

"In conformity to the direction issued by government, for the complete destruction of the dead bodies of men and horses, belonging to the enemy, which fell in battle, or perished from the cold, and had not been committed to the earth, the following reports have been transmitted by the governors of different Provinces.

"In the government of Minsk, up to the end of January, 8,797 dead bodies of men, 2,743 of horses, had been burned; and there still remained to be burned, of the former, 30,108; and of the latter, 27,316; the greater part of which were found on the banks of the Beresina.

"In the government of Moscow, up to the 15th of Feb. 49,754 dead bodies of men, and 27,849 of horses, had been burnt, besides a number of others that were buried.

"In the government of Smolensk, up to the 2d of March, 71,735 dead bodies of men, and 51,430 of horses had been committed to the flames.

"In the government of Wilna, up to the 8th of March 72,202 dead bodies of men, and 9,407 of horses had been put under the ground.

"In the government of Kaluga, up to the 11th of March, 1,017 human corpses, and 4,884 dead horses had been burnt.

"The sum of the whole was 213,516 human corpses, and 95,816 dead horses; exclusive of many others, buried or buried, of which no account was taken.—The strictest measures have been taken for destroying, before the approach of spring the dead bodies that may be found in the rivers or woods."

paper containing London dates to the 29th June, from
them we have extracted the following:—

LONDON, JUNE 18.

Extract of a letter from Malta, dated May 18, via
Marseilles.

"It is said, indeed promulgated by Government, that
the Bey of Tunis has lost his head by his own Son, for
liberating the Christian slaves; and that in the absence
of the British fleet, they had equipped their frigates, and
determined to take every thing they met with. It is
currently reported that one English vessel has been taken
and the crew murdered.

JUNE 21.

Some melancholy intelligence from the Mediterrane-
an was received in town yesterday, in account of an
unprovoked massacre of an immense number of Chris-
tians in the Algerine sea-port town of Bona, situated
many leagues to the East of Algiers. It appears that
about 700 mariners, belonging to the crews of the Coral
fishing-boats, under English and French colors, landed
on Ascension Day to go to Church, when a great num-
ber of armed Turks and Bedouins broke into the Church
and immediately proceeded to kill all within it. Of
these horrible atrocities the following authentic particu-
lars were yesterday received at Lloyd's:—

Further Information from Genoa, dated June 8.

"We informed you on the 6th inst. of the horrid
insurrection at Bona, on the 23d ult. against the Chris-
tian, which, we are sorry to say, is confirmed. It ap-
pears, from private letters, that on Ascension-days, a-
bout 700 mariners, belonging to the crews of the Coral
fishing-boats, under English and French colors, had land-
ed that morning, to go to Church, when all of a sudden,
a great number of armed Turks and Bedouins entered
the church and began to kill and slaughter all those that
were not lucky enough to effect their escape on board.
It is said that the Governor endeavored to oppose with
his force what resistance he could, and that M. Escad-
ero, in endeavoring to appease the furious bands was
mortality wounded. The number of victims that have
been cut off is not yet known.

"A boat arrived here on the 2d instant with the crew
of a French Tartan, which was captured by the pirates
on the 16th ult. near Cape Danzo, off the Roman shore,
after a resistance of about half an hour. The crew
then took to their boats, and got on board a Greek ves-
sel.

Extract of a private letter from Leghorn, dated June 4.

The following is the deposition of Jaques Nillano,
owner of a felucca which has arrived here from Bona,
near Algiers, on the Barbary Coast:

"On the 23d of May 350 barks of different nations,
were as usual, off Bona fishing for coral. At day-
break a cannon shot was heard, and the same moment a
great number of armed men, to the amount of about
5000, some of them on horse-back, issued from the
town, and fell upon the seamen of the of said barks who
were on shore, massacring all without distinction of
flag. I escaped from the masacre, because, being, hap-
pily at some distance from the town, I had time to em-
bark, as well as three passengers only, who have arrived
with me, abandoning all our fishing stores and provi-
sions. As far as I could observe, I calculate that about
one hundred of the said vessels fell a prey to the Al-
gerines, with the greater part of their crews, and that
300 men were killed in this unexpected attack of these
barbarians.—The Brother of the English Vice-Consul,
resident at Bona, saved himself by flight, after being
wounded. I am ignorant of the Vice-Consul's fate.
It appeared evident, that the Algerine Government was
a party to this aggression, because the cannon of the forts
at Bona kept up an incessant fire on our boats."

PORTSMOUTH, JUNE 15.

The Havana which arrived this morning from St.
Helena, brings an account, that on the 3d inst. off Fay-
al, she parted company with the Ferret, sloop of war, of
12 guns, Captain Sterling (2), which had left St. H.
on the 27th of March, for England; but when crossing
the Line, she fell in with a ship under Spanish colours,
having a cargo of slaves on board, which upon her near
approach to speak to her, fired into the Ferret, and kill-
ed two of her men—an action ensued, and, after a run-

ning fight of about four hours, at the moment that cap-
tain Sterling was preparing to board, she struck.—The
Ferret afterwards proceeded with her to Sierra Leone,
where it is expected she will be condemned as a pi-
rate. The Ferret had five men killed and wounded in
the action.

LONDON, JUNE 29.

The violences of the Barbary powers are the subject
of much and just complaint throughout Europe; and as
usual, when assistance is needed, England is looking up
to for it. The inferior powers have been so long accus-
tomed to our gratuitous exertions in their favour, that
they seem to consider themselves entitled to demand them
as matter of right, and even to heap reproaches on us
in case of delay. Such is the substance of a long article
in a Haarlem paper brought by the Dutch mail yester-
day; and some of our own declamatory politicians joint
in the senseless cry. "Britain, and Britain only, (say
they) must deal the blow." Assuredly Britain must
and will defend the honour of her own flag. Instruc-
tions have already been sent out to admiral Penrose who
has doubtless taken measures for the protection of our
trade in the Mediterranean. But it is quite a differ-
ent question whether we shall lavish our blood and trea-
sure for Neapolitans, Sardinians, Romans, Spaniards,
or Portuguese. In the present state of our finances, we
cannot afford mere Quixotism. If these powers, or
any of them, are incapable of defending themselves, let
them pay us for the service, and it will no doubt be ef-
fectually performed. The Mediterranean powers have
no claim on our gratuitous assistance: there is not one
of them that is not already deeply indebted to us; but
of their gratitude for our benefits the world has yet
heard little.
