

chiefs has not been ratified, and it is said that they have been instigated by the Mahratta chiefs to refuse the ratification.

Yesterday the princess Charlotte and prince Leopold prepared a grand dinner for the duke of Wellington, but on account of an arrangement of the cabinet ministers which could not be dispensed with, for his grace to dine with them at lord Castlereagh's, he was prevented. Those who know the etiquette observed at cabinet dinners, to which no persons are admitted but those whom the prime minister of the day calls to his consultations, will attach some importance to the duke of Wellington's dining with the cabinet ministers.

The Prince of Cobourg is admitted a Member of the British Privy Council.

As a proof of the singular stagnation of trade, one day last week there was not a single entry for export or import at the custom-house of London, a circumstance without parallel in the annals of that extensive establishment.

Immediate measures, as we expected, are to be adopted against the Barbary powers. Lord Exmouth who arrived in town on Wednesday, and who has had daily conferences with the first lord of the admiralty, set off yesterday morning for Portsmouth, and will sail immediately with a squadron for Algiers.

Sir Robert Wilson has obtained permission to reside at the hotel of his lady during the time of her illness, which is supposed to be most serious. He is on PAROLE not to quit his apartment, but his friends are allowed to see him.

We have reason to believe that the duke of Wellington's return to this country has given rise to many unfounded surmises in France, and which may be communicated here. It has been whispered, we know, at Paris, that his return has been occasioned by political discussions, and that their may be reason to apprehend some interruption to the amity so happily established between the Allied Powers and France.—And the foolish and wicked attempt lately made to set fire to his grace's house, has naturally given some degree of countenance to these surmises.—We have the best reason to know that these apprehensions are totally without foundation, and that his grace's return has been entirely owing to the advice of his physicians, who have considered the Cheltenham waters as necessary to relieve him from a liver complaint with which he is affected. His grace may be expected to leave London the day after to-morrow. With respect to the attempt upon his house, the vigilance of the police has not yet discovered the authors of it; but there is reason to believe that it was the act of some single desperate incendiary and as much directed against the French princes as against the duke.

CHAMPION OF ENGLAND.

Lewis Dymoke, Esq. the Champion of England, is the claimant of the Barony of Marmyon, in the Petition now before the House of Lords. This Gentleman is the Champion of England, as the lineal descendant of Robert de Marmyon, to whom William the Conqueror granted the manor of Scivalsty, in the county of Lincoln, to be holden by him, his heirs and assigns, *in capite*, by barony, and by the peculiar and most honorable service of performing to the Kings of E. the office of Champion on the day of their Coronation. This service is performed by the riding *cap-a-pee* into Westminster Hall, where the King and his Court are at dinner, after the coronation, and throwing down his glove as a challenge to all the world to dispute his Majesty's title; after which, he backs his horse out of the gate, keeping his face to the illustrious company.

In the small provincial towns throughout England, it is nearly incredible what a number of decent and respectable families have sunk through the distresses of the times, and the enormous weight of taxation, into bankruptcy and obscurity.

LORD PAGET.

Among the splendid ornaments which Uxbridge-house presented on Monday night at a magnificent Ball given by the Ladies Paget, was a massive silver pyramid, richly sculptured, in front and rear, with batties-scenes on the Peninsula, wherein the Hussars were engaged; on the right side, the Royal Arms of England; on the left, those of the House of Paget; underneath, four lions on a bold projection; at the base, the following inscription:—

"This piece of plate is presented to Lt. Gen. Ld. Paget by the Prince Regent, by his R. H. the Duke of Cumberland, and the inscribed officers of the Hussar Brigade, who have served under his Lordship's command; in token of their admiration of his high military acquirements, and of the courage and talent actually displayed by him, in leading the Hussars to victory against the French cavalry, during the campaign in the Peninsula, in 1808."

COMMERCIAL TREATIES.

The Ministers of France and Sweden, near the U. States, have orders to negotiate commercial treaties with the U. States, upon the same basis as the late treaty with Great-Britain.

The Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada has received the Prince Regent's positive instructions, not to remove the Seat of Government from York to Kingston, but to establish it permanently at the former place.

INFORMATION TO MARINERS.

A black Buoy with a white vein, has been placed near to the Barrel Rock, which lies in the Broad Sound Channel, at the entrance of Boston Harbor. The Buoy is moored about 7 fathoms N. E. from the Rock, in 3 1/2 fathoms of water—about 1 1/2 mile W. by S. from the body of the Graves—1/2 mile N. W. from the Devil's Back—W. N. W. from the house on Green-Island—and N. E. 1/2 E. from the tree on Long-Island Head. This Rock is 10 or 12 feet long, and 5 or 6 feet wide, ranging N. N. W. and S. S. E. having 4 or 5 feet of water upon it at low tide, and 3 1/2 fathoms round it—Vessels may pass with safety, either side of the Buoy, giving it a birth of 12 or 15 fathoms.

Nine sail of English vessels were in Newry, last accounts, preparing to take Irish passenger to the United States. One of them had 350 engaged!

HAVANA.

The new Governor, with 1500 troops, arrived at the Havana July 1. It is said he was determined to execute the order for excluding foreign vessels; but the proceeding would be very unpopular.

Another account from the Havana states the number of troops at 900—A new Intendant (Don Alexandro Ramidree) came with the Governor.

The Carthaginian privateers, of the Havana, after an action of three hours, had captured two government schooners.

Sinking or Sliding Land.—About five acres of land on Friday last, slipped from the side of the village of Herkimer, into the West Canada Creek, near its confluence with the Mohawk river. *Utica Patriot.*

JULY 26.

The frigates burnt at the Havana, was of 44 guns, and one of the finest in the Spanish Navy. She was worth at least a million of dollars, besides the valuable property she had on board.

Not an article was saved from the ship. She had just arrived, and brought the new Governor to Havana.

The British Consul at Charleston, S. C. has advertised for a vessel to take from thence and from N. C. from 35 to 40 persons of colour, to be landed at Halifax. They were taken on board British vessels during the late war.
