DEW .- "An experiment," says Mr. Lavingston, " has been made to ascertain the difference between dew water and rain water---by putting an equal quantity of each in different vessels and setting them in the sun to dry away ; the result was, that the sediment or settlings of the dew water, were in greater quantity, blacker and richer, than that of the rain water."

Dew is therefore fertilizing; and this is the season why lands will be so greatly benefitted, by being repeatedly ploughed when the dew is on them.

London, Dec. 28 .--- An elopement has recently taken place, which has involved in deep distress in several noble and highly honourable families. The lady is young, and beautiful, the mother of several children, and wife of a distinguished officer. The gallant is old enough to be her grandfather, a married man, high in the peerage, and of large fortune.
