The committee on Foreign Relations, to whom was referred sundry petitions relative to the Plaster Trade, and the trade to the British West-India Islands, recommend to the House the adoption of the following resolution :---

Resolved, That it is expedient to prohibit all importations into the United States from the British possessions in North America, and from the British West-India Islands; and all exportations from the United States, to those places, exce, in vessel of the United States.

BONAPARTE AT ST. HELENA.

By accounts which have been received from St. Helena to the 14th December, it appears that the arrangements for restraining the late Usarper of the French throne to the narrow limits of his present confinement are corried into full effect. Between three and four miles from the little sort of village which is dignified with the title of James-town after ascending a narrow, winding road, bordered with ravines and precipices, you reach a small plain of about a mile and a quarter in length, terminated by an abrupt cliff overhanging, at a considerable elevation, the sea. About the middle of this plain stands Longwood. It is situated on the top of a hill, and is the only flat piece of ground on the island. It is nearly three miles in circuinference with a good road and walks for exercise. He was accompanied to this spot by Sir George Cockburn, Captain Mackay, and Mr. Glover, Secretary to Sir George. Upon entering the house he expressed bamself much gratified at the pains which had been taken to render his abode comfortable. He had visited the house on his first arrival, when it was in a state of disorder, and the great change it had undergone in so short a time, apparently excited his gratitude. The house, which is small, is surrounded at every inlet by sentries regularly relieved. Half a mile in advance of the house stands the lodge, where an officer's guard is stationed, siffering no individual to pass without a written order signed by the Admiral's own hand. The opposite front of the house is about three-quarters of a mile from the cliff before-noticed; on the one side is an impassable ravine, on the other an unscaleable mountain. The space within these limits is all that is assigned to the movements of the state prisoner. There is, besides within the boundary, an encampment for 250 or 300 men; and on every commanding eminence, at every point which can serve to keep his, movements under view, sentries are posted, who may be said to form the interior line of circumvallation. He is in good health, and, we are assured, does not discover any depression of spirits from his fallen circumstances. The arrangements made at St. Helena by Sir George Cockburn, for his safe custody, are said to be admirable, and sirictness and punctually are worked into a perfect system : the ships of war are constantly cruising in sight of the miand, one to the leeward, the other to windward, and between which and the signal posts on the island there Bran incessant communication kept up. No vessel of any description can possibly approach the island without being discovered by our cruisers. The island of Ascension has been fortified, and a party of men landed to garrison it. One sloop of war is constantly stationed there. The Peruvian, J. K. White, had just sailed to relieve the Zenobia. Capt. Dobree, in that service. The Northumberland (flag-ship), Havanah, Icasus, Ferret and Ceylon, were lying at St. Helena.
