge No. 8, under whose auspices the ceremonies were performed, supported by the Warrant of Lodge No. 459, held in the Royal Artillery. The Master's Chair was placed under the Union and Knight Templars Standards, and was decorated with azure and purple Velvet, trimmed with rich gold Lace; the chairs of the other officers were attended by blue and Crimson Banners. The *tout ensemble* exhibited a most imposing Spectacle. The instrumental Music was performed by the Band of the Regiment De Meuron, and the various airs selected appeared judiciously chosen, adding greatly to the solemnity of the Scene.

The Brethren upon their knees, the profound silence, the invocation prayer, the ceremony of consecration, the music, while the elements of Corn, Wine and Oil were sprinkled upon the Lodge, impressed us with real religious awe; we could not help thinking that a Fraternity, whose superficial ceremonies are so imposing, must be founded upon the purest principles. The Installation of the officers of the new Lodge, was accompanied with suitable Harengues upon the nature of their offices, all inculcating pure principles of morality, benevolence, and duty to the Supreme Being, mingled with sentiments of obedience to the Sovereign Authority.

Upon the whole, we have not witnessed a ceremony more peculiarly striking, and have been more minute in our description, as it is the first we have seen in this city, where respectable strangers have been present; and sincerely hope that *Wellington Persevering Lodge*, No. 20, will become an ornament to the Society. Let the officers imitate the virtues of the Illustrious Nobleman whose name they have assumed, together with his persevering spirit to do good, and like him they may be crowned ultimately with the plaudits of the Fraternity.

The established prices for the ensuing season will be: All after-cabin Passengers 2s. 6d; Breakfast and Dinner, or Dinner and Tea included. Children under 12 years of age 10s. and Servants eating after their Master or Mistresses 15s. All forward-cabin Passengers 47s. 6d. and Children under 12 years of age 10s.

And from Worden's to the Indian-House, do 10s.

The Steward will keep a supply of the best of Liquors, which is to be paid for by those who order them. All Persons must pay their Passage money, on their having their names entered on the Boat's Books, prior to starting.

Passengers will be allowed 50lbs. weight of Baggage; all weight over, to pay at the rate of 5s. per Cwt. for all or part of the way; small Parcels without exception, under 15lb. to pay 1s. 3d. to be paid for on putting the same on board. No four-footed animal admitted on board the Boat; Dogs excepted—for each of which, 5s. must be paid, and excluded both cabins.

To avoid confusion, Passengers are requested to affix their names to their Baggage, previous to sending it on board.

All application for Passages, to be made to the Master on board.
