The Book of the Chronicles of York which pertaineth to the Province of the Great King beyond the Water called New Brunswick.

CHAP. I.

7. And eight of the wise men gathered together at a certain place called in the language of that country the hustings, which was set apart for those that would speak to the people.

8. Now the first that arose to speak was a subtle man; his father also was of the sacerdotal order, but he assayed to join himself to the men of the water; howbeit many of them favored him not, and some rebuked him to his face for his craftiness; nevertheless, many of the people clave unto him, for he was an eloquent man and skillful in the King's matters.

9. And he lifted up his voice and spake on thiswise; Behold these thirty years past, have I gone in and out before you, neither have I ceased laboring for your good as you all must know; and behold your gain is my gain, and I am still willing to stand or fall with you,

10. Moreover, he continued his Speech and said, I am of no party but wish the people to be at unity, for our country is a border country, and our neighbors are crafty men, and behold they favor us not, but their desires are to our houses and lands, our flocks and herds; and he spake other words of truth also, and sat down, and the people were very quiet, and no man said ought unto him.

11. And behold another man stood up and spake, and in his speech he said; You know my labor for you these seven years past, how mine eyes have been single to the good of the people, and in the integrity of mine heart have I gone in and out before you; and behold the gold of the land is increased, and much good has been done for the country, which you all know; yea even the present year, a fourth part of the Royal treasures have been consumed about your city and the suburbs thereof;

12. Behold also the Royal Revenues still wax greater, for in the third part of the year, even the present year, there have been seven thousand and five hundred shekels of gold brought in to the king's treasury, and much good may be done with such store of money, by giving the husbandman gold and silver to raise much corn that the people may all eat and be filled; he spake other words also, and sat down.

13. And there was a stir among the people for they were glad to hear of the riches of the land and the good things of which he spake.

14. And after which there arose another man, he was a leader of the men of the water, and he spake kindly to the people, and the Scribe heard his words for they were well spoken, but lacketh time to rehearse them,

15. And when he had sat down two others arose and they speak each after his manner; the one was a dealer in merchandize and the other a tiller of the ground.

16. And after them a sixth stood up, and he said; The voice of the people have reached mine ears, at their call have come forth and stand before you; and lo, I am a plain man, a plough jogger, and a breaker of the

clods of the valley, my occupation is in the fields, and I get my bread by the sweat of my brow.

17. Moreover he said, the statutes of our land are good statutes, yea they are very precious, for behold there is the power of the King on the one hand, and of the people on the other, which joined together make a right power, and in this manner are the statutes made; he spake besides other words but the thoughts of his mind waxed hot within him; his speech also faulted, and he sat down.

18. After this their was a stir among the people, for they beheld one that was wont to sit in the great Council stand aloof, his father also had been a ruler in the land, and the blessings of the poor and the needy came upon him and his house, for he had nourished the people: The young man also was of a liberal heart and pitied the poor,

19. And when the people beheld him their bowels yearned towards him, and they besought him to stand his lot among those that had offered themselves to go in and out before the people,

20. And he came forth and spake unto the people, and while he was speaking the multitude clapped their hands and greeted him much.

21. And behold the last that rose up to speak to the people was a seller of purple and scarlet and of all goods of the merchant, he lifted not up his voice, and the scribe heard but few of the words which he spake.

22. Howbeit he said these twenty and eight years have you known my standing among you, moreover you all know that mine inheritance was but small, but behold now it is waxen greater, and my gettings have been among you, and your increase is my increase, your prosperity my prosperity, and I am willing to do my utmost for you, for I must also wax rich or poor with the people,

23. And many more things were spoken that are not written in these chronicles.

24. And the many mighty acts that were done in those days, and other speeches that were spoken, and the names of the men that were chosen to sit in the great council are not written in these chronicles,

25. But the rest of the acts first and last, and the names of the men that chose, and the leaders that were chosen to sit in the great council, behold they are written in the book of George the chief officer, and of William the keeper of the King's Seals, and in other books that the Scribe knoweth not of.

A London Paragraph of the 6th of July, says, with pleasure we contradict a paragraph which has appeared in all the papers, stating that one day last week there had been no entry at the Custom-house. The average of entries amounts to nearly 500 daily.

CARLETON-HOUSE, JULY 5.

His R. H. the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, was this day pleased to confer the honours of Knighthood on ALEXANDER CROKE, L. I. D. late Judge of the Vice Admiralty Court at Halifax, N. S.

Crofton Uniacke, Esq. has been appointed Judge of the Court of Vice Admiralty, for the Province of Nova-Scotia, &c. and one of the Members of His Majesty's Council for said Province.

London, July 4.—Lord Exmouth attended the Board of Admiralty yesterday for a considerable time; and additional orders were issued to cause the several frigates and bomb-vessels that will accompany his Lordship to be stored and victualled without delay at the outports. The Albion, of 74 guns, which is intended for the reception of the flag Sir Charles Penrose, is to sail with Lord Exmouth, and will proceed from the Nile to Portsmouth for that purpose immediately.

The applications to the Board of Admiralty by naval officers of all ranks for employment in the expedition to Algiers have been extremely numerous, since it was known that Lord Exmouth is about to sail with a squadron of ships.

Real Admiral Milne, who is to have the Naval Command at Halifax, goes in the first instance with Lord Exmouth to the Mediterranean, and from thence will proceed to Nova-Scotia.

The Office of the Commissary General is to be abolished; and it is said that Mr. Herries is to be appointed Auditor of the Regent's household.
