**HALIFAX, OCTOBER, 11.**

**Destructive Fire.**

A little before 10 o'clock on Wednesday evening, a store in Sackville Street, occupied by Mr. Stark, unfortunately caught fire: The flames were soon communicated to the adjoining buildings, on either side; and from thence to those in Hollis-street and Bedford Row. At 12 o'clock the sight was truly dreadful, flakes of fire fell in every direction, and fears were entertained for almost every house in that part of the Town. ---Happily, however, the wind was extremely light: a hoar frost, which fell thickly, contributed much to deaden the particles of fire which were scattered on the contiguous buildings; and by three o'clock yesterday morning, the danger began to subside.

The houses destroyed by fire, were those belonging to Mrs. Kavanagh, widow, occupied by Messrs. Stark and D. Fraser; the large and handsome brick buildings belonging to Mr. G. M. Haliburton, occupied by Mr. M<sup>r</sup>Donald and J. Martin; a house occupied by D. Connor; and that of J. T. Hill, Esq. in Hollis-street; the houses belonging to Messrs. King and Vass, the former occupied by Mr. M. Smith and others, in Bedford Row, and several smaller buildings---The late W. Graham's house, Mrs. M<sup>r</sup>Donald's Mrs. Hawkins, (occupied by Dr. Thompson,) Miss Wenman's and those occupied by Messrs. Poor and Jennings, were taken down, under the direction of the Magistrates and Fire Wardens, as the only means of preventing further destruction; and several others sustained very serious injury.

His Honor the ADMINISTRATOR was present and nearly all the Troops of the Garrison were actively employed on the occasion; as were the officers and men of his Majesty's ships and Naval Yard. The COMMANDANT remained near the fire until half past 3 o'clock, A. M. when, the flames beginning to abate, the horn blew, and the men exhausted with FATIGUE, were permitted to retire to their Barrack.

**BRIDGE-TOWN, AUG. 5.**

Upon resigning the Government of Caudaloupe His Excellency Sir James Leith G. C. B. addressed the Inhabitants of that Island in the following

**PROCLAMATION.**

*Inhabitants of Gaudaloupe.*

An infamous Treason had removed you from the Government of your legitimate Sovereign---perfidious Chiefs and their Accomplices had prepared the ruin of your Colony---a second time you were about to be reduced to the necessity of seeking an asylum among strangers, when that providence who watches over you defeated their projects, by granting success to the Army under my orders, which came to deliver you.

During my Administration, every thing which could tend to your happiness and tranquility has constantly been the object of my solicitude. I have deemed it a duty to distinguish those among you who have given the greatest proof of their attachment to His Most Christian Majesty; and I experience the greatest satisfaction in having been able to unite the duty which I owe my own Sovereign, with all those sentiments, of respect which I have professed for His Most Christian Majesty.

In quitting you, I derive much pleasure in leaving the Government of the Colony to H. Excellency Count de Lardenois.---His noble character---his unbounded attachment to the cause of his Sovereign---his energetic conduct during the last troubles which have agitated your country---are to me sure guarantees of the prosperity which awaits you under his paternal Government.

Be assured of the deep interest I shall ever take in the fate of Gaudaloupe, and of the good wishes I entertain for its prosperity.
